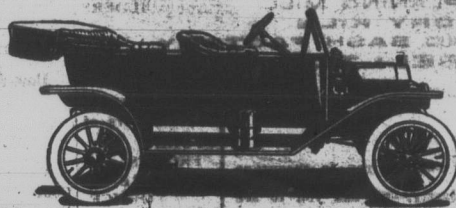
Rev. Wm. McLeod of New Carlisle preached here on Sunday afternoon at 2:15 o'clock.

## BASE BALL GAME AT AMQUI DISASTROUS.

**Bathurst Lost to Strong Team At Amqui in Unfortunate Game.**

(From the Gloucester Northern Light)

After their splendid victory over the "Bankers" of Newcastle on Saturday last, the Bathurst "Clippers" left for Amqui with hopes of victory, only to return on Monday with a sad story to tell. From what can be gathered from the players, the worst trouble was the unfair decisions of the umpire, together with the fact that three members of the Bathurst team forgot that they were with gentlemen and engaged in a game that required all their faculties, in a condition that made them entirely unfit for the positions they occupied. It is most unfortunate that these three players should by their weakness for the cup that inebriates not only lose the first foreign game, but worse than that, give the people of Amqui the impression that Bathurst young men are overfond of strong drink, and everyone interested in clean sport is looking to Manager Veniot to take such action in the matter as will hereafter prevent a repetition of the disgraceful occurrence. It is expected that the guilty players will be severely reprimanded and given one more chance, or else summarily suspended from all foreign games.

The game at Amqui was called at sharp 2 o'clock, with a very large attendance, a large number of visitors being present from Campbellton and outside points. Bathurst went to bat first, and Matthews hit a two bagger. A. Lavigne hit a low one and reached first safely. L. Veniot struck a dandy high one over left field and Matthews scored. Degraze went out on a short one and Lavigne died on a double play, and Veniot was put out on third when McInerney came to bat.

Amqui then came up, and two fanned out. The next man hit a two bagger over home, and the fourth man up got him home on a grounder that passed shortstop. The next man fanned out.

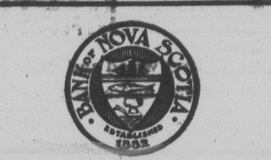
Bathurst came up with McInerney at the bat, and he got to first on a good one past third, but was called out on what Bathurst claimed was a double balk. Manager Veniot protested the decision, but the umpire insisted on it and Mac had to walk in. "Shap" and Harold White both hit short and were put out.

Bathurst went to field in very bad humor on account of the most unfair decision of the umpire, and when Lavigne started to pitch in, it was soon evident that he was off his play. The Amqui men batted him all over the field and when the third man was out had made ten runs in the one inning. The umpire again got in some of his strange decisions, double plays on two occasions only getting one man out each time. If the decisions had been fair, not more than five would have been marked for Amqui.

Bathurst made no score this inning, the boys being caught on the bases by some clever field work of the Amqui men, coupled with wrong decisions of the umpire. Crofoot was now put in the box, and shut out nearly every man that stood before him for the rest of the game. Only three of the Amqui men touched the ball in these seven innings, and they hit such good cracks that two came in. Another score came to Amqui as the result of an overthrow, and these three are all they could do in the seven innings.

Bathurst only got two men over the plate during the rest of the game, and these seven innings were a very fine exhibition of the game. Shap Veniot made a good catch at short stop, putting three men out by quick play and receiving great applause from the grand stand. The Amqui men are splendid fielders and never make an overthrow or pass a ball, so that the weakness of their pitcher, who was batted freely, was amply made up in each inning.

Amqui has signified their willingness to play the home boys a return match in a short time, and there is no doubt that the game will be an exciting one.

## PRACTICALLY ADMITS CHARGES OF GRAFT

Commissioner Pringle Tells J. K. Pinder That His Own Evidence Convicts Him

Fredricton, July 14—A story of graft so bare-faced and so poorly concealed as to be almost incredibly brought to a conclusion yesterday afternoon when the inquiry into the affairs of the Southampton Railway was adjourned.

The outstanding fact of the whole miserable affair is that a double subsidy was claimed and paid on the railway, the cost of which cannot be brought within thousands of dollars of the limit required, even by placing the most generous interpretation upon the claims of those who benefitted by the transaction.

David J. Brown the engineer in charge of the construction work has already admitted his share in the preparation of the padded estimates. Yesterday J. K. Pinder, M.P.P., the chief owner of the road, also admitted as reluctantly but as definitely, that he was a party to the transaction. As he was the man who profited most substantially by the receipt of the double subsidy, his admission hardly came as a surprise.

Each witness called only served to make the case worse for the defence. Monday morning their own witness, J. J. Taylor, C. E., helped to establish the figures submitted by the independent engineers and in several cases he was not prepared to make as generous an allowance as they had given.

The evidence of the local manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia was even more disastrous. Mr. Pinder had sworn that the public aid received was \$20,000 less than the amount the railway cost him. The bank man swore that the funds advanced by the bank were fully met by the subsidies and guaranteed bonds. He did not know of any other funds which went into the railway and he could not say that even this amount had been expended for railway purposes.

Mr. Pinder's method of taking the cash from the bank in large amounts, and making his payments in cash made this impossible. Mr. Pinder rebuilt one of his mills while the railway construction was in progress, but the bank manager could not say that railway funds had been used for the purpose.

The proceedings were brought to a close by Commissioner Pringle with an address at the close of which he said:

"The expert engineers who have been of such great assistance in enabling me to arrive at an estimate of the value of the road."

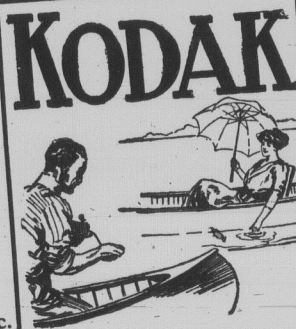

## STEAMER CANADA RUNS ON THE ROCKS

Bound From Montreal For Campbellton Goes Ashore In Dense Fog

Montreal, Que., July 15.—On a jagged reef that juts into the St. Lawrence river four miles below Cape Chatte—75 miles east of Father Point—the coasting steamer Canada, owned by the Gaspe and Bay Chaleur Shipping Company, of Montreal, is reported today. She ran ashore there at four o'clock yesterday morning in a dense fog that enveloped the river. She is in a bad position, and there is a prospect she will prove a total loss. All of her passengers have been landed at Cape Chatte. There they will remain until Wednesday afternoon, when they will be taken off from the little hamlet where they are marooned by the Gaspean, sister ship to the Canada. The Gaspean will leave Campbellton this afternoon, and ought to be at Cape Chatte if it goes well, late Wednesday afternoon.

The Canada, which was on her way from Campbellton to Montreal, was creeping through the fog toward Cape Chatte yesterday morning. She was in a very bad position. The little ship of 800 tons was only half a mile from the land when the accident occurred.

The Lord Strathcona, the big Government tug from Quebec, was sent to the scene of the stranding yesterday. She will make an attempt to pull the ship off the rocks today, but the attempt will likely prove a failure. This morning Mr. H. Blouin, the manager of the Gaspe and Bay Chaleur Line received a wire from his cousin Captain P. Blouin, the commander of the coaster. The message was as follows: "Ashore at Cape Chatte, had position, will ship 50 boxes of fresh salmon by rail via Matane. Passengers safe, and will wait for the Gaspean."

Cape Chatte where the Canada is on the reef is an isolated spot 75 miles east of Father Point. The nearest railway point is Matane but that is twenty-six miles from the spot. The passengers would have been compelled to take that long drive across the country but for the decision of the Captain to wait for the arrival of the sister ship on Wednesday. As it is they will have three days on the sunny shore of the river in addition to the water landing.

When the Canada sailed from Montreal on her trip on July 1st last she carried about twenty-five first class passengers. How many of these are on the ship on the return voyage is not known at the office here. Frequently the tourists stop over a trip at the Gulf.

Among those who sailed on July 1 when she cleared from Montreal for the voyage to the Gulf were Mr. and Mrs. Taylor, Montreal; Misses Corine, Eugene and Georgina Lemoine, Montreal; Mr. M. T. Dewey and wife, Montpelier, Vt.; Mr. and Mrs. W. Lidington and two children, Ottawa; Mr. Joseph Lafrancois, Montreal, two priests from this city who boarded the vessel at Quebec, but whose names are not known here; Mr. Pelletier, Montreal, and Mr. and Mrs. C. T. Thivierge, of Quebec. Whether all of these were on the vessel when she stranded is not known here, as the list for the trip is on board with the purser.

The Canada was valued at \$50,000, and is insured for two thirds of her estimated worth. She ran formerly between Boston and St. Pierre Miquelon. She is a steel steamer built in 1898. In addition to her first and second class passengers she did a large freight trade. The larger part of this consisted of fish. Mr. T. W. Windsor, of this city, was but this morning trying to discover if the \$5,000 worth of lobsters he had on board were lost or not. The crew were insured, but, as he put it, "I prefer the lobsters to the money just now."

The Canada has had hard luck so far this season. She encountered a furious hurricane in the Bay of Chaleur, and was damaged considerably. Then she ran aground in the river and had to be put in the dry dock at Quebec for a few hours. Now she is in a bad position, with the possibility of proving a total loss.
