

Toronto, Dec. 21—Anna Jokinson, the Finnish girl who mysteriously dis-appeared on December 4 last, while out walking in the northern part of the city, was found today. She was bying in an unconscious condition at Eglington avenue and Forest road. The girl was breathing when she was first found, but was dead when Dr. Bond reached the scene. The unfortunate girl never regained consciouness after she was found. The chief coroner was notified and promptly ordered an inquest. The circumstances surounding, find-ing, and death of the girl furnish a mystery unparalleled in local annals. There was not a mark of violence on the body, but the eyes had a vacant stare as of one who had died slowly under unnatural circumstances. The girl's disappearance caused grave alarm to her friends, and rum-ors of white slavery methods wero heard. 
Midnight Mass.
