TEN YEARS IN THE **PENITENTIARY**

Sentence Passed Upon Mrs. Bessie Parker

Standing cooly, and calmly facing the court, without the least showing of emotion, Bessie Parker was sentenced to ten years in Dorchester Penitentiary, by his Honor Mr. Justice Chandler, in the Circuit Court, upon an indictment charging abortion. When asked by His Honor if she had anything to say before sentence was passed the prisoner replied. "I have nothing to say for my self, Your Honor, but for my mother's sake I would ask you to be as lenient as possible." The Court promised consideration of the request.

Mrs. Parker was brought into the court room just a little before 12.30 o'clock. She entered the premises jauntily, with a nod and a smile for some acquaintances sitting or standing about. Her mother was seated just by the doorway and she paused for a in the dock, and kissed her. She stood with head erect while the judge was addressing her, and, when sentence had been passed, continued to stand, and, turning in the direction of the prosecuting attorney, W. M. Ryan, asked; 'Are you satisfied now?" with a defiant and vengeful expression.

Judge Chandler told the prisoner that she had had a fair trial and been found guilty, and it was Carrying a grudge for long years, now his duty to pass sentence upon her. He could make that sentence most severe-it was provided that he could impose a life he must give her quite a few years by reason of the evidence and the conviction in punishment for the crime and as a warning to others. He then passed the sentence of the Court, as stated above. The prisoner's counsel E. S. Ritchie, when asked by the court if he had anything to say, said that it was his intention to examine into a point raised by him in connection with corroboration of evidence. His Honor said he could not grant a reserved case; there had been a change in practice, but counsel would have the privilege of deal-

Socialists are considerably embarrassed by the appeal and no decision has been reached yet.

Some members of the cabinet admit however they cannot advance any especially good reason why the Prince should not return. The Dutch Government has agreed to the Prince's request to leave Holland, it is understood on condition he will not ask to ret urn to his refuge in Wieringen In his new application, the Crown Prince, as he is still called by m ost Germans, urged consideration of his former arguments. As a German citizen, the Prince argued, he cannot be refused a shelter in his homeland.

The Prince said he would enter Germany quietly by motor car avoiding any ovations. In addition the Prince in substance said, "In these trying times as w loyal German, I want to be in my home country to participate in the reconstruction of the Fatherland.'

Foreign observers said it was conceivable that the application might be acted upon favorably although it was admitted that the Prince's presence in Germany might be hailed as a rallying sigwal for the Monarchists.



The Yukon Territory is rapidly losing its inhabitants. In 1911 the population was 27,217, and in 1921 it had dwindled down to 4,157.

In an address to the Rotarians in Montreal last week, E. W. Beatty, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, made a pointed statement to the effect that Canada needs more capital for its development and more men for the same purpose.

This has been the greatest season for automobile tourists Montreal has ever experienced, according to the Secretary of the Automobile Club of Canada. Cars, he stated,

Club of Canada. Cars, he stated, had come into the city over the King Edward Highway at the rate of two

hundred a day, an unusual number from California, Florida, Carolina and Virginia being noticeable.

There was nearly \$160,000,000 increase in the total trade of Canada for the first five months of the cur-

for the first five months of the current fiseal year, according to a return made by the Department of Customs and Excise. The total trade of the Dominion, according to the return, for the five months ending with August, was \$785,000,000, as against \$626,000,000 during the same period a year ago. Import. during the period were about \$393,000,000, as against \$303,000,000 a year ago, while exports of Canadian produce rose from \$316,000,000 approximately to \$386,000,000.

There is a heavy demand for bushmen, according to the Govern-ment Labor Bureau at Montreal. The big lumber companies have been engaging men for the bush, and the prospects are that the demand will

prospects are that the demand will be sufficient to make fall and win-ter conditions good. Wages paid this year by the lumber companies are higher than last year, the rates paid being \$40 and \$45 a month, whereas a year ago the schedule was down to \$26 a month.

With the completion of the harbon

With the completion of the harbor works now in progress, Montreal will be in a much better position in 1924 to handle a record flow of grain than ever before. Windmill Point elevator will be increased by 1,250,000 bushels storage capacity, making its total capacity 3,250,000. Four additional shipping berths are being provided at this elevator and will be in commission early next month, and the elevator's loading capacity will be increased from 50,000 to 90,000 bushels an hour.

Reports to the Canadian Pacific Railway, show that there arrived at Winnipeg from the British Isles this year for the purpose of working on the harvest, 11,833 men. Special efforts are being made to find occupation for as many as possible to cover the winter period, and it is stated that it is now probable that a considerable number of these harvesters from Great Britain and the Irish Free State will remain in the Dominion.

Addressing a recent meeting of the Vancouver Board of Trade, President E. W. Beatty, of the Canadian Pacific Railway, announced that the company proposed immediately to add two large modern steamers to its coast ficet in order to take care of increasing tourist traffic over the company's coastal lines. He also announced the early completion of a new pier at this harbor at a cost of several millions, which has been made necessary by the steady development of Canada strans-Pacific trade.


