HEAVY INCREASE IN ASSESSMENT.
Ratepayers Must Contribute More Funds to Provide Money For Town Purposes.

A meeting of the town council was held last evening in the town council chamber, His Worship Mayor Murray in the Chair with Councillors Bisset, Jamieson, Matthews, Ingram, McKay and Campbell present.

Minutes previous meeting read and confirmed.

A communication from the Street Commissioner Chas. Parker, asking for an increase of 25c per day in his pay was referred to Public Property and Streets Committee, as was also an application from G. T. Scott for permission to install a gasoline tank on Roseberry street.

Three applications for licenses to conduct a barber shop, livery stable and a sales stable were referred to Police and License Committee.

The usual monthly departmental accounts were ordered paid.

On motion it was decided to lease the Campbellton smallpox hospital to the County Board of Health. Rent \$10.00 per month.

Councillors Jamieson reported upon the three petitions which had been referred to his committee in which street improvements, water sewerage and light were asked for by the petitioners. He recommended the council as a whole to deal with them, the matter involved the expenditure of a large amount of money. Report was received and ordered laid on table to be taken up by council at a future meeting.

Councillor Ingram, Chairman of the Finance Committee, in bringing up the matter of the assessment for the coming year addressed the council as follows:

"As the time is at hand when we must make the necessary financial provision for the carrying on of the various departments of the town service for another year, it becomes my duty to lay before you some facts for your consideration.

In looking over the town's financial report for the past fiscal year we find that the amount of the assessment was \$50,000 whereas the amount actually expended has far exceeded that sum. In making our appropriations for the current year we find that in addition to the amounts required in the ordinary course of Departmental Appropriations, we must make provision for increased appropriations for several departments of the town service.

(1) An increase of \$5,000 is required for School purposes, making the total for that department \$24,000, which will be about one third of the total assessment of the town.

(2) The Public Charities department, ever since the town fire had been entirely provided for out of the balance of the Relief Funds then on hand, and consequently no assessment for that department has been required up to the present. That account however had entirely disappeared several months ago and hence an appropriation for the support of the poor will have to be made for the current year.

(3) An extension to our sewerage system, to relieve sewerage congestion, which if it is estimated will cost \$3,000 will also require to be provided for.

(4) An increase in the annual appropriation for Street Lighting, will have to be made, as that service has

PRIZES WILL BE AWARDED.
Committee in Charge of Fall Fair Are Perfecting Arrangements.

The various committees of the "Soldiers' Memorial Hospital Aid" are making full arrangements for a successful "Fair" in October.

Prizes will be awarded for the best exhibits of each variety of vegetable and fruit, in canned fish, meat, fruit and vegetables, in dairy produce, in crocheting, knitting, embroidery and plain sewing.

The women all over the country are asked to send in as many exhibits as possible to make the Fair a success in every way.

It has been running at a loss for several years past, and besides a further extension of the street lighting equipment will be required, in order to light parts of the town not heretofore provided for. The revenue from the Electric Light plant will be reduced this year to the extent of \$10,000, owing to the discontinuance of its shell factory.

(5) The Fire Department will require a greatly increased appropriation, owing to extensive repairs which will require to be made to the present dilapidated fire station and to provide accommodation for the town horses and the fire and street equipment.

(6) An appropriation of upwards of \$2,000 is also required to meet the expenditures incurred by the Local Board of Health, acting under the authority of the Provincial Board of Health, or Provincial Government, in connection with the recent influenza epidemic. No appropriation will be required to be made by the town for that department in future however, as the County Board of Health now embraces the Town, in its jurisdiction.

(7) Salaries of Town Officials, and employees had to be increased, in keeping with the higher salaries now paid for similar work in other departments of the public service, consequent upon the increased cost of living.

(8) A certain amount of revenue will be derived from the recent tax put upon transient laborers and Livery Motor Cars, which will in a measure

It will be remembered that Capt. Mowat died of wounds on Jan. 27th at Beznik, Russia. He was wounded on the 24th.

WAR BETWEEN JAPAN AND UNITED STATES NOT LIKELY, SAYS SHUI. Tokio, July 23.—(By the Associated Press)—Newspaper reports of an address delivered to the Tokio press today by Viscount Ishii, ambassador to the United States, who recently returned to Japan, quote the ambassador as saying that some Japanese seemed to feel that war might break out between Japan and the United States over the Chinese question, but that to him such a thing was inconceivable. He said all that war would do would be to entail great losses upon both countries.

The ambassador is further quoted as telling the newspaper organizations that he believed the American's desired to develop China in co-operation with Japan. The reports added that he would like the Japanese to stick to their proposal for racial equality.

MARITIME BOARD OF TRADE. The Maritime Board of Trade will meet this year in Moncton, August 30th. AUSTRIAN EMPIRE IS IN A BAD STATE. Hundreds of Thousands May Die of Famine During Coming Winter.

Vienna, July 24.—(By The Associated Press.)—The new terms of the Austrian Peace Treaty are making no special impression on the general public. The newspapers, however, remark that the world is still attempting to treat Austria as a great state, instead of one which has lost five-sixths of her territory and been reduced from a great Empire of 55,000,000 people to 5,000,000, who are facing a winter in which hundreds of thousands are sure to die of famine and cold.

Dr. Karl Renner, the German-Austrian Chancellor and head of the peace delegation which visited St. Germain, in an interview published here says: "We are invited to answer American duty—that is, we have the option of shooting ourselves or being shot. Within the next ten days the Austrian delegates must furnish proofs that Austria is willing to pay, with assets which are non-existent."

Dr. Alfred Treychl, managing director of the Anglo-Austrian Bank, said today to the correspondent: "Since the war Austria has been stripped gradually of her possessions, until she is now deprived of what other countries consider necessities of life, as she is without food and coal. The only solution for our people is emigration."

"With a good reserve of possibly three hundred million crowns we are expected to redeem bank notes in foreign countries totalling from five to seven billions, and a war loan of possibly half a billion, mostly held in Germany. Of forty-one billion bank notes printed in the Empire, we now hold from five to seven billion."

"Whatever the peace terms, the probably will not be executed, as any commission sent here to supervise their execution will discover that we can do none."

SOMEbody SHOULD BE ASKED TO RESIGN For Failure to Have Canada Well Represented in London Parade.

Montreal, July 24.—"Whoever is responsible for the miserable display in London which almost cut Canada out of the great victory parade should be asked to resign," the Montreal Star states in an editorial today.

LINERS TO CROSS IN FOUR DAYS Will Have Crew of 1,000 and Capacity for 3,000 Passengers.

Washington, July 24.—Two gigantic ocean liners larger than any ships now afloat, and destined to cross the Atlantic in four days are to be built by the shipping board. They will be 1,000 feet long, 100 feet wide, and will be equipped for use as emergency destroyers in the event of war.

Announcement was made today by the shipping board that the ships had been completed and that they will be tried in the near future. It is proposed to provide a special terminal for them at Long Beach, Long Island.

The ships which are to be built, are the question of the many reports that will be given to the public. The first ship is to be named the 'Titanic' and the second the 'Titanic II'. The crew will number 1,000 officers and men and the ships will be of the latest building type with a cruising radius of 10,000 miles. They will enable them to complete a round trip on the Atlantic without loading fuel overseas, on which will be driven by the strength of 110,000 horsepower.

BAN LIFTED FROM NEW BRUNSWICK AS RESULT OF ACTION. The quarantine ban against New Brunswick and travellers returning from New Brunswick, going into the United States, without first requiring a certificate of successful vaccination within twelve months, has been lifted according to word received yesterday afternoon by Dr. William F. Roberts, minister of health for this province.

The removing of the regulation was decided upon following a scheme submitted to the Washington authorities by Hon. Dr. Roberts whereby all passengers or travellers coming into New Brunswick from Nova Scotia or proceeding through this province into the United States from Nova Scotia must show a certificate of successful vaccination. An order from the bureau of health to this effect is published elsewhere in the Telegraph.

The Ban Lifted. Since word went forth to the effect that New Brunswick was quarantined from the United States by an order issued by Surgeon-General Blue of Washington, daily telegraphic communications have been exchanged between the minister of health of this province and the American official with the result that the following telegrams were received yesterday by Dr. Roberts:

Washington, D. C. July 24, 1919. William F. Roberts, Minister of Health, New Brunswick. In view of measures taken by New Brunswick government as indicated in your telegram July 23, United States public health service is agreeable to suspension of vaccination regulation against travellers from New Brunswick to the United States and is taking action accordingly.

BLUE, Surgeon-General, Nova Scotia, Provt. In conjunction with the above telegram came another to the health bureau from a member of the Nova Scotia government as follows: Halifax, N. S. July 21, 1919. Hon. W. F. Roberts, Minister of Health, New Brunswick. I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your telegram of July 21, and in reply to inform you that the Nova Scotia government is in agreement with the suspension of the vaccination regulation against travellers from New Brunswick to the United States.
