He thought that uniformity and cer-tainty of the law should be the aim of the lawyers as well as of business men, and he believed that the attitude of the profession was strongly in favor of' this movement which owed its inception and a great deal of its force to the unifring exertions of Sir J. A. M. Alkens, now governor of Manitoba. It might, however, be some years before the legislatures of all the prov-inces would be induced to enact identical legislatures of all the prov-inces would be induced to enact identical legislatures of this end. It was a question, moreover, which did not involve any political differen-ces, and no great obstacle existed to prevent its accomplishment. Much sreater difficulties had been overcome by the men whom Canada produced when the confederation of the Domin-ion was formed, and a task such as the one projected was not beyond the capacity of the men of New Brunswick

Many of the laws of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia were very similar, and but little effort should be neces-sary to make them identical, and it might be possible for the maritime provinces to lead the way in this as they had in confederation. The propositions of business men wuld always receive the earnest at-tention of any legislature, and he trusted that the body of men present would make their efforts felt in this direction.


