Corange Cake

1 Cupin sugar, Segr-polks, jut-e of 1 orange, 1 cupin bread-flour, 1 1-4 teaspoonfuls baking powder. Segr-whites, few grains of all.

Beat the egg-yolks till creamy, add the sugar, and blend thoroughly. Measure the orange julce and add water, if necessary, to make a half-cupful of liquid. Mix the baking powder with the flour, and add alternately to first mixture with the orange julce. Fold in the egg-whites beaten stiff. Bake in layers about five minutes in a hot oven; reduce the heat and cook more slowly till the cake is done—about fifteen minutes in all. Fut together and ice with orange frosting, or use a jelly or whippedcream filling, and sprinkle powdered sugar over the top. This cake will keep moist for several days.

ST. JOHN MARKETS THAN DOUBLE THAT MONTREAL MARKET OF PRECEDING YEAR

Final Crop Report Beyond Expectations of Most Optimistic.

TOTAL YIELD WAS 376,303,600 BUSHELS

Surplus for Export placed at 264,000,000 bushels - Acreage increased 26 per cent during 1915.

The January issue of the Census and atistic Monthly issued by the Donion Government contains the final fimate of the yield and value of madian Field Crops of 1915. These nadian Field Crops of 1915. These al returns show a market increase er previous estimates so that expecions which were formed of the alumnt harvest have been more than alized. Preliminary estimates at e end of August placed the yield of teat at 308,000,000 bushels. At the d of September this estimate was incased to 336,000,000 bushels, but the al return shows the splendid total 376,303,600 bushels which is more an double the harvest of 1914, and arly double the annual average yield

han double the harvest of 1914, and learly double the annual average yield or the five years, 1910-1914.

The official estimates of the Dominon government for the three North West provinces were in August 275-00,000 bushels, September, 304,000,000 bushels, and December, 342,948,000 bushels. The Canadian Pacific estimated in August 220,000,000 bushels, and the Western Canada Flour Mills blaced the crop at 300,000,000. "The Grain Growers' Guide," evidently more conservative, put the figure down at 112,000,000 in August, but in November jumped to an estimate of 342,000, 100.

264,000,000 Bushels for Export.

In the light of these final returns the exportable wheat surplus of Canada is now placed at 264,000,000 bushels which is more than 100,000,000 bushels greater than the whole production of 1914. It is a noticeable fact that for the first time the exportable wheat surplus of Canada is more than is ne cessary to supply the wheat deficiency of the United Kingdom. What Canada has done in 1915 by increase of acreage combined with an abundant harvest can be repeated in future, and the British Isles may reasonably feel secure in respect to a food supply within the Empire.

In wheat the increased acreage in 1915 amounted to 26 p. c. in oats there was an increase of 13 p. c., while smaller increases were also shown in barley, rye, mixed grains, fodder grain and alfalfa, while sugar beets jumped 49 p. c. There were also slight reductions in peas, beans, buckwheat, flaxseed, corn, turnips and hay. The average yield of all wheat in 1914 was 15.67 bushels per acre and 1915, 28.98 bushels, an 85 per cent. increase in production over 1914.

Unfortunately oats in 1915 commanded an average price of only thirty-four cents against eighty-three cents for wheat, and forty-eight cents for oats and one dollar, and twenty-two cents for wheat in 1914. Thus the value of the tremendous oat crop of 1915 was only \$176,894,400.00 as against \$312,569,400.00 for wheat.




