SHOCKING CHILD MURDER.

A Parent's Horrible Confession.

Lynn, Mass., May 25.—Lynn is just now enjoying another highly flavored sensation, which is creating almost as much comment as the trunk mystery. It is the murder of a child ten days old, by its unnatural parents to save themselves from disgrace. The body was found in the woods near Malden, and John N. Buzzell was arraigned in the Court to-day as one of the principals. A man answering his description, with a woman was seen to drive into the woods last Saturday and the Police with this clue captured him. The woman was soon arrested. Her story of the awful scene in the woods is briefly as follows:—"I have been intimate with Buzzell for over a year. Some time since I became aware that I was likely to become a mother, and my parents also came to the knowledge of my condition. Marriage was suggested, but Buzzell represented that he had married on the 4th of this month. It was really his father who married on that date, and so of course this way out of the difficulty had to be abandoned. Buzzell proposed that I should be taken to the house of his sister Mrs. Currie Mayo, Chelsea. This was done, and on the 6th of May the child, a girl was born. Proper medical attendance was procured and both I and my child were soon doing well. The next question was how to dispose of the unwelcome babe, and it was decided to take it to some lying-in hospital in Boston and leave it. On Saturday I went from Chelsea to Boston in a horse car, to meet Buzzell by appointment. I met him near School street, and we went to the hospital and made an effort to have the child taken in. The admission of the child was refused on account of its age, the manager saying that if the child could be brought there when it was two weeks older it would be provided for. I then returned to Chelsea, and soon after was joined by Buzzell, who, during the time we were separated, had hired a team, and when he came with it I got in with the child in my arms.

THE FATHER STRANGLES HIS BABE.

"We started for the woods. Upon reaching the woods Buzzell stopped the team, and deliberately asked me to strangle my child. This I refused to do, and I was horrified at the proposition. Buzzell then said, "Why, you can run your finger down its throat and kill the little thing in a minute." I was overcome with horror at this suggestion, but Buzzell angrily took the child and deliberately strangled it until it ceased to struggle, and was apparently dead. I covered my face with my shawl while he did it.

Boston, Mass., May 25.—John Buzzell, of Lynn, confesses to murdering the child for which he was arrested on suspicion.

PEACE WITH AFGHANISTAN.

The Treaty Signed by Both Sides—Great Advantages Secured.

London, May 25.—The Secretary of State for India this afternoon received a telegram from Major Cavagnari stating that he had signed a treaty with the Amirs of Afghanistan. A Simla despatch states that the British will remain at Candahar until the autumn. It is probable Yakoob will request them to stay longer, as his brother Ayoub is at Herat preparing to seize Candahar whenever it is evacuated. The treaty with Yakoob is most satisfactory. Every political and commercial advantage the British hoped for has been gained.

TERRIBLE DEATH AT ELORA.

A Miller Torn in Pieces Among Revolving Machinery.

Elora, Ont., May 22.—A shocking accident occurred in Elora grist mill about four o'clock, by which one of the proprietors, Mr. Henry Dorton, aged about 65, lost his life. While in the act of oiling the machinery on the second, his clothing was caught by a revolving shaft, making 150 revolutions a minute, and in less than a moment his body was torn to pieces. The limbs were severed from the body, and entrails strewn on the floor. The sight was of the most shocking description. Deceased had been absent from the first hat about half an hour, and was not known to have been upstairs. His son, on going to change the slide on the 3rd story, discovered his father revolving in the machinery. He immediately stopped the belt, ran to the lower floor, stopping the entire machinery. An inquest was held, and a verdict of accidental death returned.

LOCAL AND GENERAL.

It is stated that a glass manufactory is to be started at St. Louis, Kamouraska, Que., where large beds of silica have been found.

THE QUEEN'S PLATE.—The Queen's Plate was competed for at Picton this year, and was won by "Moss Rose," owned by D. W. Campbell, of Milton. There were four entries for the race, but only three started. "Moss Rose," the winner, is a beautiful bay mare, four years old, and stands 15 hands, 2 1/2 inches high.

Voters' Lists.—Those who have to do with the preparation of the voters' lists would do well to remember that by an amendment to the voters list Act passed last session, the letter "J" is to be put after the names of all voters qualified to serve as jurors, and that their post office address is to be indicated by numbers as explained in the act.

REGISTERING DEBENTURES.—The Act chapter 176, page 1803, of the Revised Statutes of Ontario, calls upon Registrars to provide a book for the registration of debentures issued by the corporation or upon their order in private hands. Every holder of a debenture should register it, as some solid claim for the recovery of its value can then be entered for it in case of loss by fire or accident.

Mr. F. A. F. Dunbar, a native of Quebec, and relative of Mr. A. Dunbar, barrister, who has recently executed an excellent bust in plaster of the Marquis of Lorne, has become the pupil of his Excellency. As the young man has a taste for the sculptor's art, and has shown much proficiency, the Governor General has determined to defray the expenses of a course of study in Italy. He will leave Canada in a few weeks.

Michael Fagnano, of Artimo, is accused of forgery. Some time since he bought a horse from Joseph Kidgor, and to have been made by Patrick Fagnano, a brother of the accused. At a recent division court Patrick was sworn on the notoriety denied having made it. The horse Michael was deemed to have been guilty of forgery, and a warrant for his arrest was put into the hands of Constable Alex. G. Roy, of Mount Forest, who made the arrest, and prisoner was committed for trial.

Farmers' Land Measure.—The following table is given to exchange to and farmers in estimating the amount of land in different shaped fields. It may some time prove useful to those of our readers who follow the profitable and honorable occupation of tilling the soil: 5 yards wide by 98 long contains 1 acre; 10 yards wide by 184 long contains 1 acre; 20 yards wide by 242 long contains 1 acre; 30 yards wide by 322 long contains 1 acre; 40 yards wide by 421 long contains 1 acre; 50 yards wide by 500 long contains 1 acre; 60 yards wide by 579 long contains 1 acre; 70 yards wide by 658 long contains 1 acre; 80 yards wide by 737 long contains 1 acre; 90 yards wide by 816 long contains 1 acre; 100 yards wide by 895 long contains 1 acre.

Mr. Brier is very popular throughout the whole district and is universally liked, having occupied the position of Warden of the County for the past seven years. His past experience in municipal life will naturally make him well qualified to represent South Bruce should the collected, and we trust such may be the case.

Who Shall Not Vote.—The following section 4, of the elections Act, is published for general information: The chief justices and the justices of the court of appeal, the chancellor and vice-chancellor of Ontario, the chief justices and judges of the courts of Queen's bench and common pleas in Ontario, all county judges, all officers of the customs of the Dominion of Canada, all clerks of the peace, county attorneys, registrars, sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, deputy clerks of the crown, and agents for the sale of crown lands, all postmasters in cities and towns, and all officers employed in the collection of any duties payable to Her Majesty in the nature of duties to excise, shall be disqualified and incompetent to vote at any election; and if any public officer or person mentioned in this section votes at any such election, he shall thereby forfeit the sum of two thousand dollars, and his vote at such election shall be null and void.

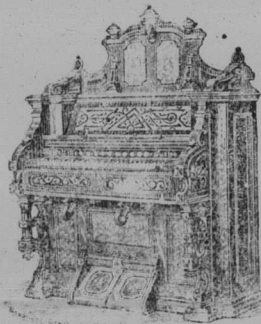
