Board of Works Wants Appropriation of \$63,000

Decides to Ask the Council for \$25,000 More Than It Received in 1904.

The board of works did itself proud in the matter of estimates last night, for, after considering the various items at some length, it decided to ask the council for \$63,015, this year. This is \$24,750 more than was asked for in 1904, and \$22,963 96 more than the board pent last year. 
