OUR LIGHTING SYSTEM

The action of the town of Kent-
ville in deciding to purchase the com-
plete business of the Kentville Elec-
tric Light Co. will we believe, com-
mended itself more to our citizens
as the years pass. Of course the
manner of conducting such an im-
portant service for the town will
depend largely upon the persons in
charge. But it cannot be said that
our town affairs are neglected had
carelessly maintained. It will pay
the town to keep active and com-
petent officials to continue their work
We took no special part in urging
the citizens to favorably consider the
purchase. The people took the proper
course to ask for information and
when obtained and it seemed favor-
able for the town to purchase the
franchise and plant, to vote accord-
ingly. We believe the town has ob-
tained the plant and personal prop-
erty accompanying it, at very favor-
able terms, even considering the
necessity for needed repairs and im-
provement. The franchise of the
Company is a valuable one and seem-
ed of no value to the town as long
as it controlled by Kentville citizens
who had the welfare of the town at
heart. had the town refused to pur-

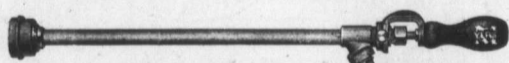

PUBLIC NOTICE

Military Service Act, 1917.

Men 19 and 20 Years of Age.

Harvest Leave.

Leave of Absence on Ground of Extreme Hardship.

Procedure to obtain Leave of Absence.

Men Nineteen and Twenty Years of Age.

It has come to the attention of the Government that there is a widespread impression that young men of nineteen years, and those who became twenty since October 13, 1917, as well as those who may become nineteen from time to time and who have been or will be called upon to register under the Military Service Act, are to be immediately called to the colours.

This impression is quite incorrect. No date has yet been fixed for calling upon such men to so report for duty, nor has the question been brought before the Cabinet for decision. In view of the need of labour on the farm, it is most unlikely that consideration will be given to the matter until after the harvest is over, although of course the Government's action must be determined primarily by the military situation.

There is no further obligation incumbent upon young men of the ages above mentioned who have registered or who do so hereafter, until they receive notice from the Registrars.

Harvest Leave.

Some enquiries have been received as to the possibility of granting harvest leave to such troops as may be in the country at that time. No definite assurance can be given on this point as advantage must be taken of ships as they become available. On the other hand, harvest leave will be given if at all possible.

Leave of Absence on Grounds of Extreme Hardship.

It is desired that the Regulations respecting leave of absence in cases of hardship should be widely known and fully understood. Such leave will be granted in two cases:— (a) where extreme hardship arises by reason of the fact that the man concerned is either the only son capable of earning a livelihood, of a father killed or disabled on service or presently in service overseas, or in training for such service, or under treatment after returning from overseas; or the only remaining of two or more brothers capable of earning a livelihood (the other brother or brothers having been killed or disabled on service, or being presently in service overseas, or in training for overseas or under treatment after his or their return from overseas); brothers married before 4th August, 1914, living in separate establishments and having a child or children not to be counted, in determining the fact that the man is the "only" remaining son or brother; (b) where extreme hardship arises by reason of exceptional circumstances such as the fact that the man concerned is the sole support of a widowed mother, an invalid father or other helpless dependents.

It is to be noted that in all these cases the governing factor is not hardship, loss or suffering to the individual concerned, but to others, that is, members of his family or those depending upon him.

Procedure to obtain leave of absence.

A simple system for dealing with these cases has been adopted. Forms of application have been supplied to every Depot Battalion and an officer of each battalion has been detailed whose duty it is to give them immediate attention. The man concerned should on reporting to his unit state that he desires to apply for leave of absence on one or more of the grounds mentioned and his application form will then be filled out and forwarded to Militia Headquarters, Ottawa. In the meantime, if the case appears meritorious, the man will be given provisional leave of absence for thirty days so that he may return home and continue his civil occupation while his case is being finally disposed of.

PAPER CANDLES FOR SOLDIERS

A torch for use by soldiers in the trenches and in their dugouts a torch so simple that any child can make it, is the invention of Mrs Edward Gushee, wife of a New York physician. Mrs Gushee and a staff of girls and boys are now making these torches by the hundreds, and intend to send them in large quantities to the front, according to the Seattle "Post-Intelligencer".

To make one of these torches take a newspaper and with a ruler tear it into strips two columns wide. Place six of these strips, one on top of other, or tear six newspapers at once if you find this easier, roll them up leaving a small hole through the centre; tie the roll with a cotton string, winding it the whole length; boil in paraffin for twenty minutes, and let it cool.

This makes a candle which can be lighted with a match and will burn without smoke for three quarters of an hour. It gives better light than an ordinary candle, quite enough light for a soldier to read write or sew by. Brooklyn Eagle

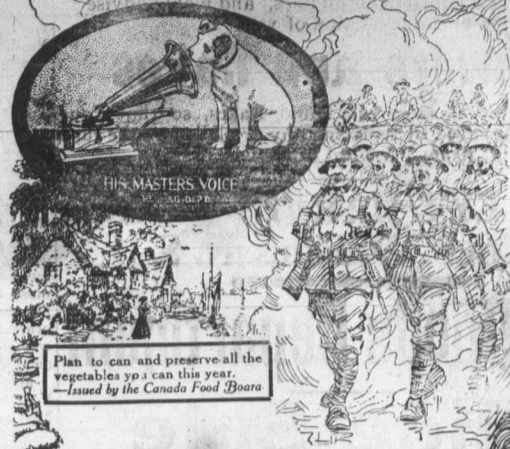

OBITUARY.

MISS JEAN E. GRIERSON
(From Yarmouth Herald)

Many persons throughout Yarmouth town and county were much grieved when it was learned that Miss Jean Elizabeth Grierson, the much beloved and highly esteemed teacher of the primary department of the South End school, had passed away at the Yarmouth hospital. Miss Grierson had been in poor health for some time, but by her great determination and love for her work among the young, continued at her school until five months ago, when she was taken seriously ill and was ever since confined to her home until about four weeks ago, when her physicians advised her removal to the hospital. Her condition was such, however, that little could be done for her and during the past few days, although she held out a most buoyant spirit for resuming her work amongst the young, those nearest to her realized that the end was approaching and she passed away as stated.

Miss Grierson was born in New York and was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Grierson, natives of Kirkpatrick, Durham, Kirendbrightshire, Scotland, who came to America and located in that city in 1852. Mr. Grierson was an architect and builder by profession and in 1862 he removed with his family to Kentville, where he resided until his death. During his residence there he was superintendent of the car department of the W. & A. Railway and later the D. A. R. Miss Grierson was the third daughter and took up studies and fitted herself for a teacher early in life, and in 1883 came to Yarmouth County and located at Tusket, where for five years she was a teacher in that village. In 1889 she came to Yarmouth to take charge of the primary department of the South End school and ever since that time she has done much in shaping the destinies of many of the young of our town. Her love for the work amongst the young had no bounds. Being of a most philanthropic spirit her whole life was given to their welfare and comfort, and only a very few persons fully know just how much Miss Grierson did in their behalf. Particularly was she watchful of the poor and needy ones of her school and times without number, have the little ones during the extreme cold winter weather been made warm, dry and comfortable, enabling them to pass in enjoyment what otherwise would have been a cold, distressing season. Her work with the children in the schools was also done in such an easy, kindly manner that even the very youngest developed an affectionate regard for her, and those who, unfortunately, could not grasp the simple teachings of the department as readily as others, were never slighted, but on the other hand had her greatest attention, so in that respect, as well as many others, her passing away will be deeply deplored.

Miss Grierson, through her long career amongst the young, developed and has, from time to time, put into vogue many new and useful methods for the tuition of the young children, all of which had always received the highest commendation and support of the school principals, inspectors and other authorities. Her services to the Yarmouth schools was, without an exception, determined and conscientious, and she always held the highest respect of her many associates on the teaching staff. This was most plainly evidenced in 1914, when she passed the twenty-fifth anniversary of entering the town's employ, and was most fittingly remembered by the teachers and others of the schools. She is survived by two sisters: Mrs. W. S. Uhlman, Carleton, Yarmouth Co., Miss Kearen, of Kentville, and one brother, Judge Grierson, of Weymouth.

A service was held at the residence of Mrs. William Law, Yarmouth North, and was conducted by Rev. Dr. Hill, assisted by Rev. Dr. Bambrick. The remains accompanied by Mrs. Law, with whom she had always made her home, and Judge Grierson, was sent to Kentville Wednesday morning for interment.

The funeral at Kentville was held on Thursday 13th, at 3 o'clock from her former home. Burial at the Oakes
