The H. E. Runnels Breaks Up Efforts To Locate Missing yesterday discussed disposition of four On Rocks.

CREW IS RESCUED

Ore Carrier John Owen Also Thought To Have Foundered.

SAULT STE. MARIE. Mich., Nov. 14.—One steamer, the H. E. Runnels, is known to have been lost, and another, as yet unidentified, is believed by marine men here to have foundered in the storm that has been raging over Lake Superior for three days.

The Runnels, after battling her way through the gale off Grand Marais all ast night, grounded early today and bounded to pieces shortly after the trew of seventeen had been rescued by means of a life line.

The second vessel is believed to be he John Owen, an ore carrier, which has not been sighted since Wednesday. So far as known here touight all other treamers have been accounted for. Officers of the Witpen, which arrived today, reported sighting wreckage ten miles off Manitou Light yeslerday. Because of the high sea and the blinding snowstorm they were unable to identify the wreckage, they lerday. According to their story, however, they made out an overturned iffeboat, a portion of a wrecked pilotnouse and what appeared to be the bedy of a man held up by a life pre-Others Saw Nothing.
Other vessels passing that way report that they sighted no wreckage, but this may be due to the heavy snowfalls and the fact that the wind

had driven the wreckage out of their ourse. Little can be accomplished in the Little can be accomplished in the way of a search for the Owen until the storm abates. The vessel was in command of Capt. George B. Benham and carried a crew of twenty.

The steamer Replogle arrived here today after narrowly escaping disaster in the high gale. She was forced to hug the shore for two days by the mountainous waves. In the light of their own experiences officers declared it was quite possible that the Owen, because of her comparativ lightness, had been unable to ride the high seas. Although a number of steamers have arrived here in the last few weeks covered with ice and considerably battered, the Runnels and Owen are the only ones lost this season in "the graveyard of the lakes."





# **AMERICAN BUYERS** FORCING UP PRICE OF POTATOES HERE

Crop Failure Over Border, So London. Ontario Visited.

Owing to the activities of American buyers, London householders will have to pay more for their potatoes than was thought earlier in the season, when the statement was made by various wholesalers that potatoes would sell from \$1.50 to \$1.75 per bag. However, the crop over the border was more or less a failure, and with potatoes on the decline here, they bought heavily of the famous Caradoc "spuds" and are still buying.

Up Goes Price.

It is reported that when the Americans first invaded the market the price was from \$1.65 to \$1.75 a bag in carload lots. The latest price quoted from Caradoc way is \$2.15 to \$2.25 in quantities f.o.b.

On the market today the price hovered on the market today the price novered around \$2.25 to \$2.30 a bag with prospects of higher prices according to the farmers, who declare that the country is fast being drained of the available tuber supply.

The early potato crop was a miserable failure, and although the early-late crop was very light, the second late crop did well locally, while in other parts of Ontario the crop was poor. The west had a good supply, but early frosts froze a great portion of them.

"The Americans are all right, but why in blazes don't they grow their own potatoes instead of coming over here and offering the farmers big prices," said one disgruntled restaurant keeper today, who apparently has walted too long to get in his winter supply.





# CAR REPAIRMEN TO BENEFIT MOST BY LATEST AGREEMENT

New Arrangement With Shopmen Stands For One Year.

Montreal, Nov. 14.—The new agreement arrived at between the Canadian Railway Board and representatives of the Shopmen's Union provides that men engaged in locomotive work are to receive an increase of four cents per hour and men in car repair shops an increase of nine cents an hour. The differences in the increases is due to the fact that the repair shopmen claimed that under the old agreement they had not received as liberal treatment as their co-workers. Changes in hours of labor, particularly, affect men in the shops where heavy work is carried on. These men, under the old agreement, worked eight and one-half hours a day five days a week, and four and one-half hours on Saturday, forty-seven in all. Under the new agreement they work a forty-four hour week eight hours for five days and four for Saturday. The hours of the men in the roundhouse remain at eight hours a day, six days a week. The agreement stands for one year from November 1, 1919, but the men will get the new wage terms as from May 1, 1919, when negotiations with the war board began.

### LARGEST BATTLESHIP LAUNCHED IN JAPAN

Stockholm, Nov. 14.—(By the Associated Press.)—The unique collection of Chinese works of art made by the late Li Hung Chang, one time viceroy of China, which for years collectors tried vainly to acquire, has finally been bought by a Swedish syndicate and a valuable part of it has been given to the National Museum here by the purchasers. German museums were negotiating for the collection when the war put an end to their plans. The purchase price is understood to have been more than a million Krone (nominally about \$250,000), but the intrinsic value of the collection is incalculable.

Li Hung Chang died in 1901. He had a collection of works of art larger than

a collection of works of art larger than anything of its kind in the empire. It included numerous old paintings, bronzes of great worth and ancient cer-

amics. The bronzes date from a time before Christ, and the paintings were done from the tenth to the twelfth centuries.

The collection is in Shanghai, where it has been packed and stored.

# HINDY'S" ADMIRERS REFUSE TO PERMIT HIS EXAMINATION

Return Home.

CHEER THE EX-KAISER

Demonstration Said To Be Breach of Martial Law Conditions.

BERLIN, Nov. 14.—(By the Associated Press.)—Pan-German students today refused to permit Field Marshal von Hindenburg to enter the Reichstag building to testify before the sub-committee which is investigating war responsibilities, and forced the field marshal's chauffeur to return with the former commander-in-chief of the German forces to his home.

The demonstration occurred this morning as the field marshal's automobile was being driven toward the Reich-

bile was being driven toward the Reichstag building, the students surrounding it and declaring their unwillingness to allowed him to be questioned by the

it and declaring their unwillingness to allowed him to be questioned by the subcommittee.

Von Hindenburg begged the students, who clung to the running board of the machine, to allow his automobile to pass as he was due at the Reichstag. The students, however, replied by ordering the street closed, declaring that they were unwilling to allow the subcommittee to interrogate him. Again von Hindenburg protested, but he was unable to quell the demonstration.

Nationalist Affair.

It was a nationalist demonstration for both von Hindenburg and Gen. Ludendorff, and for a time it assumed serious proportions. The crowd which gathered consisted mostly of students of both sexes, who carried with them an old German flag.

When Hindenburg's automobile was waylaid the crowd cheered both von Hindenburg and Ludendorff, and shouted: "Down with the Jewish Government." After von Hindenburg's requests that he be allowed to proceed were denied, but, nevertheless the automobile slowly began to pierce its way through the crowd toward the Reichstag, thousands of persons followed it, singing 'Die Wacht Am Rhein' and "Deutschland Uber Alles."

There also were shouts of "Brothers, we will not allow such a disgrace." "For us there is only one kaiser and empire," and "We will not endure that our glorious kaiser be besmirched."

Hoch der Kaiser.

Along the route was a statue of the former emperor, the name on which was hidden under a canvas. The students tore off the canvas with cries of "Hoch" for the one-time ruler and the empire.

As the Reichstag building was reached a student again sprang on the running board of Von Hindenburg's machine and delivered an impassioned speech dealing with Von Hindenburg's services to the fatherland and demanding of the mob that it should do its utmost to prevent Von Hindenburg appearing before the "stupid youths" of the sub-committee.

Finally Von Hindenburg, seeing the futility of endeavoring to calm the mob, permitted the chauffeur to drive homeward. First, however, he thanked the crowd for the respect to him implied by the demonstration.

In official quarters today it was announced that the students had violated the conditions imposed by martial law and that troops would be ordered to suppress any similar demonstrations.

# **REORGANIZATION OF** LONDON EXPECTED

Sir George Perley May Be Succeeded by Sir George Foster.

OTTAWA, Nov. 14.—An early reorganization of the Canadian administration in London may be expected. Sir George Persey, Canadian high commissioner, has never looked upon the position as a permanency, and is anxious to come home so that he can devote his attention to his own somewhat extensive business interests. He is said to be merely awaiting the appointment of a successor.

Lloyd Harris, chairman of the overseas section of the Canadian Trade Commission, has returned to the Dominion. It is stated fairly authoritatively that Sir George Foster, minister of trade and commerce, will succeed Sir George Perley as Canadian high commissioner. Sir George is now in the West cleaning up some private business and on his return it is expected he will prepare to depart at an early date. missioner, has never looked upon the in early date. Sir Geo:ge has been mentioned for several positions. It has been stated that he might be appointed chief librarian of Parliament and would in his spare moments, in the quiet of the ibrary on the hill, write his reminiscences of his long parliamentary career. It has been further suggested that he might succeed Sir John Hendrie as lieutenant-governor of Ontario, but the best guess appears to be heat.

Sifton Mentioned.

Sir Clifford Sifton, it is stated, has been prominently mentioned for the position of high commissioner, and it is said could have had it long aco, but declined. It is an open question whether the overseas trade commission will be continued, inasmuch as it was essentially a war organization. The trade and commerce department is due for a shaking up. Under a new head and in conjunction with the finance department, which arranges for the credits, it will likely carry on the work recently in the hands of the trade commission. Hon, Dr. Tolmie, minister of agriculture, is anxious that a permanent representative of agriculture be installed in London.

### Prince Pays Tribute to American Navy in Annapolis Speech

ANNAPOLIS, Nov. 14.—Tribute to the spirit and achievements of the American navy was paid today by the Prince of Wales in an address to 2.000 midshipmen in the memorial hall at the naval academy. The prince, who arrived here this morning from Washington, wore the uniform of a British naval captain. "I have had four years' training in the British navy," he said, "and reel that I can speak to you as a comrade. I would like particularly to express my appreciation for the spien-

comrade. I would like particularly to express my appreciation for the splendid success which the American navy obtained in the war both in the North Sea and elsewhere.

"There was the most perfect cooperation and co-ordination retween the American and British naval forces, and it was my privilege to learn to know and appreciate the magnificent spirit among your seamen. I am more than glad to have been able to come here and meet you face to face."

Prince Edward was accompanied here by Secretary Daniels, and was welcomed by Governor Harrington of Maryland and Admiral Scales, commandant of the academy. As he entered the naval grounds a salute of 21 guns was fired. After reviewing the midshipmen and inspecting the guard of honor the prince was entertained at luncheon by Admiral Scale. He returned to Washington this afternoon.



As a convention it will be the first of its kind. It will bring millions of workers within its provisions and will be enforceable on all states which ratify it.

The Canadian position, as has been emphasized before, is rendered difficult

emphasized before, is rendered difficult by reason of proximity to the United States.. which, from present indications, vill not be a signatory to the convenon. Proposals have been submitted by the employers' group that any conven-on adopted by the conference shall not come enforceable until accepted by the United States among other countries. These proposals would, to a certain extent, remove the objection raised by Canadian employers to a convention to which the United States was not a

"If the proposals are incorporated," S. R. Parsons, Canadian employers' delegate, was asked tonight, "would Canadian employers withdraw their objection to the convention?"

His Own Views.
Mr. Parsons replied that he could not speak on the question for the Canadian employers as a whole, but he summed up his personal attitude in these words: "If we are ready to cast to the winds our propaganda carried on in various directions to lower the on in various directions to lower the cost of living by increasing production; if we are ready to turn over to our Governments economic questions, which may receive political, rather than economic answers, owing to certain influences working in one way or another, and if the United States accepts the proposed convention for a 18 hours were proposed convention for a 48-hour week, the Canadian employers, in my opinion, can have no valid objections to uniform conditions."
