YEAR ENDED AUGUST 31ST, 1890.

In presenting a brief summary of the year's work—the first complete year in the present commodious building—the

ADVANTAGES

of possessing such a fine building with attractive and well furnished parlours and library, fully equipped Gymnasium and Baths, free Reading Room, easily accessible meeting and class rooms, cannot be over-estimated.

They should do much to secure for the Association that sympathy and support necessary to the vigorous prosecution of its work, and the strengthening and development of its agencies along Association lines, and attract to its privileges and bring under its influence the young men of our City, for whose welfare the organization exists; and for whom it provides a place of resort where every effort is made to exclude

EVIL INFLUENCES,

encouragement given and opportunities afforded for the development of the fourfold man, the Physical, Social, Mental and Spiritual. Notwithstanding the

During the first four months the Association was without a General Secretary, then at the time of the appointment of the present Secretary, Mr. Ed. Willans, the Assistant Secretary, received and accepted a call to become General Secretary at Brockville. During his (Mr. Willans,) long term of faithful, official service, he had gained the confidence and respect of the managers and members. His departure was much regretted, and he carried with him the good will of all for his future welfare.

Mr. J. Doig, who for sixteen months occupied the position of Physical Director, retired in May to re-enter business. Mr. Doig was an efficient Instructor, had the esteem and confidence of the Directors, and was popular among the members.

THE WORK

of the year presents no striking feature of novelty in method or organization. Attention has been given to the development of agencies, which already existed, and to the carrying on of the work through the standing and other committees, whose reports are here presented. The fact that this is a work for and by young men has been recognized, and over 100 have served on committees. Efforts have also been made to interest and educate the active members by holding

CONFERENCE MEETINGS,

at which short, suggestive papers, presenting various phases of the work have been read by experienced workers; also by initiating young men into lines of work for which they are best fitted, and by the

WORKERS' TRAINING CLASS,

lately formed for Systematic Bible Study, and for the study of a course of lessons on "Personal Work," issued by the International Committee. Too much attention cannot be given to the preparation of workers, and it is proposed to form other classes for this purpose.

THE CHARACTER OF THE WORK

is largely preventive, and knowing that the inexperience of youth causes many to fall an easy prey to the subtle temptation presented, the Young Men's Christian Association seeks to surround young men with helpful influence,

and to supply healthful recreation and occupation for leisure hours. In this special connection the

JUNIOR DEPARTMENT

is bright with promise. It has done much, and by careful management its future will be more useful. These juniors will graduate into full members, and from them will come undoubtedly workers, directors and contributors.

Every class of young men come within the sphere of our work, and for some classes much more can be done than has already been done in bringing before them the meetings and advantages of the Association.

THE FIELD

of our labour, which is wide, has included a large number of strangers from other countries as well as from Canada. These have been met and dealt with according to their circumstances. Some have been directed to boarding houses; a few helped to employment; others have been advised and counselled. Many of these being visited in their loneliness have realized that through the Association they have found sympathy, friendship and help. The question might occur: What becomes of these strangers? Some we lose sight of altogether, some obtain employment in the City, from among them are those who become members, workers and attenders at the meetings; others only come to the city temporarily, and failing in their search of employment, pass on to some other city where, when possible, we follow them by letter to the Association in that place. The students attending the Normal School have had the use of the limited privileges without charge and the full privileges at reduced rates. Receptions have also been held for them, and students have testified to the blessings and advantages received.

THE READING ROOM

has been much used and seems to be thoroughly appreciated by the young men who frequent it. It is well stocked with newspapers and magazines.

THE LIBRARY,

which is specially for the use of members, is supplied with leading magazines and periodicals to the number of 40, also with over 1,000 volumes for reference and circulation. The Book Reception held in the fall did much to increase the efficiency and popularity of this department. A good library

of well selected volumes is invaluable, and we trust that the funds in the future will admit of an annual appropriation for the purchase of books. A few gifts of books have been received from friends, which we gratefully acknowledge.

LECTURES AND ENTERTAINMENTS.

Several were held, but considering the interesting and instructive nature of them, the appreciation shown so far as attendance is concerned was not what it should have been. The

EDUCATIONAL

classes in Shorthand and French were not up to the standard of some former years as regards attendance and interest. An effort will be made to increase their usefulness and also to add other subjects.

THE DEBATING SOCIETY

was carried on with varying success through the season, two public debates were held in which a great deal of interest was taken; the Society has done much to promote readiness of speech and to instruct the members in current topics.

SOCIAL

While the home-like appearance of the rooms, and the cordiality of the Reception Committee on duty each evening, do much to foster this side of our Association life, special effort has been made in this direction, and several social meetings and receptions have been held. At these gatherings—which have been instrumental in bringing several into the Association—the Ladies of the Auxiliary have by their presence and bounteous provision done much to contribute to the sociability and good will manifested. At the New Year's reception nearly 400 registered.

PHYSICAL

The Gymnasium is still a source of attraction and benefit. With its facilities we are able to control to advantage the hours for recreation of many young men throughout the winter, but, we fail to hold them by providing for them during the summer. Is it too much to hope that the time is not far distant when one of the agencies will be an athletic ground? "Out of door sports, under the influences of our organizations, are unquestionably

a means of great good. No live association will fail to make permanent provision for this work.

A few pleasant outings have been held on Saturday afternoons; by the kind invitations of Mr. and Mrs. P. Larmonth, to Ercildoune; Mr. and Mrs. Heath, to Britannia; Mr. and Mrs. W. S. O'Dell, to their camp on the Rideau River, and a yacht trip down the Ottawa by Mr. F. P. Bronson. A moonlight excursion was also held; over 500 members and friends availed themselves of the trip on the steamer "Empress."

RELIGIOUS.

The spiritual work is the highest and chief of all our agencies, and to this all others converge, the primary object being to quicken the religious life of members and bring young men to a knowledge of Jesus Christ as their personal Saviour. 311 meetings of a religious character have been held in the rooms with a total attendance of 10,869.

The Universal Week of Prayer for young men in November was observed, a meeting being held each evening, conducted by ministers of the city and others.

The outside work has included services each Sunday at the Hospital, Protestant Home for the Aged, the Jail, open air meetings during the Summer on Sunday, at Pooley's Bridge and at the Post Office. After the latter, short pointed after-meetings have been held at the Rooms, and here many have decided to follow Christ.

The Invitation and Tract Committee have been energetic and aggressive. 21,000 were distributed, besides 27,800 invitation slips given out on the streets, in the Hotels, and other places frequented by young men.

Many individual cases have been dealt with of young men seeking spiritual advice and desirous of leaving the paths of sin, to walk in the better way leading to Life.

MISSIONARY EFFORT.

As an Association we have not taken any steps to help in a work which is demanding the attention of all Associations, as expressed in a regular letter from the International Committee. In the good providence

of God, a great door and effectual is opened to our Associations for a blessed work among young men in Foreign Mission lands. Missionaries of the field appeal eloquently for help. The International Committee has now calls from Missionaries for General Secretaries for five cities. Cannot we do something systematically to help in the work.

CONVENTIONS.

The Association was represented at the District Convention held at Brockville in November by the President and several members. The Provincial Convention at Brantford, in February, was attended by the General Secretary, the Physical Instructor, and three active members.

THE WOMEN'S AUXILIARY

has again rendered valuable assistance by their general oversight of the interior arrangements, the receptions and the decorating, and supplying a handsome bookcase for the room set apart for the juniors.

FINANCES.

From the aggressive character of the work it cannot be self supporting. While a large portion of the expenses are met by the membership fees and subscriptions, we are also dependent upon the public for a portion of the income necessary to maintain the work in efficiency. We feel sure that if it were more fully understood, a more liberal response would be the result. The year closes with a deficiency of \$865.70. At least \$4,000.00 will be required to meet the expenses of the year upon which we are entering.

We tender our thanks to those who have heartily and liberally supported the work in the past, and we look for their increasing interest and support for the future.

"But this I say, He that soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly, and he which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully. Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give, not grudgingly or of necessity, for God loveth a cheerful giver. And God is able to make all grace abound toward you, that ye, always having all sufficiency in all things, may abound to every good work."—2 Cor. 9 : 6-8.

Several changes occurred in the directorship during the year. Two valuable members of the Board removed from the city, viz : Mr. R. A. McLelland and Mr. C. McDiarmid. Their warm interest in Association work will be brought to bear in other places. One of the most interested and faithful members of the Board and Association was removed through death. The place of this faithful member and worker, Mr. S. S. Slinn, will not be soon filled.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.—NAME.

This Society shall be called "THE OTTAWA YOUNG MEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION."

ARTICLE II.—OBJECTS.

The objects of this Association shall be the development of Christian character and activity in its members, and the religious, mental, social and physical improvement of young men in general.

ARTICLE III.—MEANS.

The means employed to attain these objects shall be the missionary influence of the members in their daily lives; the maintenance of classes for Bible study; Gospel and prayer meetings; tract distribution; a library and public reading rooms; educational classes; lectures and talks, with social and other agencies of a proper character.

ARTICLE IV.—BASIS.

This Association adopts as the basis of all its proceedings those fundamental principles of Christianity on which all *Evangelical churches are agreed, and will never admit any discussion of those matters of faith and polity on which such churches differ.

ARTICLE V.—MEMBERSHIP.

SEC. 1. The members of this Association shall consist of three classes, Active, Associate and Honorary.

SEC. 2. *Active*.—Any young man who is a communicant in an Evangelical church shall be eligible for active membership. Active members only shall have the right to vote and hold office.

SEC. 3. *Associate*.—Any young man of good moral character shall be eligible for associate membership. Associate members shall have the same privileges as active members, except those of voting and holding office.

SEC. 4. *Honorary*.—Any person who has rendered essential service to the Association may be elected an honorary member.

*The word Evangelical is to be understood as defined by the International Convention at Portland in 1869: "And we hold these churches to be Evangelical, which, maintaining the Holy Scriptures to be the only infallible rule of faith and practice, do believe in the Lord Jesus Christ (the only begotten of the Father, King of Kings, Lord of Lords, in whom dwelleth the fulness of the Godhead bodily, and who was made sin for us, though knowing no sin, bearing our sins in His own body on the tree), as the only name under Heaven given among men whereby we must be saved from everlasting punishment."

SEC. 5. *Life*.—Membership for life may be secured by the payment of fifty dollars at one time.

SEC. 6. *City Pastors*.—Resident Pastors of Evangelical churches shall, by virtue of their office, be members of this association.

SEC. 7. *Election*.—New members may be proposed at any business meeting of the Board of Managers, and elected by a two-thirds vote of those present. The voting shall be open, unless objection be made, when a ballot shall be taken. Three negative votes shall defeat any applicant.

SEC. 8. *Fees*.—The annual membership fee shall be two dollars, payable in advance, to be computed from the first day of the month of admission, and annually thereafter the payment of this fee shall entitle to all the general privileges of the Association, subject to such regulations as may from time to time be laid down by the Board, who shall also have the power to charge an additional sum for any special privileges that may involve special expense.

ARTICLE VI.—OFFICERS.

SEC. 1.—The Board of Managers of this Association shall consist of a Board of twenty-one Directors, not more than one-third of whom shall be members of any one denomination, and they shall elect a President, a Vice-President, a Treasurer and a Secretary, from among themselves as hereafter provided.

SEC. 2. *Powers*.—The Board of Managers shall have the supervision and control of the affairs and property of the Association. They shall adopt such rules and by-laws not inconsistent with this Constitution as they may deem expedient. They shall have power to employ a General Secretary, who shall be a communicant of an Evangelical church, and such other agents as may be necessary. They shall fill up vacancies occurring through death, resignation or discipline.

SEC. 3. *How Elected*.—At the Annual Election there shall be chosen by ballot from the members of the Association, seven Directors who shall hold office for three years. At the first Annual Election held after the adoption of this section there shall be elected seven (7) Directors who shall hold office for three (3) years, seven (7) others who shall hold office for two (2) years, and seven (7) others who shall hold office for one (1) year. (The years to terminate with the financial year of the Association.) The Board of Directors shall submit a nomination of seven Directors to replace those retiring, at least one month before the date of election, and other nominations from the Association may be received at the Annual Meeting.

SEC. IV.—The Board of Directors at their first meeting succeeding the annual election shall elect by ballot one of their member to be President

ARTICLE VII.—ANNUAL MEETING.

The Annual Meeting of the Association shall take place on the second Tuesday in May of each year, to receive the Report of the Board of Managers, to elect seven members to serve on the Board of Directors, and to transact such other business as may come before it.

ARTICLE VIII.—DISCIPLINE.

SEC. 1. *Members.*—If any case of immorality or misconduct in a member be communicated to the Board of Managers in writing over a *bona-fide* signature, they shall investigate it, and take such action as they may deem expedient, provided such member shall have the opportunity of defending himself before them.

SEC. 2. *Officers.*—In case of misconduct or neglect of duty in a member of the Board or a Standing Committee, the majority of the Board at any monthly meeting may declare the office of such offender vacant.

Absence from three regular meetings in succession without excuse shall be considered neglect of duty. The General Secretary shall report to the Board all such cases.

SEC. 3.—Any member of the Board changing his denominational connection shall be deemed to have resigned, and his place shall either be left open or filled by one from the denomination which he left.

ARTICLE IX.—CONSTITUTION.

This Constitution, with the exception of Section 2 of Article V., may be altered or amended at the annual or any special meeting of the Association : provided such alteration has been submitted to the Board in writing one month previous, and the members notified that it is to be acted upon.

No alterations shall be valid unless passed by a vote of two-thirds of the active members present.


