T. & L. Council Calls Protest Meeting Sunday Night

Military Enquiry Closes; No Judgment Given Yet

No Change in Firemen Situation And Trades and Labor Council Calls Public Meeting For Sunday Evening

MILITARY ENQUIRY INTO FINANCES OF 19TH REGIMENT CLOSES AND ITS FINDINGS WILL BE ANNOUNCED AS SOON AS POSSIBLE

Conference Between Members of Chamber of Commerce, Fire and Light Committee and Officers of Firemen Last Night Failed to Bring Forth Anything in Way of Settlement —No Disorders Last Night.

There is no change in the situation relating to the firemen's walk-out. The meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, the Fire and Light Committee and the Firemen's Association last night failed to bring about anything in the way of settlement of the trouble, the Chamber and Labor Council met and decided to call a public meeting of the King George Theatre tomorrow to protest against the action of the City Council with reference to the wages of the firemen. Last night saw no repetition of the previous night's lawlessness. There was only one alarm and that was at 7 o'clock last night by a fire which was extinguished before it had reached the St. Paul region. The firemen went out in a hurry and found no one on hand. Chief Early and his men were on hand ready to do anything that turned up but nothing did. It was one of the quietest nights the city has ever seen, in contrast over the previous nights.

A mass meeting was arranged for the special purpose of giving the citizens an opportunity to hear fully the firemen's side of the case and at the same time express approval or otherwise of the City Council's conduct. Ald. Avery arrived at this juncture and was enthusiastically received. The alderman answered a few questions which were asked him in reference to the situation.

The members of the Fire and Light Committee say they have plenty of applications of men who want to take firemen's jobs but they are holding the positions open to allow the old men to come back to work. The man who left has already returned and the Committee hopes to get the others back before long. The Trades and Labor Council will meet at the meeting of the Trades and Labor Council last night, President who occupied the chair. In his opening remarks said he thought the Minister of Labor might have given advice from Labor's side, as the civic officials whether it was necessary to hope an investigation or not. REPORT FURTHER OUTRAGES FROM SOUTHERN IRELAND

LONDON, April 10.—Further outrages in different parts of Ireland were reported today. A vacated police barracks at Blackroy, outside the Limerick boundary, was burned down. Four men arrested, under the defense of the realm act, were taken to Cork. A. Nemagh, Tipperary, reports three constables were shot at while riding bicycles from Rear Cross to Newport. It is said that one of the constables was killed, that another was fatally injured and the third badly wounded. The Protestant cathedral at Ross Carberry, County Cork, was entered Wednesday night and the statue of the late Lord Carberry, valued at \$1,000 was damaged beyond repair.

Weapons Alleged to Have Been Used in the Teiper Murders Shown in Court

Revolver and Tire-irons Found in Field Identified By Coley—Physicians Say Teiper's Injury Did Not Appear to Be Serious.

BUFFALO, N. Y., April 10.—The placing in evidence of the weapons which the prosecution alleges were used to kill Mrs. Agnes Teiper and her son, Fred Teiper, on the Orchard Park Road on the night of January 30, 1916, the testimony of the two physicians who examined the defendant the day after and the story of the first police officer to reach the scene of the tragedy, were the features yesterday in the trial of John Edward Teiper. The murder weapons were introduced for identification by Richard R. Coley, the first witness called in the afternoon, and consisted of a revolver, a hammer and two tire irons. Coley testified they were found in the plowed field directly opposite the point in the road where the crime was committed. The prosecution alleges it was from the revolver Coley identified, that one bullet was fired through the head of Mrs. Teiper, another across the cheek of Miss Grace J. Teiper and three others through the curtains of the mother's touring car. After shooting his mother and sister the prosecution alleges the defendant fired through the auto curtains to

strengthen his story of a holdup on which the defense is based. Dr. Willard B. Jolls and Dr. Howard L. Hunt, both of Orchard Park, testified that they examined Teiper the day after the tragedy and found him in normal physical condition. Both agreed the bump on his head which he said he sustained at the hands of the highwayman he alleges killed his mother and brother was not of a serious character. To both physicians Roscoe R. Mitchell propounded a hypothetical question covering the allegations of the defense that Teiper was struck across the head and rendered unconscious by the same blunt instrument used to beat out the brains of his mother and brother. The meat of the question was whether or not the defendant could be knocked unconscious with the blow leaving no other evidence than the slight bump on his forehead. The physicians said that this was possible. It was Constable William G. Baker of West Seneca who described the scene on the Orchard Park road. He was the first police officer to arrive after the tragedy. The constable's testimony consumed nearly the entire morning's session.

Make Small Loans To Help Workers

One Million Dollars Will Be Spent To Help Mechanics From Canadian Relief Fund

Rehabilitation of Poland's middle class of mechanics, artisans and small tradesmen, ruined by the war, by expending \$1,000,000 through small loans, is the plan of Dr. Boris D. Bogen, Director-General of Jewish Relief Work in Poland, is now working on, as one of the main features of the reconstructive relief program now being carried on in that country. "Perfect administration ready to carry this work on," Dr. Bogen called the Canadian Jewish Relief Committee. "This is wonderful opportunity for constructive service." Heading a unit of 25 skilled relief workers, which recently arrived in Poland, Dr. Bogen, with headquarters in Warsaw, through his unit has his relief organizations covering practically every part of stricken Poland, by reports, while couriers are covering the country, delivering remittances from Canadians to their destitute relatives in Poland. In line with Dr. Bogen's reconstruction policy, an appropriation of \$250,000 for use as small loans to aid in rehabilitation work, was included in the March expenditures of \$710,000 for Poland, by the Joint Distribution Committee, relief dis-

SAYS JOHN REED INDICTED IN U.S., KILLED BY FINNS

CHICAGO, April 10.—An unconfirmed report that John Reed, magazine writer, had been executed in Finland has been received here, Lloyd B. Heth, assistant district attorney, announced today. Reed is under indictment here, charged with conspiracy to advocate the overthrow of the government by force. Reed, who has been an active adherent of the Lenin-Trotsky regime in Russia, and represented the Bolsheviks for a time as "consul-general" at New York was captured by the Finns last month while trying to leave Russia disguised as a stoker aboard a steamship. Cable reports said a large number of diamonds and a quantity of Bolshevik propaganda reduced to microscopic size and printed on photographic films, was found on his person. Little Sympathy At Ottawa With Hydro Schemes

SIR ADAM BECK SUSPECTED OF SEEKING AID—BREAKING UP G.T.R. SYSTEM NOT POPULAR

OTTAWA, April 10.—Sir Adam Beck's elaborate plan for the extension of the Hydro-radial system by the acquisition and electrification of the lines owned by the Dominion Government has no sooner been broached at Ottawa than objections loom upon the surface. The capital is not a place where either Sir Adam or his plans are in particular favor. Between him and the Dominion Government the relations are not the most amicable. Dr. Reid, with whom he conferred yesterday, has often given vigorous expression to opinions not very flattering to the head of the Hydro and Sir Adam has replied in kind, if he were not the aggressor.

No sooner had the knight left the offices of the minister yesterday than D. B. Hanna, head of the Canadian National Railway entered and the two have always been at daggers drawn. It will be surprising therefore if any scheme for the acquisition of electric lines now existing or for the electrification of the Grand Trunk branch line by the Hydro will elicit any concurrence either from Mr. Hanna or the management of the Canadian National lines. An opinion which is voiced freely around the corridors among the Ontario members is that in the proposition he has put forth, Sir Adam is seeking aid from the Dominion Government in pulling certain chestnuts out of the fire in the form of promises for radial extensions. To succeed, he will have to neutralize this opinion. The main argument in favor of buying the Grand Trunk was that it would provide the necessary "feeders" for the Canadian National railways. The line is being acquired at what considering its obligation, will prove to be a very heavy expense and in government and parliamentary circles here the predominant idea is that they will be held. The contention is that the Government having bought the whole thing should proceed to operate it.

Any proposal for dividing up the system to meet the purposes of the Ontario Hydro will be opposed by the members and ministers from other provinces, and will not lack opposition even from Ontario. Sir Adam reported yesterday a favorable reception and a satisfactory outlook, but there are grave doubts if much more than that is accomplished.

FORSAKES THREE PUPILS TO TAKE JOB IN FACTORY

PEEKSKILL, N. Y., April 10.—The Rev. Ellis Slipperly, pastor in three suburban Methodist Episcopal churches, today discarded his frock coat for a pair of overalls and began work as an apprentice pearl cutter in a local factory. He announced he had resigned his pastorate because he "couldn't make both ends meet" and would confine his preaching to "relief work which would not interfere with factory duties." His salary as a pearl cutter would be several hundred dollars a year more than his salary as a minister, he said.

Lt.-Col. Burleigh Recalled as the Last Witness Capt. Patterson Again Examined—One Soldier Admits Getting Paid Twice, But Innocently on His Part.

The military enquiry into the 19th Regiment finances came to a close last night after Lt. Col. Burleigh had been recalled to the stand. His evidence produced nothing new. Large expenditures had been made without getting bills or receipts and he was unable to furnish any vouchers whatever. Gen. Cruickshank announced when the court closed, that its findings would be given as soon as possible. Capt. Stuart Patterson was further questioned at the military enquiry yesterday with reference to duplication of names on pay sheets and he said his recollection was such that he could give no information to Gen. Cruickshank and his court. He was then asked what had become of the money drawn for certain officers and men who had not received it.

He said he presumed the money went into the general fund. "We know beyond doubt that on one pay sheet Col. Trail was drawn for \$155 and did not receive it," said Gen. Cruickshank. "We know \$135 was claimed for Capt. Stevens and he never received it. We know \$35 was claimed for Chaplain Kerr and he received only \$22. We know \$105 was claimed for Captain Dyke and he did not receive it. We know \$22 was claimed for Signaller Jackson and he was paid on another sheet. We know all these things, now how do you account for such appalling errors and inaccuracies?"

Cat. Patterson could offer no help. "If such a thing happened in private business what would happen?" pursued the President but without result. Col. Young took up the questioning and asked Patterson if he remembered any one thing he had done at the time. "Or were you merely walking boss for Turnbull?" he queried whimsically. At this point Patterson was asked to step down to allow Major George R. Bradley to testify that he had never authorized anyone to sign the pay sheets for him. This was in connection with the "George R. Bradley," and "G. H. Bradley," appearing on the pay sheets.

"I received the pay but it is not my signature," said the Major. "Evidently somebody did know how to sign but he didn't know your name," remarked the Gen. "My absence from the post an hour would not necessitate someone else signing my name." "Now you are getting at it, can you tell me who signed your name?" asked the court. "Absolutely not," said Bradley. "I haven't the slightest idea who signed for me." He remembered Capt. Patterson paying the men on one occasion at least. Capt. J. O. Merritt was shown a paysheet of 12th to 21st August 1914 overseas draft. He said he received pay at Valcartier by cheque from Col. Belson. He was quite sure it was not

a cheque from the 19th Regiment but a regular government cheque. Some money he said came from some source with which to buy the men footballs, etc. W. L. Erskine admitted being paid twice in August 1914. He said he asked no questions. He received \$26.40 from Aug. 8th to 24th. "I never examined the amount I was ever paid in the army," said Erskine. "I simply signed where they told me and took the money that was given me." He never clearly remembered getting some advance of pay, he said. Capt. Patterson recalled said he was quite satisfied the cheque for payment of the 4th Battalion draft were received by him and deposited to his account. The amount was

SAYS DESERTIONS THREATEN WHOLE NAVAL SERVICE

WASHINGTON, April 10.—Thousands of desertions in the navy in the last year have brought conditions unparalleled in American naval history. Rear Admiral Thomas Washington, chief of the bureau of navigation, today told the senate investigating committee. The whole naval service he warned, is threatened with disaster unless Congress immediately enacts legislation raising the pay of officers and men to a point that will allow the navy to compete with civil occupations. Rear Admiral Fletcher, member of the navy general board, testifying as to the navy's preparation for conduct of the war, disagreed with Rear Admiral Sims' charges that the navy was unprepared for war and had no well defined plans or policies.

Judge Solves Problem For Health Officer

NIAG. FALLS, N. Y., April 10.—Mrs. Mary Koeban of No. 2723 East Falls street was in police court on complaint of Health Officer W. A. Scott, who accused the woman of taking a son, ill with typhoid, from the Memorial hospital to the family home, which the health officer said was not in the best sanitary condition. The woman said her husband was ill and she was unable to pay the hospital bill. She said she had five children besides the sick boy. Police Justice Charles H. Piper directed Dr. Scott to have Charities Commissioner Louis Elmer investigate the financial standing of the family and have the city pay the hospital bill if the family could not afford it.

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THE SAVING OF REFORM

The chief trouble with reform as at present conducted is that it makes professional reformers.

Good citizens get together to choke the life out of some intolerable evil. They give the movement a great amount of energy, perhaps much money. But American and Canadian citizens are busy men, and their time is precious. So very soon the body of good citizens hires a secretary, employs a lawyer, or establishes an institution to carry out purposes the public spirited citizenry cannot spare the time for.

By this course, specialists have been created, profession has been established according to the Detroit formula. Secretaries, lawyers and institutions proceed energetically to smash the particularly offensive evil into small bits. But self-preservation requires that the professional reformers thus brought into being shall keep their jobs in mind. So before an evil done for, another has been brought to the light and spectacularly advertised before the body of good citizens. Thus the money keeps coming in. The jobs are kept intact.

Inevitably evils which are of minor character, mere human frailties, and of no particular harm to society in general, get on the bad books of the professional reformers. Judgment varies in the matter of selecting the evils to strangle. Sometimes a real one is attacked, but a softer very small evil is exaggerated out of all proportion—reform develops into mere busyness and nagging—a man with a comparatively harmless habit finds himself the victim of a harassing, irritating propaganda. It would be impractical and unwise to put restrictions upon buying of good cigars that would make reform. But it ought to be possible to compel the professional—once some particular evil has been scotched—to quit the business. It will be uncomfortable for them to go out and hunt new jobs, but it would be comforting for the defenceless public and the salvation of the good word Reform.

MAYOR OF RACINE SAYS HE NEVER GAVE FAMILY MAID RIDE ON HIS KNEE

RACINE, Wis., April 9—Mayor William Armstrong, on the stand to answer his wife's charge of infidelity, in the preliminary hearing to Mrs. Armstrong's divorce suit, today vigorously denied that he had been unfaithful or that he had dangled his housemaid on his knee.

A neighbor testified that he looked across to the Armstrong window, saw the mayor in his den, and then saw the maid enter. The mayor took her by the wrists, he said, "and rocked her on his foot," much as a grown person would play hors with a child. Aside from the character witnesses Mayor Armstrong was the only witness at today's hearing, at noon the defense rested in case and suggested that the jury return a verdict of not guilty. Attorney for Mrs. Armstrong also declared that they had finished. When the preliminary hearing is disposed of, the regular divorce trial will begin.

Dominion of Canada



Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants, as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T 2.

Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

General Instructions.

Obtain Forms from the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation or from Postmasters.

Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.

Prepay postage on letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.

Make your returns promptly and avoid penalties.

Growth Shows Desire To Extend Army Work

Commissioner W. J. Richards, chief of the Salvation Army in Eastern Canada, has completed his fifth year in that capacity. During that time the Army has seen one of its greatest periods of usefulness. This period takes in the "war years." The great war had been under way since Aug. and new problems presented themselves to the organization when he assumed command. These problems required a large measure of initiative to overcome. The task of rendering the highest and most efficient service was shouldered and Canada paid tribute to the success which attended those efforts by over subscribing the amount asked for during the Red Shield Drive.

Commissioner Richards is a forceful man. He is a man of few words. He believes in doing things. During the five years, more than 11,000 persons are recorded as having sought salvation. Notwithstanding the losses due to war, there are today nearly 2,000 more names on the Membership Roll than there were in this territory five years ago.

In July, 1915, Canada East was separated from Canada West, the dividing line being Port Arthur. Even in view of this, there are now only forty one fewer officers in active service in the Eastern territory alone than there were in the combined territories five years ago.

In the Field Report two very striking indications of financial growth are given. In 1914, the Self-Denial total for the combined territories was \$43,726. In 1919, for Canada East alone, it was \$75,591. Harvest Festival returns have been doubled.

Shows Solid Growth.

He had some \$400 in his pockets, and when a man leaped fro the side of the road and ordered him to halt Bergeron believed he was to be the victim of a hold-up. Instead of stopping he 'stepped on 'er' and the automobile dashed past the officers at forty miles an hour.

Thinking they had discovered some of the men who have been getting rich by selling Canadian whisky to Detroiters, the police party, made up of Provincial Officers Hannah and Smith, and a "mountie" in plain clothes, opened fire with revolvers on Bergeron's car. None of the latter's tires were hit, however and pursued and pursuers sped on for a mile or more before the chase came to an abrupt end when Bergeron was struck in the head by a bullet and was forced to release his grasp on the wheel.

His wife stopped the car just as officers came up. When the mistake was discovered everything possible was done by the officers who took the wounded man to the nearest physician for aid. It was found that the bullet had smashed a small bone above the left ear, but Bergeron's condition is still critical.

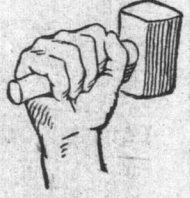

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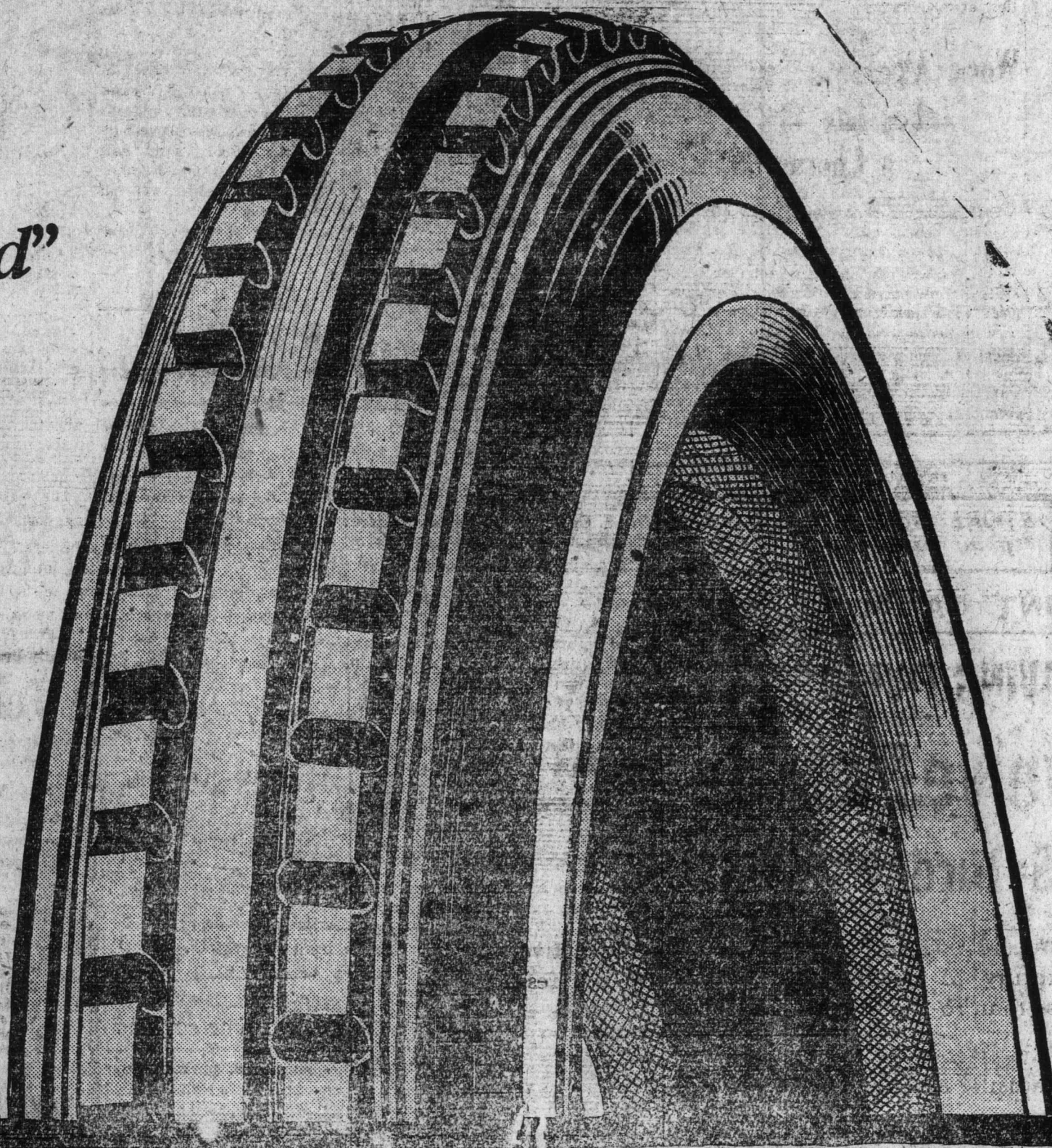

Carpentier Had Sore Arm When He Disposed Of English Champion

NEW YORK, April 10.—Georges Carpentier knocked out Joe Becket with a right arm he hadn't been able to use for almost a week, according to Jack Blumenfeld, the British middleweight.

Blumenfeld was one of the seven sparring partners who set out to go through a six weeks' course training the Frenchman for his bout with the British champion.

"I was the only one who was able to stick it out," said Blumenfeld, "more than a week before the

fight. Georges slipped in his training quarters and fell heavily on his right arm. The bones were bruised below the elbow and the muscles were strained. We kept it a secret. The public was not admitted to his quarters, and no one knew when he went into the ring that he had a lame arm," he said.

"This Joe Beckett is one tough bird, believe me. He's not the boob the Americans think he is. When Georges went in and put him away with one punch from his disabled arm, I made up my mind there that no living man can whip him.

"Has he a punch? Well, let me tell you he has. He not a murderer of sparring partners though. He always asks to be told when he's hitting hard. I told him more than once and he can take a punch. He's awful hard to hit, being very fast and

shifty on his feet, and he never takes the same punch twice. His blows are short and snappy, and they come over with terrific steam.

"Another thing I like about him is the way he trains. He always wants about five or six weeks to get ready for a big fight, and that long grind is no more to him than a dance. He smokes cigarets, eats what he wants to and acts normal. He's not temperamental and never irritable. He studies, too.

"I've sparred with Joe Beckett and Bomby Wells, and I know what kind of a punch they can take. I know also that any man in the world is vulnerable to a punch on the right spot of the jaw. Carpentier knows that spot, and he's clever enough to put a right or left there the first chance he gets. If he gets that chance against Dempsey, he'll win the championship."

PROTECTING HUMAN LIVES

The Ontario Safety League continues to place a large amount of literature in the hands of motorists, school children, industrial workers, and others throughout the Province. In the first three months of 1920 the League has distributed an enormous amount of safety material, including 35,000 industrial safety bulletins; 32,400 school safety bulletins; 8,500 special bulletins; 8,500 traffic bulletins; 2,700 electric railway bulletins; 150,000 motorist's safety book-marks; 10,200 health bulletins; 5,500 news letters; 9,000 safety calendars; 12,000 leaflets to the "new man"; 125,000 gummed seals; 3,000 safety cards and posters.

The League will hold an annual meeting in Toronto, beginning Tuesday, April 13th at the King Edward Hotel.

AIRPLANE ROBBERY ALIBI

CAUSES TALK IN ENGLAND

LONDON.—The Benson Minnesota case of establishment of an apparent alibi in a robbery case by use of an airplane for a swift flight of 100 miles has attracted wide attention in Britain.

The little item arrived in the midst of a crime wave which has been baffling Scotland Yard. The press pounced upon it as a basis of questioning officials.

General Sir Neville Macready announced that the possibilities of certain classes of crime being undertaken by means of aeroplane is receiving attention. He points out that in his report to the home secretary he stated that the police were considering methods of coping with air crimes. The Scotland Yard view is that smuggling will be the chief item under this head and that it may be difficult to cope with it, due to the ease with which the channel may be crossed.

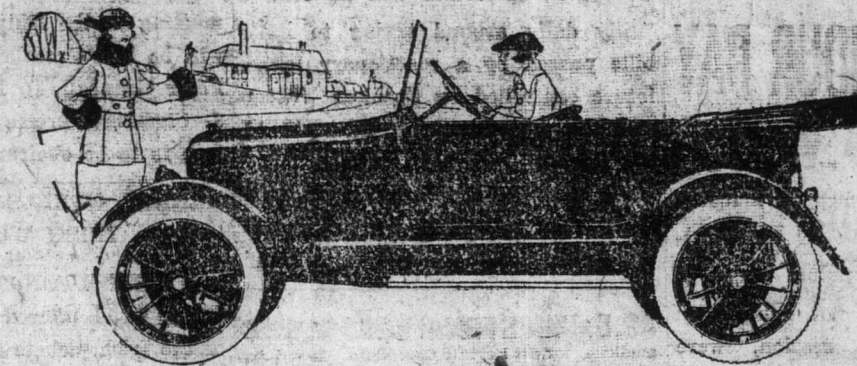

THREATENS STRIKE

500,000 WOMEN FOR 8-HOUR DAY

ALBANY, April 10.—Threats of a strike of 500,000 women in industry to force the adoption of an eight-hour day and a minimum wage, if the legislature does not enact such laws at the present session, were contained in a statement prepared today by representatives of the women's joint legislative conference.

The strike proposal is made by Miss Rose Schneiderman, president

of the New York Women's Trade Union league, who noted the women's joint legislative assembly conference that the 75,000 trade union women in the state will no longer "dilly dally around trying to have bills passed by a reactionary legislature controlled by Speaker Sweet and the manufacturing interests of the state."

"Labor," Miss Schneiderman said, "has come to realize that it cannot expect any relief through legislation."

CANADA'S AUTOMOBILE INDUSTRY

Throughout Canada there is one automobile for every twenty-five people, the Dominion in this respect taking only second place to the United States, where there is one to every fifteen persons. Since the introduction of the car into Canada, the industry has made phenomenal strides. Just how remarkable the growth has been may be realized from the fact that whereas in 1909 the production of cars in Canada was 1,350; in 1919 the number of registrations totaled 324,848. By provinces the registration of cars is as follows: Ontario, 139,288; Saskatchewan, 54,792; Alberta, 34,000; Quebec, 29,183; Manitoba, 29,163; British Columbia, 19,500; Nova Scotia, 2,800; New Brunswick, 2,001; Prince Edward Island, 939.

At the present time the sum of \$50,000,000 is invested in the Canadian motor industry, and its various lines account for the employment of more than 15,000 people. The estimated aggregate sale of cars in Canada last year was over \$100,000,000 and expert investigation has elicited the probability of a 35 per cent increase over these figures for the year 1920.

Ontario Canada's Motor Provinces.
Ontario is the motor province of Canada in manufactures as well as ownership. Windsor, with its surrounding communities of Walkerville and Ford City, Ottawa and Toronto are the most important manufacturing towns. The Ford Motor Company at Walkerville employs 3,470 employees at the home office. The plant covers 2 acres. The recently completed plants of the Canadian Products, Ltd., division of the General Motors of Canada, constructed at Walkerville, cost \$6,000,000. Other large plants in the Windsor district are Maxwell's and the Studebaker Corporation, in addition to which there is a large number of plants turning out accessories and automobile parts. At Oshawa, the General Motors Corporation of Canada has three large plants, where McLaughlin, Chevrolet and Oldsmobile cars are manufactured. Last year between \$2,000,000 and \$3,000,000 was spent in this town on extensions and improvements in connection with the industry. In Toronto the Willys-Overland is the principal plant, whilst London, Chatham, Kitchener, Hamilton and Brockville are also interested in the manufacture. Montreal, in Quebec, is also largely interested in motor industries.

Imports and Exports.
Canada is largely interested in both the import and export of automobiles. In 1919 the imports of cars, parts and accessories amounted to \$12,201,118, while exports for the same period were valued at \$10,858,224. The imports were practically all from the United States. The growth of the export trade can be seen from a comparison with the figures of 1917 and 1918 which were \$3,210,120 and \$4,418,975 respectively. Australia was the Dominion's best buyer last year the Commonwealth buying \$2,440,000 worth of cars. New Zealand came next with \$1,185,000, then the United Kingdom, \$721,000 and India \$664,000. Turkey took freight automobiles to the value of \$621,023, exports to the United States totaled \$229,068, mainly parts, and to the Argentine Republic \$352,460.

The British preferential tariff which went into effect on September 1st, 1919, is expected to impart a considerable stimulus to the Canadian automobile industry. It grants preference of one-third provided that not more than 25 per cent of the labor on the finished car shall have been done within the British Empire.

British Isles In a R

LONDON, April 12.—After experiencing two crises last week, the rebellion in Ireland and the rift in the Entente cordiale in France, the British public frayed today for another week of "acid" notes to France and the "Irish Peace Treaty," which is under consideration Wednesday.

On Thursday the executive council of the Miners' Federation meets to discuss the strike ballots, and there is also a new rail crisis expected when the demand of the railway for a one pound a week increase wages is expected to re-open the wage question, with a probability to the National Wages Board while politics, labor, liquor taxes, etc., may disturb the national economy.

French Proves "Thorn"

The British Government is seriously handicapped in its efforts to effect a clean-up of the Administration in Ireland by Lord French's determination to stick to the job. There is no doubt the Government has been embarrassed by his attitude. When Hamar Greenwood was appointed Chief Secretary and General MacDonnell named as Military Commander, the Government anticipated the Vice-Chief's resignation, intending to make MacDonnell the supreme military authority in Ireland, and appoint a Viceroy who could adopt a position independent of social leaders and advisers.

Lord French, however, is determined to stick to the job, but every possibility is being brought to bear to influence him. When the Government determined to adopt a new policy to effect a clean-up of the Administration in Ireland it intended to make MacDonnell the supreme authority in Ireland, but as long as Lord French remains this is impossible.

Scotland Becomes Restive

The Government has been much embarrassed during the last week by the discovery that a mass of munitions shells and field artiller shipped from Scotland from Germany were not in the hands of the army.
