Ottawa, Sept. 29.—The government has let the contract for the last section of the Hudson Bay Railway and this new spot for the great western railway is to be completed by 1914. This is a step of the utmost importance to the people of Western Canada, who asked so often for the construction of a railway to Hudson Bay by the old government, and who, almost within a year of the accession of the Borden ministry, had the road partly constructed, and the remainder under contract. The last section extending from Split Lake to the bay is 165 miles long to Fort Nelson, and 345 miles long to Fort Churchill. The last link is to be built by J. D. McArthur at a price which is considered by the government to be a fair one.

## NEW ZEALAND'S TRIAL TRIP

Preliminary Trip of Battle  
Cruiser Contributed by Do-  
minion to Imperial Navy on  
Saturday.

London, Sept. 28.—The battle cruiser "New Zealand," the gift of that dominion to the imperial navy, was laid down at the Fairfield Yard, Glasgow, in June 1910, will run her preliminary trial in the Clyde today, and will leave tomorrow for Devonport. When completed for service the "New Zealand" will visit New Zealand, calling at South African ports at the request of the Union government. The ship will then return for service in home waters.

## SUBDEN DEATH OF R. J. WILSON IN THE SISTER CITY

Was Among the Best Known  
Men in Halifax and Promi-  
nent in Educational and Frat-  
ernal Circles.

Halifax, N. S., Sept. 29.—The death occurred very suddenly last evening of R. J. Wilson, one of the best known men in Halifax. Many years ago he was a teacher in the Halifax Grammar School. Thereafter, he became secretary of the Division Board of Nova Scotia and of the Board of Governors of Kings College, Windsor. He was interested in the Nova Scotia Historical Society, was a son of Temperance and a Free Mason. Mr. Wilson's family, he was born in Walton 77 years ago.

## BIG LUMBER MILL BURNS

Calhoun Lumber Company's  
Property in Gaspé Destroyed—  
New Brunswick Share-  
holders.

Moncton, Sept. 29.—There has been received of the destruction by fire of the Calhoun Lumber Company's big mill at Lange Aux Couleins, near Gaspé, Quebec, together with some six million feet of lumber. There are few particulars available, but the loss is understood to be total. The mill and lumber would be valued at \$145,000, only partly insured. Besides the rotary with a capacity of 60,000 feet per day, there were eight shingle machines with a capacity of 160,000 a day and a half cutting machine with a capacity of 45,000 a day. This was one of the largest mills on the Gaspe coast and what makes the loss more serious is the fact that several vessels are on the way there for cargoes. His Honor, Lieut. Governor Wood, of New Brunswick, is president of the company. Other large shareholders are John C. Calhoun, Henry F. Calhoun and T. B. Calhoun, well known New Brunswick lumbermen. It is likely the mill will be rebuilt.

## ULSTERITES PLEDGED TO FIGHT THE HOME RULE TO THE BITER END

Hundreds of Thousands Sign Solemn  
Covenant to Resist Meas-  
ure, Saturday

Unionists and Orangemen Held Monster Demon-  
stration Culminating in Subscription to the  
Agreement—Sir Edward Carson the First to  
Sign—Police and Constabulary in Readiness,  
But No Rioting of Serious Nature Oc-  
curred

Belfast, Ireland, Sept. 28.—As the crowning proof of their determination never to submit to the domination of an Irish parliament, thousands of Ulster Unionists, Orangemen, and Orangemen, devoted today to signing the covenant of resistance to Home Rule. But, notwithstanding the anxiety and dread as to what might happen, Ulster Day passed off without any serious disturbance. In expectation of rioting, a large force of troops were quartered in the city, but their services were not needed. Only one demonstration of factional feeling occurred, which threatened for a brief space to become serious. After a football match between Protestant and Catholic teams at Celtic Park, as the crowd was returning home, several green flags were waved. The appearance of these emblems of nationalism started a riot, but the police quickly stopped the conflict before anybody was badly hurt.

Religious services preceded the signing of the covenant and services of a similar nature were held in many of the churches in the city. Outside the gates of the city, Ulster Unionists, Orangemen, and Orangemen, held a large demonstration, and the arrangements which had been made whereby the signing of the covenant was to be a solemn religious obligation exercised a restraining influence on the passions of the demonstrators. The Nationalists intended to diminish the feelings of ever, throughout the day was decidedly martial.

The air resounded with the tramp of well-drilled civilians going and coming from the city hall where the covenant was signed.

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## IRISHMAN FALLS TO HIS DEATH

J. L. Langstaff Killed When  
Biplane Drops—Mechanic,  
With Him, Seriously Injured  
-But Will Recover.

Hempstead, N. Y., Sept. 29.—John L. Langstaff, a former English army officer, was killed this evening while flying in a Farman biplane with his mechanic, Pierre Chavallier. Several feet in the air a wire connecting the control of the biplane became jammed and the machine instantly overturned, striking the ground with such force that it was hurled two feet. Langstaff fractured his skull and received serious internal injuries from which he died a short time later. Chavallier is seriously but not mortally injured. He will probably lose his left eye.

## BLAME FOR ATTACK ON AMMUNITION COLUMN

Eight Turkish Soldiers Killed  
Together With Two Boa-  
teners—Servian Minister Em-  
ters Protest With Porte.

Constantinople, Sept. 28.—According to the official account of the attack on the ammunition column on the shores of Lake Scutari, September 23, the attacking party was not composed of Malissori tribesmen, but Montenegrins. Eight Turkish soldiers and two boatmen were killed and 15 were taken prisoners. The Porte has made an energetic protest to the Montenegrin government.

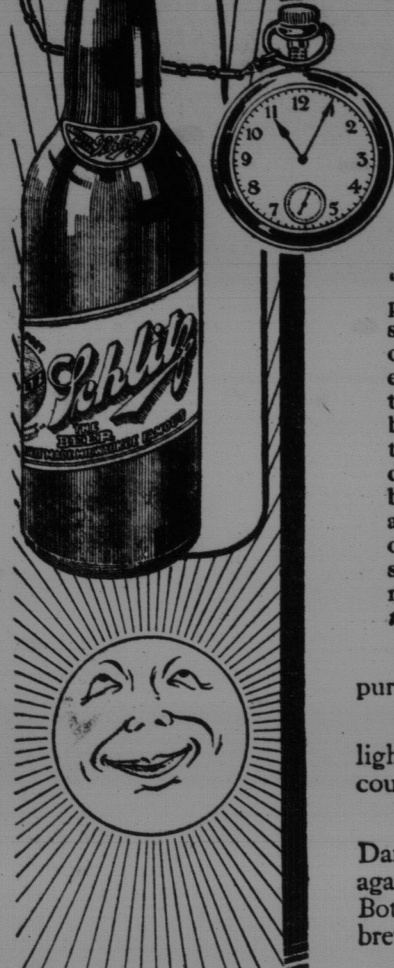

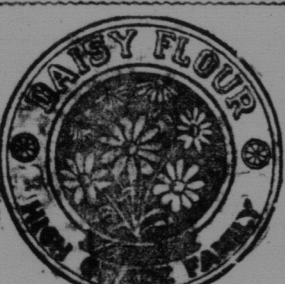

WEST LAND REGULATIONS

Any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years of age who has been a quarter century in the Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must enter in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency in the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, or intending homesteader.

Duties - Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within one mile of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him, his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

Provisions - A homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$2.00 per acre.

Duties - Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of three years, and in each of three years including the time required to earn the pre-emption price and cultivate fifty acres extra.

Provisions - A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption must enter for a quarter-section in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Must reside upon the land in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$1000.

**LOCAL**

**Property Transfers.**  
P. H. Puddington's house on Garmain street, occupied by R. T. Leavitt, has been sold to Mrs. S. A. Fowler. The price paid is understood to have been in the vicinity of \$3,000.

**Old Coins Found.**

## WAGE SCALE LOW FOR MACHINISTS

**Officers of International Association Here, Find Conditions not of the Best—Personnel is High**

William H. Johnston and Louis Beulon, president and vice-president respectively, of the International Association of Machinists, arrived in the city on Saturday, and on Saturday evening addressed a large meeting of local machinists, as a result of which nine new members were admitted and fourteen applications for membership were received.

"As regards the working conditions some of the men are getting fairly good wages, but in general the wage scale is lower than I expected. We hope in the near future to help the machinists get more money—it will mean more money for the storekeepers and others, and will have a tendency to stop them going away in search of higher wages, and the manufacturers will be able to retain the services of their most enterprising young men."

**President Johnston said the strike of the machinists formerly employed by the Grand Trunk Pacific in the west was still on, the company having failed to comply with the award of the conciliation board, and the government having refused to turn over the shops out west to the company.**

**The International Union of Machinists now has a membership of over 20,000 men in good standing, and has organized eighty locals so far this year.**

**Mr. Johnston was much pleased with the eastern parts of Canada, and expressed the opinion that there would be big developments in St. John and Moncton in the next few years.**

## FISH ASSOCIATION SUES DRUMMONDS

The Nepisiguit Real Estate and Fishing Association have brought an action for damages against the Drummond Iron Mines, Limited, and it develops that the real cause of the suit is this city's week of W. F. C. Parsons, the Drummond Company's chief engineer, was in connection with the fish.

**The Nepisiguit Real Estate and Fishing Association is composed largely of wealthy Boston men, while there are also some English members, and Simeon Jones, of St. John, is also a member. They have certain fishing rights on the Nepisiguit River and also have a club house, etc. there.**

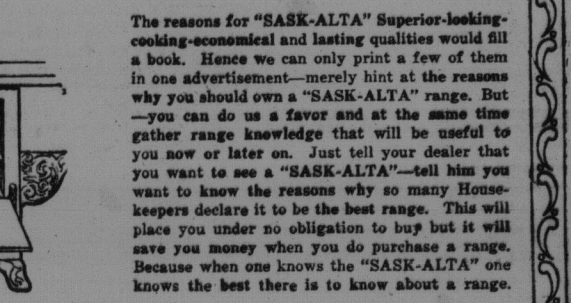
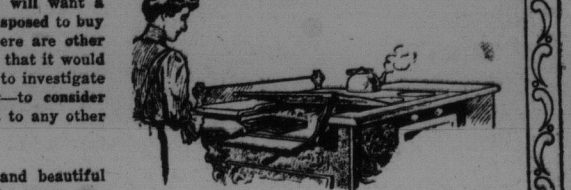

IMPERIAL STATESMAN IS A VISITOR IN ST. JOHN'S

Lord Milner Arrived in City Last Evening on Government Steamer Stanley—Addresses Canadian Club This Evening—Believes in Imperial Defence Co-operation.

Lord Milner, the Imperial statesman who is spending a few weeks in Canada, arrived in the city last evening on the government steamer Stanley. He is accompanied by E. J. Kelly and A. J. Glazebrook, of Toronto, left Halifax on Saturday evening, and spent the best part of Sunday in the Annapolis Valley. He came across the Bay on the government steamer Stanley last evening.

The Viscount and his party will visit the principal sights of interest in the city today, and will probably leave here tomorrow morning on their way to Toronto. He will not be able to proceed further west than Toronto, as the Canadian Club has made many friends in Canada during previous visits, and has received a cordial welcome in the cities he has visited this time.

At the Canadian Club luncheon he will speak on Imperial matters and in view of his service to the Empire in Egypt and South Africa, his address should be of great interest. He is a fervid reformer, and since his return from South Africa he has been a tower of strength to the Dominion party. His career has been of exceptional interest and the success he has attained has been the result of sheer ability.

Lord Milner's Career. After leaving Oxford he made his way to the Bar. Then followed three years of newspaper work. When Mr. Goschen was Chancellor of the Exchequer, Alfred Milner acted as his private secretary. In 1885 he was appointed to the Harrow division, but this was his only venture in party politics until after returning from South Africa. In recognition of services he was knighted in 1898. In 1901 he was raised to the peerage as Baron Milner, and in 1902 he was created a Viscount. Officially he is known as Viscount Milner of Saint James. The explanation of this is said to be that he had to adopt some territorial designation. His only plea is a terra at that time was a suite of chambers in St. James. Too democratic to seek prestige from county associations, he claimed title on the place where he lived.

Before leaving Halifax Lord Milner gave an interview to the papers there, in which he discussed a number of Canadian and international problems, and made some interesting remarks on the navy question. The following is a report of the interview. Asked to give his opinion on the advisability of Canada maintaining a separate navy or making a direct contribution to the Imperial one, Lord Milner wished it distinctly understood that the settlement of the question was first of all the business of Canadians, and secondly that of practical statesmen. Retired from the arena of British politics and an Englishman, it was not for him to state what should be done in the matter, but he had no objections to expressing his views in a general way.

Would Welcome Anything. Great Britain would, he said, welcome most cordially anything Canada did for Imperial defence. Speaking generally, he had always been rather badly disposed to the idea of having naval and military forces of their own. Certain it was that all the forces of the empire needed to be joined together and he hoped to see the time when such amalgamation was the common policy all over the empire. He was not against direct contribution as in a case where immediate help was wanted and Canada offered it.

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THREE ALARMS OF FIRE SATURDAY

Fire in Elliott Row Residence in Morning—Wood Pile and Two Houses Ablaze in Afternoon.

The fire department was called out to one bell alarm and two, still alarms on Saturday. In the morning No. 2 Chemical was called to Mrs. Fleming's, Elliott Row to put out a fire that had been started in a mattress.

Wm. Strachan IS IN MILL POND

Passers-by Hurried to Fairville Man's Rescue, But Arrived Too Late—No Inquest, Coroner's Decision.

William Strachan, of Fairville, aged 52, a watchman in the employ of the Partington Pulp and Paper Co., was drowned yesterday morning at eleven o'clock when he fell into the mill pond while attempting to cross from the wharf to a scow. The body was recovered by Allan Green and Wm. Linton last evening at a quarter to eight.

Exactly how the accident occurred is not known, but Walter Clinkham, Joseph Tross and Leonard Power, who were all at work in a scow, state that they saw Strachan standing on the wharf and as a joke one of them asked him if he wanted a job. After this they continued with their work until they heard loud cries for help coming from the direction of the mill pond and hurrying to the side of the scow, saw Strachan struggling about in the water, which at that point, the tide being high, was thirty-two feet deep. They at once started to rescue the ill-fated man, but before anything could be done Strachan had sunk for the last time.

Clinkham and his fellow laborers at once sounded a general alarm with the result that the rest of the men employed at the Partington Pulp and Paper mill turned out with wrappies as did several of the members of the Fairville fire department. It was not until a quarter to eight last evening that the body was found by Allan Green. When the body was brought to the surface it was secured by Wm. Linton and placed on the wharf.

Strachan left three sons, James, Alexander and William, and one daughter, Georgina, all at home. The deceased was a well known citizen and his untimely death is regretted by all. Besides a wife, he had three sons, James, Alexander and William, and one daughter, Georgina, all at home.

PIRATE RAILWAYS DEPRIVE THE I. C. R. OF ROLLING STOCK

Most Systems of Continent Have Intercolonial Cars Says F. P. Brady—Predicts Record Business in St. John.

"The Maritime Provinces are making great strides in all lines of business," said F. P. Brady, of the I. C. R. Board of Management, to a reporter yesterday.

"Few people realize the rapidity of the development going on in the east of Canada; you have to be in the transportation business to get an adequate idea of the rate of progress of the industrial and commercial development at the present time. The I. C. R. is having new cars built every day, but when they are built in thousands cars at the present time. The principal reason of the shortage is that the other railways all over the continent are being put on to our cars and using them for their own purposes instead of sending them to get them back. Of course there are always a large number of cars of all companies scattered about on other systems, and the I. C. R. is situated unfavorably in that respect. We don't get as good chances to use the cars of other roads as they have of using our rolling stock. Most of the American roads are short of cars and as it is more profitable to pay 25 cents a day than return our cars; there are some adrift which we are not likely to see for a good while."

Brady said that there was every prospect that it would be filled up before the close of summer navigation and if the I. C. R. elevator here would be in operation this winter, with grain. "For one thing," he said, "the wheat crop this year is the biggest on record by a good deal. All the elevators in Montreal should be filled before the close of summer navigation and if the railroads can bring the grain east the I. C. R. elevator here should get a share of it. I expect that there will be a great quantity of grain shipped from St. John this winter, and winter traffic generally should be heavier than last winter. Along with the I. C. R. business is still exceptionally good, and traffic of all kinds is very heavy."

Messrs. Brady and Tiffin, of the Board of Management of the I. C. R., were accompanied by G. A. Bell, and W. Cope of Ottawa, and the accountants' department of the I. C. R. at Ottawa.
