High voices mean high-strung nerves. In this they are somewhat like giggles. But they don't indicate racing thoughts



INSURANCE RATES WAR IS EXPECTED

Revision Committee Told Ontario Pays More Than Buffalo.

TORONTO, Jan. 6 .- The question of whether fire insurance rates in Ontario are net much too high was brought sharply before the special committee on revision of the insurance law at today's session in the parliament buildings, and indications point to a coming struggle between provincial authorities seeking to remedy the situation and the surance companies.

Evan Gray, superintendent of insur ance, presented statistics to show Toronto and other centres in Ontario were paying considerably more for in-insurance than Buffalo and district. He howed that the rate is 38c per \$100 in Buffalo on first-class residences and has been for three years. Toronto folk, until the recent reduction, were paying 58c, and are still asked to pay 50c. Mr Gray believed that the insured in Ontario generally were at a similar disadvantage in comparison with New York state. During the last thirty or forty years there had been a steady increase in the cost of securing insurance in Ontario and practically no reduction in tection measures.

The agencies, through a representa-tive, Mr. Brown, objected strongly to any interference with commisisons by legislation. Hon. W. E. Raney retorted that if the committee saw need for a remedy in the public interest it would not greatly concern itself about jections of the Canadian Fire Under-writers' Association.




