Frank, N.W.T., May 1.- I have just walked down the mass of debris which

came from the side of Turtle Mountain. All the reports that these poor frightened souis sent into the world have not been exaggerated one total. They may have in their fear seen an imaginary upheaval or an earthquake, but to them the horror was the same as if the old Turtle was belching and vomiting fire and smoke.

The imagination fails utterly to depict the awful ruin which has clutched

in its destructive maw the lives of eighty-three of their neighbors. Under the great white sepulchre whole fami-lies are laid. The change was quick for them. In mercy their lives were

for them. In meany taken instantly.

One can judge of the great fatality only by comparison. Fancy, if you are two miles square in city only by comparison. Fancy, it you can, any two miles square in city blocks. Tumble to the height of the highest buildings in those blocks a mass of stone as the teamsters would throw it from the dray. Upon this mass throw another of the same sort fifty feet higher, and you have an idea of what the prairie to the east of this little town looks like. Then from the side of the great Turtle comes roaring in a continuous stream huge rocks.

or what the prairie to the east of this slittle town looks like. Then from the side of the great Turtle comes roaring in a continuous stream huge rocks, which are followed by a great cloud of whife, dust.

As I am penning the words a new roar breaks loose. It is like thunder, the echo and air taking it up until there are a hundred peals like that of the heaviest thunder. There is no possible way of estimating the amount of rock that has fallen. At no place on our journey were we less than fifty feet from the ground, and often we mounted close to one hundred feet. From the foot of the mountains to the farthermost points reached by the slide it is two and a half miles, with the narrowest part two miles wide. The valley is filled with pure white limestone rock, scarred and rubbed where the parts tossed and rolled over each other. The rocks ranged in size from an apple to a monster the size of an eight-roomed house. The flow of the great torrent of destruction has levelled hills, and thrown aside the river channel. Two and one-half miles of the new spur built into the French mine is buried. Two miles of the main line of the Crow's. Nest Railway is covered. The edge of the slide, has totally destroyed the lives of 83 people.

The first report was about twenty minutes past 4 in the morning, while the night men on duty in the Hotel Imperial were busy waking and making ready the travellers for the westbound train. A short, sharp report was heard to the north of the town, and almost at once a tremor of the building was noticeable. Immediately afterwards was heard another report from the mountain, and before the lads could weak-the door the justice of the mountain.

tain was falling. The majority of the people with whom I have talked have declared emphatically that there were two reports, and that the upheaval took place down below the town first. The theory is that report number one was that of an earthquake which shook the mountain and started the slide.

The Government experts declare to the contrary, and ridicule the idea of an earthquake; but it is hard to convince the people of Frank that such was not the case. However, the prob-

The list of dead and injured is not complete as yet, as some of the families lost had visitors staying with them, but is given as eighty-three killed, including two unknown Welshmen and about ten unknown Finns. Nine were injured, including J. Barrington, fractured thigh; Mrs. Watkins, Fred Watkins; Dan. McKenzie, internal injuries; Sam Innis and family, bruises.

The stables of the Canada-American Coal & Coke Company held fifty horses. Of this immense building not a vestige remains. It is covered by fifty feet of rock. A tiny terrier pup was the only creature saved.

and lives of seven occupants. None were found save the wee babe, who was discovered in a crevice one hundred yards from where the house stood, naked but alive, unhurt, and crying with exposure. Alex. Leitch and his wife were killed in bed, and their baby of seven months, which lay between its parents, was unhurt.

The happening of the catastrophe came at fitteen minutes past 4 o'clock, when residents of the town were awakened by a deafening tumult and a shaking of buildings, which it seemed would rattle them into complete demolition. Of all the town inhabitants, numbering nearly 1,000, no one professes to have reached the outside of his domain in time to see any part of what took place, but when day dawned it was seen that the whole side of Turtle Mountain had fallen away, and that the country extending from the eastern edge of the town for two miles down the pass, and entirely across the pass, a distance of two miles or more from the mountain, lay buried beneath pock and debris of various kinds for a depth varying from 25 to 100 feet.

In its sweep the great slide, if slide it was, or upheaval, if that be the more proper characterization, demolished and carried away the entire operating plant of the coal company; the tipple boiler and engine house, electric light plant, failway scales, shops and a row of coke ovens destroyed, seven houses owned by the coal company, burying six of them, with most of their occupants, and likewise burying ten other habitations situated in the valley of the town, together with every soul within them.

It was at first believed that the death roll was swelled by the total number of men at work in the mine, 17, and that the mine had been ruined by the walls squeezing under the terrific strain, but, happily, both proved untrue. Lager in the day the men rescued themselves and brought out a report of the condition of the inside of the mine.

Had the mine been ruined it would have meant a loss to the company of about \$3,000,000, but as it is the mine will be reopened, and it is thought the actual loss to the company will not exceed \$200,000, if it amounts to as much. The imprisoned miners escaped by digging their way to the surface from the upper workings. Some were injured, but not seriously.

As was pointed out in my Interim Report, moneys have been received and not accounted for in almost, every department of the general revenue of the County, viz: Administration of Justice, Criminal Justice, School Grants, Police Fines, Jury Fees, House of Refuge Accounts, and Redemption of Lands. While a large portion of the moneys taken was on account of receipts from arrears of taxes, considerable funds were obtained through the system of "advances" which was permitted, the Treasurer taking credit for the "advance" and again for the account in full when finally paid.

Further large sums were obtained through the cashing of cheques payable to the County Treasurer directly, or to himself in his official capacity. These were received principally on account of Administration of Justice, Grants on School Account or in payment of taxes by Loan Companies and others. Sums exceeding \$7,000,00 were secured in this way, all of which should have been deposited in the "Trust" Account.

The crude form of Land Register used during the term of office of the recent Treasurer, contributed largely to the failure to detect the irregularities at an earlier date. The first instance of irregularity under this head dates back to March, 1894. To illustrate the extent of the embezslement, and the impunity with which it was carried on, mention may be made of the fact that the misappropriation of taxes on one piece of property covering a series of years, and appearing upon a single page of the Land Register exceeded \$1,000; while the sum of takings on the page mentioned amounted to over \$2,000.00.

The annual grants from the Educa-tion Department on account of con-tinuation classes and leaving examintinuation classes and leaving examinations for the years 1898, 1899, and 1900, \$960, \$945 and \$915 respectively, have none of them been accounted for. The cheques from the Provincial Treasurer—copies of which are now in my possession—are payable to the "Order of Treasurer of County Kent," "on account of Education" and are endorsed by A. L. Shambleau in his official capacity. Some of them bear evidence of having been paid in cash. A cheque for \$115 from Provincial Treasurer, dated Feb. 5th, 1902, payable as above is also omitted from the Treasurer's accounts.

In the years 1900 and 1902 the treasurer takes double credit for certain payments of grants. This occurred where drafts were made upon the treasurer with the inspector's order attached. The draft was entered as a voucher for the payment, and later on the inspector's order detached and a second credit taken, the orders being put in as vouchers, all of which were accepted and passed by the auditors.

ADMINISTRATION OF, JUSTICE. A cheque for \$1,312.46 from the Pro-rincial Treasurer, on account of the September quarter, 1899, Administra-tion of Justice was not accounted for.

September quarter, 1899, Administration of Justice was not accounted for. The cheque was made payable to "A. L. Shambleau, Treas. Co. Kent, account admin. Jus.," dated January 17, 1900, and is endorsed by Shambleau in his official capacity. The cheque bears evidence of having been paid the treasurer in cash, contrary tto the provisions of By-law No. 573, relating to the County Bank account.

A prolific source of peculation was through the "Deductions" in connection with the "Criminal Justice Accounts." The Board of Audit issued orders (Sec. 9, Chap. 102, R. S. O., 1897) for the full amounts of the accounts rendered each quarter, leaving the matter of the deductions entirely in the hands of the Treasurer. It was clearly the duty of the Board of Audit to have made these deductions, (Sec. 10, Chap. 102, R. S. O., 1897) before issuing the orders on the Treasurer. Failing this, it was the duty of the Treasurer. Failing this, it was the duty of the Treasurer to see that they were duly made, and as to him accrued the benefit, I have charged the whole amount against him. In the case of the Sheriff, that official produces his original cheques to show that all deductions in his accounts were made good by him to the Treasurer. GENERAL REVENUE. The amounts taken or improperly retained by the Treasurer under this head call for no special mention, beyond pointing out of the fact, that these should all have been observed or discovered by the local auditors, the vouchers being stamped and initialed by them. It should be remembered that the accounts of 1902 had not been passed upon by the local auditors and no responsibility attaches to them for any deficiencies discovered therein.

It will be noted that the accounts for this period are not divided as to payments out of the "Trust" and "Special Trust" funds. The division of the disbursements which has been customary, involving, as it did, the use of two cash books, a division of vouchers, and the payment of accounts out of two funds, contributed to some extent to the failure of the payment.

vouchers, and the payment of accounts out of two funds, contributed to some extent to the failure of the auditors to detect the shortcomings of the former official. It is noted in almost all instances that "advances" were made out of the "Special Trust" while the regular accounts were paid out of the "Trust" fund.

I have discontinued the use of the two cash books—the practice of the Treasurer for many years. In doing this, I have still provided for the keeping of the "Trust" and "Special Trust" accounts, in conformity with the By-law. The result of the change will be greater simplicity in the keeping of the accounts, and in the presentation thereof in the annual statements; the maintaining of but one file of vouchers; and generally a conciseness and compactness of method which was impossible under the old order of things. Facility in auditing has also been kept in view throughout.

No ledger has been in use since and including the year 1898. The former Treasurer stated that he discontinued the ledger upon the authority of the Provincial Municipal Auditor, upon the introduction of the Government cash book. For the information

For the information of members of Council, auditors, and any others to whom this statement has been made, it may be said that there is absolutely not one word of truth in the suggestion, and that there is not a tittle of evidence to justify such a statement. The Provincial Municipal Auditor considers a ledger indispensible in County matters, and there is no other County in the Province where a ledger is not kept.

I find that services have been rendered and sales of stock made, the moneys received from which have not been accounted for, as follows:

A LITTLE WRONG FOR A BIG RIGHT

The police had little trouble in dis

The offense charged is a serious one and the severest penalty allowed by the law, is life imprisonment. Public opinion is with the raiders, and, while many express regret that the boys should have acted so hastify, still citizens generally are unanimous in expressing the hope that the court will deal as leniently as possible with the young men. Some citizens go farther and say that the public good resulting from a criminal action should be recognized.

Toronto, May I. - The first of the expected discussions on motions to go into Committee of Supply arose in the Legislature yes-terday, when Mr. St. John, made a lengthy criticism of the timber policy of the Government. He declared the department was ignorant of the resources, accepted its information resdepartment was ignorant of the resources, accepted its faiorination respecting the territory beyond the height of land from Indians, and said the timber was not protected from fire. Hon. Mr. Davis showed that Mr. St. John had totally ignored the extensive report of the exploration parties of 1900, which had revealed much valuable information, that the Government had made provision for fireranging beyond the height of land, and that the conditions for reforestizing were not nearly so favorable there as in a country where the whole of the tree was marketable and at a higher price. During this address Mr. St. John made an admission that the fireranging on the licensed land was satisfactory. Mr. St. John had indulged in criticism of the agricultural value of new Ontario lands, and this drew a reply from Mr. Milton Carr. No division was taken, many of the Opposition members, including Mr. Gamey, being absent.



As stated in the Interim Report, dated January 26th, 1903, the causes principally contributing to the defalcation were:

1. An altogether inefficient annual

audit.

2. The crude form of Account Book in which the arrears of taxes were recorded.

3. The entire absence of check as between the officials of the local

between the officials of the local municipalities and the County.

4. An insufficient internal check in the office of the County Treasurer. To these may be added:

5. The absence of a Ledger.

6. The failure of the Board of Audit to deduct from the warrants which included the recharges, the deductions, upon which the recharges were based.

The following matters coming under my observation appear to call for special comment:

TREASURER'S OFFICE.

TREASURER'S OFFICE.

I note many payments in the "Special Trust" account which have been made upon an insufficient or improper endorsement. Members of Council are largely the offenders in this. Cheques are issued in favor of persons living out of town and these are endorsed by the Councillor for the district in which the person happens to live. The Treasurer should decline payment to a Councillor, unless upon presentation of an order from the person entitled to receive the money, which order should be attached to the cheque or warrant. In a regular audit, I should oblige the Treasurer to obtain an acknowledgement from the persons to whom the cheques were made payable, before I would pass the voucher. There is no suggestion that all past payments of this character have not reached their destination. The practice, however, is irregular, and should be discontinued.

In my examination I observe that many amounts have been paid by the Treasurer, 'without any authority whatever, some of which should not

whatever, some of which should not have been paid out under any circumstances; and others that should first have been passed upon and certified either by the Board of Audit, the Council, Warden or a Committee.

As an instance, I may mention that the former Treasurer bought and paid for out of current funds, within the last few years no less than eight fountain pens, and ten knife crasers. The pens ranged in price from \$5.00 The pens ranged in price from \$5.00 down to \$1.50; the knife erasers from

All accounts for supplies and sta-tionery for the Treasurer's or Clerk's office should be gaid for through the office should be gaid for through the Clerk's office, after being certified by the proper official and passed upon either by the proper Committee or the Warden. Accounts from members of the Board of Audit should be certi-fied by the Chairman previous to payment. Advances to Coroners, Con-stables and of these should be strictly tables and others should be strictly istables had others should be strictly prohibited, except such as are made in compliance with section 11, chapter 192, R. S. O. 4897. Insurance premium accounts should be paid through the County Clerk's office upon presentation of account, certified by the Treasurer, as to deliver to him of Interim or Renewal Receipt, and rate.

Interim or Renewal Receipt, and rate.

The satary of the Matron of the House of Refuge, has always been included in the cheque of the Keeper. I have been unable to find any authority of the Treasurer for payment of this sum to the Keeper. I have had prepared and executed, an acknowledgment by the Matron of the receipt by her through the Keeper, of all salary earned to date, and included in this is authority to the Treasurer to make the monthly payments of salary to the Keeper until further notice.

I have advised the Treasurer either to put these in the form of a pay roll, or to issue individual cheques, so that proper vouchers may be had.

While the method of payments mentioned in the foregoing two paragraphs has worked no injury to the County, to my knowledge, the changes recommended are those of ordinary business precaution.

There appears no record whatever in the Treasurer's office of the deeds issued from time to time in connection with the land tax sales. A large number of sales in the Sale Register bear no evidence either of redemption or of the issue of a tax deed. To ascertain the position of these properties it have scarched in the Registry Office, and have entered against such as have been closed by issue of deeds, the date as found in the Registrar's books. I have endeavored to communicate with the purchasers where the addresses coulds. deavored to communicate with the purchasers where the addresses could be obtained to see if the properties have been redeemed. In a number of instances, I find that this has been the case and I have included these in the amount due from the recent Treasurer: To provide a permanent record, I have introduced a form of tax deed with counterfoil, upon which is entered the description of the property sold and all other particulars required by the Statute. of the property sold and all other particulars required by the Statute. These, and the deeds are numbered, and every number must be accounted for. Similarly all certificates and receipts, issued by the Treasurer, have counterfoils, are numbered by machinery and all must be accounted for.

The loss occasioned by the taking of the cheques received from the Provincial Treasurer on account of continuation and leaving grants suggests the inclusion in the Annual Reports of the Inspectors for the two ridings, of statements showing the distribution of the Government Grant for continuation and leaving classes as between the several schools. I would further suggest that the statement now furnished by the Inspectors to the County Treasurer, he made in duplicate, the second copy to be delivered to the County Clerk, who shall file the same for the use of the auditors.

HOUSE OF REFUGE ACCOUNTS A detailed record of all bills and accounts should be maintained by the Keeper at the House of Refuge for checking purposes. A suitable book in which to enter these should be obtained, and the Keeper instructed to enter as the agreement. obtained, and the Keeper instructed to enter as they are presented, all bills and accounts against the institution. These should be exact copies, as to items, of the accounts as sent on to the Committee, and a notation should be made against each, of the date when passed by the Committee. A proper farm record should be maintained at the House of Refuge, in which should be entered in ledger form, all material or stock at present upon the farm. Additions to these either by purchase or natural increase will be a debit, and sales, deaths or consumption upon the place, a credit. The balances will thus represent the stock on hand, which must be verified by inventory at regular periods.

There has been absolutely no check as between the local manicipalities and the County Treasurer's office in respect of the collection of arrears of taxes. It may not be amiss if I quote from a report sent to the County Council by the defaulting Treasurer, in June, 1891, to show that this official had knowledge at that early date, of the looseness which prevailed, and that he then pointed out the opportunity which existed for practising irregularities. The paragraph reads:

"Your honorable body must bear in mind that no audit has been made of the Wild Land Tax since the formation of the County in 1855, a portion of any auditor's work very much neglected, for it is in this account any Treasurer can use moneys that would not be discovered in a general, or such faulty auditing as has been the custom to be discovered in the county in 1800, and kept permanently at the work from year to year."

Forms for the several returns required to carry out the procedure here outlined have been furnished. The returns of the uncollected taxes come into the County Treasurer's effice, in the majority of instances, in a crude form, and with insufficient particulars. Forms of returns giving the necessary information can be obtained from the publishers of Mumicipal forms, and I would suggest that the County might supply these to the local Municipalities in order to provide that uniformity which is desirable.

I have entered into considerable detail in the foregoing, so that the officials of the local Municipalities may not experience difficulty in putting the new procedure into practice.

If he would take the trouble to read our proceedings or get a talk with Alfred Russel Wallace, he would discover that there really are some things in the world which no fellow can understand.

"And, you see, the Psychical Society has demolished more superstitions and laid more ghosts than any other body in the world! So it is a little unfair of our good-natured briend, the man in the street, to raff and sneer and shrug his shoulders. He thas got to recognize, sooner or later, that psychical research—that is to say, inquiry into the occult phenomena of existence—is as much a science as surgery or botany."

"You think that the sympathy of the world is necessary?"

"Not positively necessary: but the sympathy and thought of the world is a propelling energy, and the phenomena only occur to human beings, so they are an essential factor in the problem. If there was more of this sympathy at the back of learning for instance, the Treasury would be empowered and compelled to do more for higher education. It is one of the big pities of life that Englishmen do not devote a portion of their extra-

The gross amount of policies, new and renewed, totalled \$899,684,167, as against \$821,522,854 for the previous twelve months. This amount was made up: Canadian, \$222,780,100, a gain of \$51,886,095; British, \$556,692,825, a gain of \$14,550,593; and American, \$120,211,152, a gain of \$11,724,625. The net amount at risk at date (31st Pecember) was \$1,083,709,935, being \$45,022,316 more than in 1901. It is divided as follows: Canadian, \$255,049,293, an increase of \$33,292,656; British, \$694,660,815, an increase of \$169,587; American, \$133,999,827, an increase of \$11,560,073. The amount paid for losses aggregated \$4,158,958, being a decrease of \$2,615,998, as compared with the year previous. 

HON. JOSEPH HOWE THE GREATEST ORATOR B.N.A. HAS PRODUCED.

Began Life as a "Printer's Devil"—His Wonderful Oration at the Detroit International Commercial Convention-A Famous Libel Suit in Which He Defended Himself-Confederation Fight.

"I shall depend upon the sober sec-"I shall depend upon the sober second thought of my countrymen to come right at last, and do me justice, and I hope that justice will be done me by-and-by," said Joseph Howe. After the neglect of 30 years, the province which he loved so well is about to erect an enduring monument to his memory. Nova Scotia, boastful that she has been the birthplace of more great men than any boastful that she has been the birthplace of more great men than any
other province, has proved singularly
callous to her famous son. Worshiping him at first, some men turned
their backs on him, and heard his
name with hisses. The act which
would be considered by Canadians
to-day the wisest in the career of
Howe was the sin which his enemies
could not forgive. Howe opposed Coafederation, therefore Canadians are
unmindful of his claims upon their
respect and honor; Howe accepted
Confederation, so a factive in Nova
Scotia hated him.

Greatest Canadian Orator.

Joseph Howe was undoubtedly one of the finest characters this country has produced. As an orator the only man whe can be compared with him is D'Arcy McGee, and the Irishman was not a Canadian in the sense that Howe was, Mr. Joseph Pope says of him in his "Life of Sir John Macdonald," he was incomparably the greatest orator that British North America has produced. The most eloquent appeal ever made by a Canadian was that of Joseph Howe in Detroit at the International Commercial Convention. On that occasion Howe's oratory was such that the United States delegates would have decided in the surface of the mercial Convention. On that occasion Howe's oratory was such that the United States delegates would have decided in favor of the continuance of the Reciprocity Treaty had the vote been taken on that day. And yet in this magnificent oration Howe repudiated annexation, flung it back in the faces of the Americans who yet hung spellbound on his words. Despite the fact that he was an Imperialist of the Imperialists, Howe was probably more popular in New England than in any part of Canada outside his native province. No man of the day was in greater demand at large gatherings in the Eastern States. He did not think of the most pleasant things he could say to Americans, and his Boston speeches might have been delivered in Halifax. No characteristic of Joseph Howe's was more marked than his fearlessness. The people of the United States have newer failed to love and respect this quality. Undazzled by the glare of party politics, they formed a truer estimate of the great countrymen.

in the time of persecution," as one of his biographers rather vaguely expresses it, four Howes left England and settled in the United States. Their descendants spread from Maine to California, and aumbered not fewer than a thousand at the time of the American Revolution. Only one of them, Joseph's father, chose the King's side, and he was forced to seek a new home in Nova Scotia. A courtly, educated gentleman, his worth was appreciated, and he was everywhere respected. Never an active politician, he yet was made King's Printer and Postmaster-General of Nova Scotia. His son Joseph was born in 1803, and received little regular education. At the age of 13 he went into the office of The Halifax Gazette as printer's 'devil." For 11 years he set type, wrote poems and sketches, and mastered the somewhat varied accomplishments of a journalist of the time. CURIOUS SCENE IN GENOA.

Street Where the Sun's Light Is Obscured by Drying Clothes One of the most curious scenes in all Italy is to be found in the laundresses' quarter in Genoa. This quarter consists of a short street which is reached by descending a few steps branching off from the main thorough-fare. Buildings of six stories rise ou each side of the sfreet, and from ev-ery one of their windows is stretched one or more clotheslines sagging with the weight of apparel of every kind and condition. An eternal shadow cast by hundreds of drying garments hangs over this quarter and makes it dark and gloomy. The pedestrian who looks upward toward the blue sky can see



5. Not properly chargeable to the Province. Officials, payment of whose accounts have been deferred or declined, may make a further claim for the amount thus deducted, supported by such further material as they may have or as may be required by the Department.

The practice of the Board of Audit in the past has been to include these recharges in the next account of the interested officials, issuing the usual order for the whole amount, leaving the County Treasurer to adjust the overpayment on the previous account occasioned by reason of the "deduction."

This procedure is responsible for the very serious loss sustained by the County in connection with this sec-tion of the recent Treasurer's ac-

The change in method suggested is

The change in method suggested is as follows:

A Deduction Register to be opened, in which all deductions and advances shall be entered by the Treasurer. The Board of Audit to examine the deduction sheet, for the purpose of determining the amounts (if any) payment of which is to be assumed by the County, the remainder being by the County, the remainder being chargeable to the interested parties, in the Deduction Register. The Chair-man of the Board of Audit to initial man of the Board of Audit to initial all deductions which are to be assumed by the County. A statement to be prepared from this Register giving particulars of all the sums entered therein, charged as deductions and advances, for presentation to the Board at each meeting. The Board of Audit will then make a reduction in the appropriate the part warrant.

or Audit with them make a reduction, in the amount of the next warrant or order issued in favor of the person chargeable with the deduction, by the amount thereof. Particulars to be shown upon the counterfoil of the warrant book. warrant book.

Upon this being done the County
Treasurer will make the necessary
entry in the Deduction Register to
balance the account.

It frequently happens, especially in
the case of Constables, that two or

the case of Constables, that two or taree quarters may clapse before an account is presented from which the deductions may be made. By present methods deductions such as these, are lost sight of.

It is proper to state that the present Clerk of the Peace upon assuming office, at once recognized the necessity of a change in the method of treating deductions and has been subtracting those of which he had knowledge, from time to time.

MISCELLANEOUS. MISCELLANEOUS.

Many forms have been prepared and put into use since the commencement of the audit to which no reference is made in the report; and there are many matters of more or less immany matters of more or less importance, to which attention might be profitably called, the adoptions of recommendations in connection with which would be beneficial, which have not been touched upon in this re-

port.
Much detail touching the current Much detail touching the current work of the officer's open to improvement, but it is impossible to cover these in a single report. This should be the work of the regular auditor. There are certain matters relating to the accounts between the city of Chatham and the County, into which I have not gone exhaustively, for the reason that these will require to be looked into in connection with another accounts that the near future are appointment in the near future, and one examination will answer, with less expense to both.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

As a result of my observations in onnection with this inspection, audit connection with this inspection, audit examinations, certain suggestions and recommendations have been made throughout this report. I now confirm all such as recommendations coming under section 14, chapter 228, R. S. O. 1897, which provides that "it shall be the duty of every member of the Council" to "see that the recommendations."

CONCLUSION

Owing to the extent of the irre-gularities, the method of keeping such books as were kept, the entire ab-sence of other necessary books; and to the further fact that an enormous to the further fact that an enormous mass of correspondence was required to verify payments to the Treasurer, and to docate and confirm matters and things which were in doubt and required clearing up in order to arrive at the approximately correct position of the corporation, the investigation has occupied somewhat greater time than was anticipated. I may mention that the letters written in connection with this matter will exceed seven hundred.

The requirements and necessities of the corporation have been carefully kept in view in all the recommendations made.

an exhaustive audit of the accounts.

The present officials of the County
and all others with whom I have
come in contact, have throughout
evinced the utmost willingness to
assist in the examination and audit,

and honorable conduct of ex-Warden
Rankin in performance of the responsible duties which devolved upon
him in connection with the initial proceedings of the present investigation.

GOMPERS AT MONTREAL.

THE BIGGEST DEMONSTRA-TION EVER HELD THERE.

President's Warning to the Strikers-No Change in the 'Longshoremen's Strike-1,300 Troops Under Arms-Ships Delayed and Business Disorganized.

Montreal, April 30.—The greatest labor demonstration in the history of this city took place to-night, when up-

wards of 15,000 workmen formed a procession and marched to Sohmer Park, where President Gompers of the American Federation of Labor delivered an address. Mr. Gompers announced, amid cheers, the settlement of the carpenters' strike, with the demands of the union satisfied, and then dealt with the longshoremen's strike. He acknowledged their right to go out, but his message to them was: "If you value your honor, your liberty and your future, keep the peace. Do not allow'your enemies to provoke you to breaches of the law." The men dispersed quietly after the meeting.

The 'longshoremen's strike is unchanged. The wharves to-day have been practically deserted by the union men, and the soldiers have had nothing to do but stand on guard. They have found the heat very severe. Private Woodburn was overcome at noon and had to be taken to a hospital. There are about 1,300 men under arms within the revetment wall, and the work of inhoading the vessels proceeds very slowly. It looks as if the militia is prepared to stand the siege for some time, for marquees and cooking utensils have been ordered out. Several large steamers are expected in port at the close of the present week, and as most of them have sufficient men to unload and load, the militia will be obliged to remain on duty to afford protection. The Sarmatian of the Allan Line arrived to-night, and the Corinthian is due in the morning. The strike and consequent delays will alter the entire sailing schedule of this port, and what is to be done with the vessels coming in is one of the important questions. There are now about 200 men at work unloading the five steamers in port, and they could use twice as many. Last night several gangs were let in stealthily, and when once they got in they were supposed to remain. About a dozen policemen guard the Independent Labor Bureau. A number of business men are already protesting against being obliged to have their clerks patrol the waterfront in uniform, instead of attending to the duties of their employers. The House divided at an early hour this morning, after spirited closing speecies by the Minister of Customs and Mr. E. F. Clarke. Mr. Tarte voted with the Opposition, and Mr. Jabel Robinson voted with the Government.

Death of Waterloo's Oldest Citizen. Waterloo, April 30.—Mr. Mathias Stricker, Waterloo's oldest resident, died here this morning in his 94th year from paralysis. He was born near Wurtemburg, Germany, in 1809. He has lived retired in Waterloo ever since 1874.
