The mob at first went to the house of of Mine Superintendent Drinnen, and assaulted him and his wife, firing a number of shots in the air to intimidate them. Drinnen recognized one of the men as J. W. Morrison and he was later arrested.

The mob at first went to the house of boilers and fans, forcibly entered houses, taking men from their beds, threatened women, drove the men to a distance of eight miles with clubs and stones. Some of the men were quite seriously injured. The lives of the men were threatened if they returned to this district.

Three important arrests were made. As soon as the provincial police at Fernie, under Chief McMullen, heard of the trouble, they went to the mine post-haste. Later a special train was made up and went as far as Morrissey, bringing back the men who had been driven out. Their names are J. Hunt, F. Spence, T. Evans, E. Tasmer, W. Dupree and G. Serimo. Some of them were seriously hurt. It is expected that several arrests of the suspects will be made at Fernie and the Attornev-General's department at Victoria has been notified.

Man's Superior Brain.

London, March 23.-Prof. Marchand, of Marburg, has accumulated the largest number of brain weights ever published. He gives a thorough analysis of 1,169 cases.

He says he finds the average weight of the brain at birth of a male child is 360 grammes and of a female child 353 grammes.

Although Prof. Marchand shows a certain relation between stature and brain weight, the relation is very inconstant. He concludes that the lesser weight of a woman's brain is not alone dependent on her smaller stature, as a comparison of both sexes of the same stature shows that the male brain is invariably heavier. In a growing child, until it reached a stature of 70 centimeters, the brain weight increases proportionately with the body length, irrespective of age or sex. After that the male brain begins to outstrip the female.

The maximum brain weight is usually attained about the twentieth year, when the male's average is about 1,400 grammes. The female maximum is usually reached about the seventeenth year, when the average is 1,275



CAME AS A SURPRISE. London, March 23.-The news of President Castro's resignation came as complete surprise to the people here, but London is deserted by diplomats and the event is little discussed. Until last Saturday afternoon President Castro's continued tenure of office was taken as a matter of course. In fact the reported hitches in the negotiations with the powers were privately attributed here to President Castro's endeavor to make another bid for popular favor. Some months ago the possible deposition of the Venezuelan affair was discussed at the foreign office as a serious objection to making terms with Venezuela with nothing but Presibut since then the officials here were inclined to believe that his position was well established.

CREATES UNCERTAINTY. Berlin, March 23 .- The feeling in official quarters is rather one of regret than otherwise, because President Castro's resignation creates uncertainty regarding the conditions that were understood during the unfinished negotiations at Washington. A declaration from his successor that the terms will be fulfilled is reported here. The official mind declines to consider the contingency that the payments under the protocols may be defaulted or the settlement repudiated. On the contrary it assumes that the new Venezuelan executive will stand by President Cas-





The Dominion Government should not lend itself to this deception. It looks like a cunning scheme to rehabilitate the finances of the Industrial Exhibition at the public expense; and it would be an injustice to expose the London, Ottawa, Winnipeg and other exhibitions to subsidized competition. Paris, March 23 .- The senate was crowded to overflowing Saturday afternoon in expectation that the discussion of the budget would bring out speeches from Premier Combes on the separation of church and state, and from Senator Clemenceau, on the Vatican's authority over the clergy. ing the early hours Senator Delpech (Radical-Socialist), severely arraigned the Concordat, and demanded its denunciation. In so doing he traced the history of the Concordat, declaring it had become a "worm-eaten edifice which should be removed in the interests of public health." This assertion caused a tumult, which the President of the Senate checked. M. Delpech closed with demanding that the senate pronounce the complete divorce of church and state. Premier Combes then entered the Tribune. He said he would not say the day for the renunciation of the Concordat was not near but that day had not yet arrived. While the Concordat existed it would be respected. The Premier expressed the belief that the action of some o the clergy invited a violation of the Concordat, as their petitions and pastoral letters attacked the militant gov ernment, and would eventually compe an interruption of the Concordat. Premier closed his remarks with the declaration that the Government would maintain the Concordat, but on the condition that the clergy kept out of politics. This statement was received with applause. 

Advice of a Former Londoner Now Settled There.

Country Well Adapted to Agriculture -Lands Being Rapidly Taken Up.

Mr. Harry Wallace, who recently removed from this city to New Ontario, writes to a friend from Pinewood under date of March 13, and tells something of the country which is now attracting no little attention. Mr. Wallace has located at Pinewood, where he found large workshops, wharves and elevators, and buildings of all kinds in course of erection. Laborers were re ceiving 221/2 cents an hour, with plenty of work for them to do. Passing For Frances on the way to Pinewood, Mr. Wallace found what he considered the best site for a city that he had ever seen, water power from 8,000 to 14,000 horse power being obtainable at a river there-and part of it already utilized. Fort Frances is an old Hudson's Bay post, where many a skirmish took place between the company's employes and invaders, both Indian and white. The free grant lands in the district around Pinewood are now pretty scarce according to Mr. Wallace, and if the soon be taken up. He is well pleased with the country, which, judging by the samples of grain, roots and vegetables seen, is well adapted to agriculture. The hay was equal to any found on the London market, and in some cases superior. The country was well drained, and the Government has built, or under construction, a number of roads leading back into the interior.
