CORRESPONDENCE

To the Editor of the ACADIAN. GENTLEMEN,—When I first read Dr. G. E. DeWitt's letter in the ACADIAN of the 6th inst., I decided to let it pass without comment from me, as I was persuaded that the majority of your readers understood the meaning of common words in the English language and can draw correct conclusions from a plain and simple statement of facts and are in no danger of having their minds distracted by the learned Doctor's sophistry, contained in said letter. But as the Doctor has made a false statement of fact in the said letter, I think it proper to once more ask your kind indulgence, and I now request you to publish this short reply. In the Doctor's letter above referred to as published in your paper is this paragraph: "The restriction clause in the deed sent to Mr. Coy and in substance if not in letter is the same as in every deed given by the Company reads as follows: Architecture of buildings required to meet the approval of the Company, no fences permitted on these grounds. The Company herein prohibits forever the sale of intoxicating liquors in this residential Park." In the deed conveying to me the lots advertised by me, in your paper, for sale, there is not a single sentence, word or syllable prohibiting, referring to, or mentioning in any way whatever the sale of intoxicating liquors, or referring to all to intoxicating liquors. Nevertheless this Deed was given by the Wolfville Fruit Land Improvement Company Limited and bears the Corporate Seal of the said Company and also the signature of the same G. E. DeWitt who signed his name and styled himself "President" opposite to the said Corporate Seal. If Doctor DeWitt has been negligent and careless in executing a deed without any clause referring to intoxicating liquors, after signing the original agreement of sale about which he has written so much, then this Deed is something for the said Company (whose servant he is) to investigate. If the Doctor shall choose to publish any more false statements I do not wish your readers to think that I acquiesce in such statements simply because I may not take the trouble to contradict them.
