Synopsis of Canadian North West Land Regulations

Any person who is the scle head o family, or any male over 18 years may homestead a quarter section available Dominion land in Manito Saskatchewan or Alberta. The ap cant must appear in person at the minion Lands Agency or Sub-agen for the district. Entry by proxy p be made at any agency, on cer conditions by father, mother, son. daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Daties-Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres bolely owned and occupied by sim or by his fathe mother, son, daughter, brother or sis

In certain districts a bomesteader i good standing may pre-empt a quarte \$3.00 per acre

Daties-Must reside upon the home each of six years from date of homea homestead patent) and cultivate fifty

his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchas. ed homestead in certain districts. Price 83.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside aix months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a houseworth \$300.00.
