A SHOCKING DISASTER.

YOKERS, N. Y., Dec. 24.—A shocking accident occurred to night on the Hudson River Read between the St. Louis express and the Niagara Falls special trains. The weather was thick, rendering difficult the running of trains with any degree of safety. The locomotive of one of the express trains crashed into the rear sleeper of the other express, and several cars, mostly sleepers, were telescoped. Several persons are reported to have been killed and many injured. Some say that the number of killed is eight, while others claim that ten persons were either crushed or scalded to death. The locomotive when it crashed into the sleeper of the leading train exploded its boiler. The escaping steam did deadly work on the poor victims who were in the wreck.

Then he blew his whistle, reversed his engine and jammed down his brakes in an instant, but he could not avoid the collision. He remained at his post, and, strange to relate, was not hurt; neither was his fireman. Donohue must have ridden through the Gibraltar in the cab of his engine, for he did not jump. Later, when the track was cleared, he took a new engine and carried his train on to its destination.

A SURVIVOR'S EXPERIENCE.

Among the passengers in the Gibraltar was Mr. J. C. Gould, the traveling engineer of the New York Central. He was one of the three men who escaped unhurt. The other two were named Jacobsen, who had been at first reported killed, and a man named McCormiok. Mr. Gould said he had no idea of the danger until he heard the roar of the St. Louis express right behind. The next instant the crash came. EVICTIONS IN LONDON.

Poor Families Turned into the Streetz—
Pittable Condition of the Victims.

London, Dec. 26.—A block of squalid buildings in Leather lane, in the Holborn district, was recently condemned, and the time given for the people inhabiting the block to leave their dwellings expired luesday night. Some of them had already left, but 48 families, comprising 139 persons, lingered in the hope that they would not be dispossessed. But as soon as the legal limit of time had expired officers began the eviction of the tenants, and the furniture was thrown into the roadway. The tenants were warned not to return to the tenements, and the doors were locked. The seene on the street was distressing. Women and children, scantily clad, stood about crying piteously, their faces blue and pinched and their forms shivering. Some tradesmen in the vicinity took pity on the unfortunates and furnished a quantity of coke. Fires were started in the street, and about the welcome piles of glowing coke the women and children crouched, thankful for even this small blessing. It was believed that the tenants might resist their eviction and a strong force of police was present and prevented any disturbance. The evicted and a strong force of police was present and prevented any disturbance. The evicted people were compelled to remain on the street all night. 



Experiments with flowers showed that the colors of tulips were made deeper and richer for a few days, although afterward this exceptional intensity was lost. Verbena flowers growing near the electric light were uniformly injured; the leaves were small, the flowers were small, and those on the lower part of the clusters turned brown and died before those on the top opened. The color of scarlet, dark red, blue, and pink flowers was soon turned to a grayish white. The light caused petunia plants to grow tall and slender, while they bloomed earlier and more profusely. Experiments similar to those of Lemstrom and others who have applied the current to seeds and to the soil have been made at the Massachusetts Agricultural College, and the results will soon be made known. Lamstrom measured the influence of the carrent upon growing wheat as well as upon egetables, procuring 50 per cent. more wheat from a small tract on which the plants were exposed to electricity diffused

by a network of wires than was grown on an adjoining tract of similar soil where o electricity was used. While it seems to have been proved beyond a doubt that the growth of many plants is greatly accelerated by applying the electric current at first to the seeds and afterward to the soil and the air just above the surface of the ground, and that a majority of the plants which have been used in the experiments are not injured by such treatment it is also shown that the rapid growth of flowering plants induced by the electric light, as it is commonly used, is exhaustive and unhealthy. Perhaps careful tests may yet demonstrate that, under modifying conditions, this light can be used to accelerate the growth of such plants and of some vegetables without causing exhaustion or impairing vitality. We have seen it argued that plants, like animals, require a full period of rest, and cannot be forced in growth without injury. It must be remembered, however, that in some countries the climate is so forcing that two crops of vegetables, fruits and grain are gathered in a year. The question to be settled is whether by the artificial agency of the electric light somewhat similar results may not be successfully brought



A HORSE'S MEMORY.

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Re Bolts at a Crossing Where Bis Former Master Was Killed.

East Grange, Dec. 24.—The horse which Samuel Campbell, jun., of South Orange drove on Thanksgiving night when he met with his fatal accident at the Halstead street crossing in East Orange, proved this afternoon that horses have good memories. He is now in the possession of William E. Bloodgood, of Llewellyn Park, who hitched him to a buggy and went out driving with a friend. A few minutes before 4 o'clock they turned into Halstead street, in the opposite direction from that in which Mr. Campbell had driven.

The horse approached the crossing in a hesitating way, and the moment that he reached the tracks he bolted, although there was no visible cause of fright. The buggy was overturned and the horse thrown to the ground. The men were pitched out and severely cut and bruised. The horse was also badly cut. It was the first time the horse had been driven through the streets since the fatal accident.
