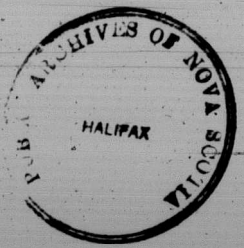

Communicated.

Dear Sir,—

Your late prophesy has already
proved too true. The Roman Cath-
olics have really forced upon us a
political contest with them, and one
which in its results cannot but teach
them a lesson of good behavior for
the future unless Plutarch, like they,
still burden their hearts against all
evidence and rush headlong into dis-
graceful defeat. Just consider the
essence of the resolutions passed by
them at their Mass Meeting on a late
Sunday in St. John in which their
superior holiness and self-alleged en-
lightenment is paraded with an ef-
frontery worthy of Romanism during
the days of its Inquisition. The
first on the list is "That Catholics re-
gard a system of education divorced
from religion as fraught with dan-
ger to the faith and morals of their
children, to the perpetration of free
institutions and good Government, and
to the well-being of society," and
seven such resolutions were prelu-
ded by an address from their Bishop
in the forenoon, in thorough union with
them, and in a tone of martyrdom

to Protestant supremacy. When he
says that "the Catholics of this Pro-
vince ask no more than was conceded
to the Protestant minority in Quebec"
he may possibly maintain it to be
true, but not certainly the truth in
question. The clothes horse in my
kitchen is sound and well-jointed, but
should I by correspondence with the
Bishop sell the said horse for \$100,
warranting the same as sound in
frame, feet and joints, etc., he would,
on its reception at his stable, be very
apt to denounce me as a swindler,
and yet when he states the above he
lays himself open to a charge of the
same nature, for it certainly demands
a great strain on human charitableness
to give him the credit of igno-
rance or obtuseness of intellect. Is
there any parallel between the two
positions he advances? We certainly
can't see it. Are not the Quebec
National School Books framed for
the exclusive use of Catholics and
pregnant with dogmas peculiar to the
Roman Catholic Religion, and to the
study of which in school they dare
not attempt to compel the Protest-
ant youth of any part of the British
Empire. The Bishop may call that
a concession, which implies the Cath-
olic right to hold or concede at plea-
sure, but which we deny as a conces-
sion of that kind but the inalienable
right of every freeman. One stand
is entirely different. We embody no
denominational opinions in our
school books and we do not feel called
upon to concede one iota of the
of the system to please any faction,
nor will we, at government expense,
compel any of our nation's youth to
be educated to the belief of any de-
nominational dogmas. And yet for
again they openly call us intolerant.

Again, we place the Bible (either in
its Catholic or Protestant version) in
the school house merely to be read
without note or comment, and that
too only when District authority
thinks it proper. Whereas Bishop
Sweeney says he is willing in certain
districts to adopt the new school sys-
tem "provided the Bible is not read."
And yet they call ours the "Gospel
Schools" and theirs the place of Re-
ligious education. Well they are
"welcome to the name" but we think
they have in the Quebec religious ideas
as well as in the way of looking
at things. If to read and respect
God's holy word to man is by man a
Gospel act, and to keep out of school
God's word is a religious act, then
certainly we prefer to come under the
category of the former to the latter.
Another idea of the Bishop is that
"without a Christian education you
cannot have conscience." Why did
not he all to conscience, nose, ears,
legs and lungs? Conscience is much
an attribute of humanity as these are
members of the human body. Yes,
Bishop, keep out the Bible and some-
one would laugh at you or leave you for
a wiser teacher—give them the Bible
and they will soon see Paul versus
Sweeney on the article of conscience.
It might occupy too much space to re-
view even slightly the seven resolutions
of the great Sunday meeting.
Like Priest, like people, is true of it
—the heresies about morals, free
institutions, good government, etc.,
by a class of men who are far from
being the most respected of the citi-
zens, who have been in open rebel-
lion against the British throne—few
of whom are competent to judge as
to true freedom and all of whom are
crouched with a Church renowned for
its intolerance and charged in the
history of every nation in Europe
with leaving wars of extermination
of human beings in the name of re-
ligion; a church at whose hands the
blood of our forefathers is required,
and a church which has always been
the bane of our own political life in
this County, and at the hands of one
of its votaries, last summer, was a
public official knocked down on the
highway because he did not do hom-
age to their idols. Let no one think
that such a cowardly was condemned
by his priest for such brutality. In-
stead of that it is reported generally
that he had the audacity and insolence
to demand the discharge from office
the assaulted man from his superior
officer on the plea that said official

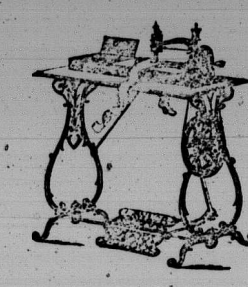
