The wheat harvest has been well gathered in, and with a few weeks of fair weather to enable farmers to get in the balance of their crops. Ontario will experience one of the most prosperous years it has ever had. Failures for the week were 25 as against 31 for same week of last year.

MULLAH OF HADDA.

Central Figure on the India War Stage-Has Been at the Bottom of Other Troubles.

The Mullah of Hadda, whose name ccurs so frequently in the reports known as Najan-ud-dia, Akhundzada, the latter title Having been bestowed on him as one of the foremost disiples of the Akhoond of Swat. Hadla, or Adda, the usual residence of the Mullah, is in the Jelalabad district. He was at one time the friend and ally of the more celebrated Mullah Khalil, who gave us a good deal of trouble during the Afghan war, on three occasions attempting to cut our line of communications with Cabul. Some ten years ago, when the Ghilzais were preparing to rise against the authority of Abdur Rahman, the Mullah Khalil endeavored to persuade Najam-ud-din to stir up the Mohmunds and the people of Bajaur to attack the Ameer's troops; but the combination broke down, and Najam-ud-din eventually made friends with the Afghan general.

He also gave Abdur Rahman the benefit of his advice, exhorting him to oppose the Russians. The Ameer does not appear to have taken this in good part. The Mullah of Hadda was sum-moned to Cabul and placed under restraint, and it was said that he would be tried before a clerical tribunal on a charge of preaching Wahablism. A rumor next reached Peshawar that he had been put to death, but this proved untrue, and it presently became known that he had either made his escape or had been released on the intercession of his disciples who, according to the British agent in Cabul, than 100,000. In any case it is tolor ably certain that Abdur Rahman was jealous of the Mullah's influence, and that the Mullah entertained anything but friendly feelings for the Ameer. After leaving Cabul he repaired to the country of the Shinwaris, then in insurrection against the ruler of Cabul. He did all he could to encourage them in their contumacy, and they, in their turn, offered to make him their badshah, or king, but he declined the honor. When the Shinwari revolt was put down, the Mullah repaired to the Swat country, declining the Ameer's invitation to pay another visit to Caoul, and even refusing to accept th offer of some villages which Abdur Rahman promised to bestow upon him rent free. More recently he assisted In fomenting the hostility to the English, which led to the Chitral expedition, and now he is preaching a holy war against us among the Mohmunds

Tin cans are made by machinery. Over 400,000,-000 a year are produced in this country. Out of the 7,000,000 boxes of tin plate (120 sheets to the box) used yearly only 2,000,000 sames go for general use. (600,000,000 sheets) are made into cans. VALUE OF OLD CANS. It is a mistaken idea that there is no further use for the tin can when thrown out with the rubbish. as \$3 50 a load. At the smelters they are dumped on the grate, where the flames from burn-ing shavings melt off the tin and lead. some of the remaining iron pieces are requently sold to trunk manufacturers for use in binding the frames of trunks, the rough surface of the metal holding the paint well. Generally, however, it is melted up over very hot fires and molded into various castings. est of these factories manufacture sash weights, weights etc., from the tin, and other common forms of castings, although there to now a method by which the iron from the old tins can be refined and used for first-class castings.
