A TERRIBLE TRAGEDY.

A Father and Three Children Burned to Death.

Halifax, N. S., Jan. 30.—Details of a terrible affair were received yesterday from St. Johns. Nfld., four lives being lost by the burning of a dwelling house. The victims were John Gorley and his three children—two girls and a boy—aged respectively 6, 8 and 15 years. The fire broke out at midnight in the lower part of the house. Daniei Mulrooney, a fireman, hearing the alarm, ran to the scene with a ladder, and met Gorley outside the house. Gorley said that his six children were in the attic, and throwing off his coat and hat dashed into the burning house, despite the warning shouts of Mulrooney. A few minutes later he appeared at the attic window, and Mulrooney, raising the ladder, mounted to the rescue. In the meantime Gorley's wife had reached the street. Gorley passed three of the children out of the window to Mulrooney, who assisted them to the sidewalk. By this time smoke was pouring out of the window in dense volumes, and when Mulrooney turned to receive the fourth child he could not see Gorley. He plunged his body half through the window, reached out his arm and touched Gorley, but he fell forward with a scream and disappeared. The heroic freman could discern one of the remaining children tangled in an iron bed-stead, but was powerless to reach it. A DISPATCH from Winnipeg chronicles the death of a man who was at one time widely known. We refer to Captain Wm. Kennedy, who 40 years ago obtained a world-wide fame because he was selected as commander of the expedition fitted out by Lady Franklin to go in search of her husband, Sir John Franklin, in the Arctic Ocean. Captain John Kennedy was born at Cumberland House, on the shores of Hudson Bay, his father being a chief factor of the company. When he was a child Sir John Franklin, during two of his earlier expeditions, wintered in Hudson Bay, and was a frequent visitor at the Kennedy house, where the great explorer taught young Kennedy his alphabet and figures. He was nominated by the Hudson Bay Company as the most competent person to and the expedition on account of his knowledge of Hudson Bay and other northern waters, which he attained while navi-gating in the Hudson Bay Company's trading boats. The Captain was at that time living in Bruce county, Ont., where the flourishing town of Southampton now stands. On re-ceiving his commission he went at once to Scotland and sailed from Aberdeen, in the chip Prince Albert, in June, 1851. The expedition reached Edwin Bay, on the western shore of Prince Regent Inlet, in the fall, and spent the winter of 1851-52 there. From that point many important discoveries were made, among others the most northerly point of the American continent, and the fact that a strait separated North Somerset from Boathia Felix, which was named Bellot Strait, after Lieutenant Bellot, second in command. The knowledge of Bellot Strait, thus acquired, enabled Sir Leopold McClintock afterward to adto make the successful journeys in which he discovered the first and only absolute proof of the loss of Sir John Franklin's expedition. A somewhat romantic incident in the history of Capt. Mennedy was the fact that when he was called on to go in search of Franklin, no one knew of their previous acquaintance, and another coincidence is found in the fate which, after his two years' voyage was done, threw him in the way of a highlyred English lady, a relative of Sir vi

The case arose in New York State, and has just been adjudicated upon by the Supreme Court of the United States—the highest court in the neighboring republic. It appears that in 1883 Mr. Salomon, the plaintiff, imported two or three cargoes of white medium beans from Italy, Collector Robertson, of New York, and his assistants at first came to the conclusion that they were liable to 20 per ent. duty as "garden seeds." Mr. Salomor promptly objected. He argued that beans should be classed either as seeds other than garden seeds, that is, field seeds, which are subject to no duty, or as vegetables, which pay 10 per cent. duty. The dispute was arried before the Treasury officials at Washington on appeal, and it was there decided that Collector Robertson was wrong that beans are not "garden seeds," bu "vegetables," and 10 per cent. which had been collected was refunded to Mr. Salomon. He was not satisfied with this disposition of the case. He renewed his contention that beans were, after all, or dinary field seeds, and nothing else. The Government would not yield this point, and the matter was taken into court to judicially determine what are beans. Judge Ship man and a jury in the United States Circuit Court first heard the case. A mass of tes timony was put in and the matter was elaborately argued. The jury struggled with the problem, and finally came to the conclusion, under Judge Shipman's charge and the evidence, that beans were not vegetables, but were seeds. Accordingly they found a verdict for the plaintiff, and the District Attorney, who appeared for Mr. Robertson, appealed the case to the Supreme Court. There it was argued a year ago by the Solicitor-General and other learned men, and the decision has just bee made public. It is that the New York Circuit Court didn't know beans. 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

LONDON SOUTH.

Death of Mr. William Wakeling-The

Residents of this suburb will read with regret of the death of Mr. William Wake-ling, one of the oldest residents of London South, who died at his residence on Wort-ley road this morning at the age of 75. Mr. Wakeling was born in Cambridgeshire, ley road this morning at the age of 75. Mr. Wakeling was born in Cambridgeshire, Eng., and came to Canada about 48 years ago. He was a shoemaker and worked at his trade for some five years after arriving in this country. After that he farmed in London township for a time and subsequently kept a store on the Market Lane in this city, dealing in pork, wool, furs and miscellaneous goods. He was an enthusiastic lover of cricket, and in his young days was known as a batsman of 2c mean order. Although compelled by his age to desert from active participation in the game, he still was a regular attendant at every game, and when the London South Cricket Club was in existence the players grew to look for the presence of the enthusiastic old man, who, in spite of, his 75 years, would become as excited over the deat or victory of the club as the youngest member of the team. Mr. Wakeling was well known in Baptist circles, being one of the nine original members of the first church of that denomination organized in London in 1846 and known as "the Regular Baptist Church of London." He was also a strong champion of temperance all his life, and was often heard to attribute his long lease of active enjoyment of life to the fact that he always abstained from intoxicants. He leaves a widow and four children—three daughters and one son. The daughters are Mrs. Gilmore and Mrs. Luttridge, of Chicago, and Mrs. H. Bonser, of this city. 




