LORD ROSEBERY'S "BEST BED BOOKS"

London Starts Discussion of Literary Nightcaps.

A LIBEL ON THE DOMINION

Oxford School Atlases Depict Canada as 3,000,000 Miles of Frezen Waste.

London, Dec. 7. - Lord Rosebery is the most entertaining critic of the schemes of other people. He seldom puts forward one of his own. Adoption of English at The Hague Is Significant.

WAS OPPOSED BY ALL EUROPE

Precedent Established That Will Be Observed in Future Arbitrations.

New York, Dec. 7. - One result the Venezuelan blockade by England, Germany and Italy, undreamed of at the time, is the adoption of the English language by The Hague court of arbitration for use in the hearing of disputes. To the man in the street this may seem of slight importance, for he has not come in contact with the jealous opposition of the continent, and especially of France, to the use of any other language than French in diplo-matic negotiations or in international arbitrations. But when he is aware of the intrigues carried on and the deternined efforts made to have French used exclusively or at least as the dominant tongue in the Venezuelan proceedings, he will understand how bitter was the struggle and how important was the

It is not going too far to say that the reason of the delay in the organization of the court may be traced to the desire of some of the interested powers to prevent the supremacy of the English. The selections of the president of the court is even said to have been due in part to the belief that he would advocate the employment of French Press. cate the employment of French. Pressure was applied to the Venezuelan minister in Paris to induce him to advise the court that his Government approved the use of French. When M. Murairev, the minister of justice of Russia, and president of the court, went to Paris, he made an explanation in regard to the attitude of the court with regard to the language question.

The first step in behalf of the use of English was made by Herbert W. Bowen, minister to Venezuela, when, as the envoy of President Castro's Govern ment he negotiated terms of peace with the allies. By article IV. of the protocol signed last May, it was provided that "the proceedings shall be conducted in the English language, but the ar-



War Between Japan and Russia Considered a Certainty

British Military Attaches Ordered Far Bast-Japan Demands Prompt Reply to Proposals.

London, Dec. 6.-Europe awaits with measiness news from Tokio in regard to the action of the Japanese Parlianent, which met today, on the troubles with Russia. It is not expected at the Japanese legation here that definite intelligence in regard to the crisis will arrive before Tuesday. The majority of the diplomatic authorities agree that peace will be preserved only by substantial concessions on the part of Russia. The British Government is so convinced of the imminence of war between these two countries that several army officers sailed today to act as foreign military attaches on the Japanese side. Nevertheless, there are reasons why it is not necessary to regard it as impossible that the Russian attitude will be essentially modified. Much, indeed, practically everything, depends on whether the Czar has sufficient strength of character to interpose at the last moment his veto against war. the last moment his veto against war. It is necessary, unfortunately, to throw discredit on the report, which emanated from Paris on Wednesday, that a basis of agreement had been reached between the two countries, whereby Russia would have a free hand in Manchuria, and Japan in Korea. The diplomatist who was partially responsible for this announcement now affirms that the reporter who interviewed him misunderstood who interviewed him misunderstood his statements. He adds, however, that the circulation of the report has had a good effect. He is sure, he says, that the interviewer was quite blameless in the matter.

It remains to be seen what object the diplomatist had in view in desir-

ing the circulation of such a statement. More than one suggests itself. It may be taken for granted, for instance, that France earnestly desires t settlement on some such basis, Russia, if willing to concede this. would concede more, for she will either maintain her present position under control of the war party, or the latter will be displaced and a radical change of policy will be adopted. 




