

Breach Between Them.

CONSIDERED DANGEROUS MAN

Mrs. Haines' Damaging Confession Be Used in Defence of Slayer of Magazine Man.

New York, Aug. 17. - Of far more nterest than the formal arraignment in a police court today of Capt. Peter C. Hains, jun., who shot and killed Wm. E. Annis, magazine advertising manager, on Saturday, at the Bayside Yacht Club, landing. while his brother, T. Jenkins Hains, held at bay a crowd of yachtsmen who sought to prevent the tragedy, was evidence which came into the hands of District Attorney Darrin, bearing on the motive for the shooting.

It was established that Capt. Hains and Annis were on such friendly terms that they went automobiling together as recently as May 29 last. It was also disclosed that there were two women in the party, and the police believe the women wers Mrs Hains and Mrs. Annis. The police records prove that the men were motoring together, for a motorcycle policeman arrested the party for speeding on Ocean parkway. The case was postponed in court several times and is still on the calendar.

The party was in Annis' automobile and the police held Annis in \$100 bail, Annis only had \$20, so the police were about to lock him up, when Capt. 

How Kerr Tied the Record

Hamilton Spectator: Perhaps the greatest interest of the afternoon was shown in Bobby Kerr, the auburn-haired sprinter, who since his victorious trip to the old country has been hailed far and near as the "world's champion sprinter." Kerr gave two exhibitions, running the 100 and 220 yards, and his appearance each time was the signal for a grand demonstration from the crowd, who rose en masse and again proved their appreciation of the honor he had done his native town. As if in return for their enthusiasm, the champion reeled off two particularly good races, being credited with a world's record in one, when he ran the 220 yards in 211-5 seconds, 2-5 of a second better than the present world's mark. Kerr was pulled out each time by Lambert, the Y. M. C. A. sprinter, who was given five yards' handicap in the 100, and 20 yards in the 220. In the former Kerr had no trouble overtaking his friend and breaking the tape yards in the lead, in ten seconds flat, while in the 220 he made Lambert look like a selling plater, overcoming the 20 yards handicap before they had gone 150 yards. As he tore along the track in the latter race, the crowd had an excellent chance to witness a really fast man in action, and the fact that they were brought to their feet in wild enthusiasm as he overtook his partner testified to the wonderful rate at which he was travelling. Four watches were held on him, three of them catching his time as 211-5, while the fourth clocked it at 21 3-5. While it was wonderful running, Kerr slackened up slightly the last ten yards, and it is very probable that the latter time is nearer the correct mark. At that he would be equalling the world's record, and a performance of this kind on such a track as Britannia Park boasts of would stand out anywhere as wonderful work. In any event, the time will not stand, as it was made in an exhibition race. His first appearance in running togs in his home town since the Olympic games, Kerr's exhibition will be long remembered by those present.
