GERMANY HOLDING AMERICANS FOR RETALIATORY

BERLIN FAILED TO SCARE GERARD BY HOSTAGE THREAT

American Ambassador Refused To Sign Paper Permitting German Ships To Leave American Harbors — Told Germans War Would Follow Detention of United States Chizens.

(This is the first dispatch received direct from Carl Ackerman, United Press correspondent, since he passed beyond control of the German censorahip. He is a member of the immediate party with Ambassador Gerard. Ackerman has been in Germany or with German armies ever since war started.)

Berne, Via Paris, Feb. 11.—Germany is delaying the departure of a large number of American citizens in Berlin for possible retallatory measures in case the United States declares war.

Practically a demand was made upon Ambassador Gerard before he left Berlin to sign a treaty in effect, guaranteeing permission for German ships to leave American harbors in case of war, this "ultimatum" being backed up with the threat to hold American corresopndents as hostages if such action were not

Gerard, it is reliably reported, told the German official who brought this threat that if Americans were forced to remain in Germany, America would regard such action as declaration of war. He refused to sign. The German foreign office is striving to keep America out of the war, but the German military party long ago prepared for American hostilities, and is only lukewarm in support of efforts toward peace in the Wilhemstrasse headquarters of foreign office.

Switzerland is granting the Americans every courtesy and hospitality. Ambassador Gerard began communicating at once with President Wilson at Washington, using code messages for the first time from a neutral point.

COAL SITUATION DESPERATE: HOUSEHOLDERS APPEALING FOR SUPPLIES; DEALERS DESTITUTE

Railways Not Bringing In Enough To Meet Steady Demand -All That Comes Burned Up Within 24 Hours, Although Quarter- Tons Only Are Being De livered.

On the verge of a coal situation, with many families claiming not to have an ounce, and frantically appealing to the coal dealers to supply them, even in small quantities, the fuel situation today is regarded as about as bad as it can be.

Owing to the severity of the weather during the last few days, the coal brought into the city has been consumed as fast as the railroads have been able to deliver it.

Today many dealers were forced to decline to make deliverles, because they were unable to handle the deluge of orders.

One dealer estimated that the average amount consumed daily was 15 cars, and that the railroads were unable to yet ahead of the demand.

Nine carloads consigned to different local dealers arrived in the city today via G. T. R., and several more cars are expected to reach the city this evening.

The dealers had out no hopes of the condition growing any better during the cold weather, and it will only be by a careful distribution of the coal in small quantities that a famine will be prevented.
