Paul Peel is a native of this city, his father, Mr. John R. Peel, being still resident here. As a painter he was born, not made, his earliest tastes and inclinations tending strongly in the direction of his chosen profession. In 1877 he began his art education in Philadelphia at the Academy of Fine Arts, where he remained three years. Here he studied anatomy and practiced dissection with the zeal and nerve of an amateur surgeon, purely for artistic purposes. Two lectures a week were given on these subjects—a striking commentary supon the strength of a love for leauty which could outlast so prolonged a study of repulsiveness. His ambition is to reach the final goel of art, which is historical paint-ing. As our gifted countryman is an ardent patriot, it is to be hoped that some scene in Canadian history may be immortalized by his brush.

Paul Peel is a hard worker, but he is not a mechanical drudge. He works with the spirit and with the understanding also. The artist, he says, who puts all his soul and energy into five hours of work has done enough for one day. Emotion cannot last. It wanes like an afternoon sun. The impression must be soized, held, utilized to the utmost. Feeling and truth should come first, skill afterwards. The more brains put into the work, the fewer hours are required to perfect it. "After the Bath," the picture which won the gold medal at the French Salon, and the immediate attention and admiration of the civilized world, was completed by Mr. Peel in two months. It was based upon a sudden inspiration. One of his own little ones, fresh from the bath, happened to take a pretty pose before the open fire. It was but a moment's work to seat the smaller child beside him. With their little hands outstretched to the blaze the picture was complete—in the beauty-laving mind of their father. The dockmen's congress opened on Tuesday in London, Eng. Sixty delegates were present. Thomas Mann, who presided, said that the Dockmen's Union had obtained for 50 per cent. of the members an advance of 7 shillings per week, and for the remainder an advance of 3 shillings and 6 pence per week. The union had also brought about the abolition of the contract system in eight of the ten groups of London docks and had altogether destroyed the sweating system. 


