Synopsis of Canadian North West Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, suitable for farming and build may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manltoba, Saskatchewan or Alberts. The appli-Orders left at Kilns on St. cant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending

Duties-Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father. mother, son, daughter, brother or sis-

In certain districts a bomesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter ection alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre

Daties-Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of home-I. A. Mathiesen, K. C., R. A MacBenald stead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has oxhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain nestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties .- Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
