The hope is freely expressed that a few more weeks of patient effort on the part of the allies will result in forcing the German right back into the interior of Belgium, and so compelling the withdrawal of the whole line from Lille to Mosselle toward the frontier.

NO MARKED CHANGES IN ALLIES' POSITION

Heavy Fighting at Several Points, and Assaults of Enemy Repulsed-French Reta ke Village of Sapigneult, Driving Germans Out.

[Canadian Press.]
Paris, Nov. 6.—2:50 p.m.—The French official announcement, given out this afternoon says: "There was no perceptible modification during the day of yeserday, anywhere on the front. The fighting continued between Dixmude and the Lys, with the same characteristics as previously, and without any marked advance or retirement at any point. There was violent cannonading to the north of Arras, and also directed upon Arras, without result for the enemy.

CHANGING COMPOSITION. The German effort in Belgium and in the north of France continues. The Germans seem to have undertaken changes in the composition of their forces which are operating in this region, and are reinforcing their reserve corps, composed of new organizations, which have been severely tested, with active troops with the idea of undertaking a new offensive movement, or at least to mitigate the bloody checks which have been inflicted upon them.

WAGONS DESTROYED. Between the Somme and the Oise, and between the Oise and the Mouse there have been minor actions. We have consolidated our advance on the village of Andechy, to the west of Roye. A column of German wagons has been destroyed by the fire of our artillery at long range in the region of Nampoel, to the northeast of the forest of Aigue.

"Near Berry-au-Bac we have retaken the village of Sapigneult, which had been captured by the Germans. A FURIOUS FIGHT.
