CANADA POSTAGE.

Issue 1851-58. -In 1851 three values were issued: -3 pence, 6 pence, 12 pence. The three pence was red or red brown in color. In design it had—a beaver in the centre surmounted by a crown, and the letters V.R. in capitals, and surrounded by an oval frame, in which was inscribed 'Canada Postage' above and 'three pence' below; in each corner was the figure 3. The 6 pence was lilac, purple, black lilac or black. It had a picture of Prince Consort in oblong perpendicular frame "Canada Postage" above, "six pence" below, and a figure "6" in each corner. The 12 pence was black. It is a very rare stamp: it is classed as an error. It had a profile of Queen Victoria (crowned), facing to the left, enclosed in an oval perpendicular frame, Canada Postage' above and 12 pence below.

In 1855 a ten-penny stamp was issued, color dark blue, design-head of Jacques Cartier in oval perpendicular frame, "Canada Postage" above, "10 pence" below, "8 pence st'g" in both top corners, "10 pence cy" in both lower corners. In 1857 the half-penny and seven and a-half-penny stamps appeared. The half-penny was pink, head of Queen Victoria to the left in oval frame, "Canada Postage" above and "half-penny" below. Theseven and a half pence stamp was green; its design was-head of Queen Victoria to the left in oval frame, similar to the 12 pence, "Canada Packet Post" above, "6 pence sterling" below "71/2 d cy." upper and lower right hand corners. "6 pence sterling" in upper and lower left hand corners. In 1858 the 1/2, 3 and 6 penny stamps were issued perforated. The above issues are found on various kinds of paper, and in many shades, the principal ones are here catalogued.

Issue 1859.—Owing to a change in the currency of Can. from £.s.d. to \$ and cts a new set of stamps was issued in 1859. The set consisted of five values. The designs were like the equivalent values of the preceding issue. The one cent was like the half-penny; the five cent like the three pence; the ten cent like the six, ence; the twelve and a-half cent like the seven and a-half penny: the seventeen cent like the ten pence. In 1864 a two cent stamp was issued. It was of a design similar to one cent; color—pink. All the above were perforated.

Issue 1868. -In 1868 a new set of stamps were issued. They were all of similar design. The denominations were: - 1/2 cent black, I cent brown red, 2 cent green, 3 cent bright red, 6 cent brown, 12½ cent blue, 15 cent violet. The design of the stamps may be described as follows:-Profile of Queen Victoria to right in circle, Canada Postage above, and the value in figures and letters below. All this set was perforated. This set is found on thin and thick wove, laid and watermarked paper.

REGISTRATION STAMPS.

In 1875 three denominations of registration stamps were issued. Shape, oblong. The value was printed in letters across each end, also in figures in the upper corners. The words "Canada Registered Letter stamp. The values were : 2 cent orange : 5 cent green and 8 cent blue. The 2 cent was also issued in error, the color by mistake being made brown instead of orange, and as but few of these stamps were issued they are very scarce. A few sheets of the 5 centgreen were also issued unperforated by error. All of these stamps are printed on wove paper.

OFFICIALLY SEALED.

In 1879 the Dead Letter Department issued an officially sealed stamp; it was used only at Ottawa. Its color was brown. It had an inscription as follows, printed in one straight and two curved lines across the face in type of various sizes: "Post Office, Canada. Officially Sealed. Dead Letter Office."

Issue 1860. In this year stamped envelope, were first used. Two values were issued—5 cent and 10 cent. The 5 cent was vermilion in color and the 10 cent was chocolate. The envelopes were printed on laid paper which was watermarked with lines running diagonally from left to right. Across these lines was another mark "Ca" and "P. O. D." The size of these envelopes was 3½ by 5½. Very few of these were used and as a result are very scarce.

Issue 1877. In this year two more values of envelopes were issued: I cent blue and 3 cent red; The size of the I cent was 3 by 5½. There were two sizes of the 3 cent, one size being 3 by 5½ and the other 3½ by 5½. The envelopes were watermarked with diagonal lines.
