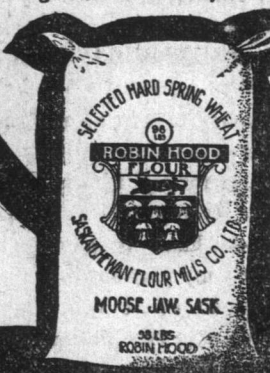

"Sleep, that knits up the ravel'd sleeve of care, The death of each day's life, sore labor's bath, Balm of hurt minds, great nature's second course, Chief nourisher in life's feast." —Shakespeare.

I love that tribute of Shakespeare, for I am an almost fanatic believer in the supreme value of good sleep as a prime factor in every happy and successful life.

Show me a successful man, and in nine cases out of ten, I will show you a man who, whether he gets a great many hours' sleep or not, will tell you that he sleeps well and soundly.

Don't you want to sleep well? Or, if you do sleep well, don't you want to sleep better?

Then maybe a little suggestion, which a friend of mine, who has managed to keep well while doing the work of at least two women, will not come amiss.

For when I asked her how she accomplished this feat she thought a moment and then said, "Well, I think my nightcap walk has as much to do with it as anything."

## The Plain, Unvarnished, Critically Correct Tale.

The Daily News in its editorial this morning directs attention to what it terms the Premier's "effectual rejoinder" and "plain, unvarnished and critically correct tale" delivered nearly a month ago on the Railway Resolutions. This "effectual rejoinder" has been so long in making an appearance that we had forgotten all about it. We thank the Editor of the Daily News therefore for reminding us of it as it enables us to show what reliance is to be placed on the Premier's "plain, unvarnished and critically correct tale."

In the course of his remarks on the Railway Resolutions Sir Robert Bond referred to the fact that the Government had illegally authorized the expenditure of One hundred and fifty thousand dollars on the Bonavista branch railway line on the plea that it was necessary in order to provide relief. To this the Premier replied as follows. We copy from the report of debates published by the Daily News:—

Hon. Premier—"Another statement made by my Rt. hon. friend of the Opposition was that we had spent \$150,000 for poor relief this autumn. I want to take issue with that statement also. There was not one dollar spent on relief."

Sir Robert Bond's "effectual rejoinder" to this incorrect statement was the following letter from the Premier to Mr. W. D. Reid which has been tabled in reply to a question from him and which he read to the House.

Prime Minister's Office,  
St. John's,  
Oct. 5, 1909.

Dear Sir,

Following on the communication of the Colonial Secretary of June 15th, 1909, I have now to intimate to you that the Government will be prepared to discuss with you in detail the terms of a contract to be entered into for the construction of certain branch lines of railway in Newfoundland.

As you, no doubt, are aware, a survey party has been in the field for some time, and a line has been located near Shoal Harbour, in the District of Trinity, and one of the three alternate routes has been reported on favourably by the Government Engineer, and the Government will be prepared to adopt that as the route. Pending the discussion of the details, and entering into the contract above referred to, the Government are anxious to have the work of this Bonavista branch immediately commenced. Owing to the failure of the Labrador fishery during the present fishing season on several portions of the coast, some thousands of our people are deprived of the means necessary to support them and their families during the coming winter, and the Government propose making a temporary arrangement and to commence immediately the construction of the said Bonavista branch by clearing, grading and ditching the route which may be adopted; also to have the sleepers cut to be used in the construction of the said branch; the

work to be done upon the same not to exceed \$150,000. This sum to be devoted exclusively to the labour for the class indicated. The Government will pay you from time to time as the work progresses, and the payments will be regarded as payments on the section of the branch to Bonavista.

I shall be glad to have an early reply from you, and, at the best, we can now only get about two months and a half work before the winter will be upon us.

### Missionary Meeting at Topsail.

The second speaker was Mr. C. R. Steer who, in a very forceful address, demonstrated the true meaning of "Mission," showing that a mission of whatever nature has a three-fold comprehension, viz:—An authority, a messenger and an aim. A Christian Mission has for its authority the highest—Jesus, its messenger—the missionary, and its aim—the leader of the heathen from darkness to light.

The last speaker was Rev. J. K. Curtis who for forty minutes held the rapt attention of his audience, as he showed them the visions that had come to the laymen of the Methodist Church resulting in the Laymen's Missionary Movement, to the Colleges of America resulting in the Student Volunteer Movement, to the Young People's Societies resulting in the Forward Movement of Missions. He showed the good that had already been accomplished by these movements and the bright prospect of future accomplishment. The Reverend gentleman's remarks were interspersed with apt illustrations impressing their truths on the minds of his hearers. The musical items on the programme were a duet by Misses Tucker and Pippy and a solo by Mr. S. J. Tucker both of which were well rendered and deeply appreciated. Miss Emmie Butler of Topsail presided at the organ with much acceptance. As a finale to such an enthusiastic service a collection of \$40.00 was taken towards the Missionary Fund.

Eighty-five years without having made an enemy is a record worthy of emulation.

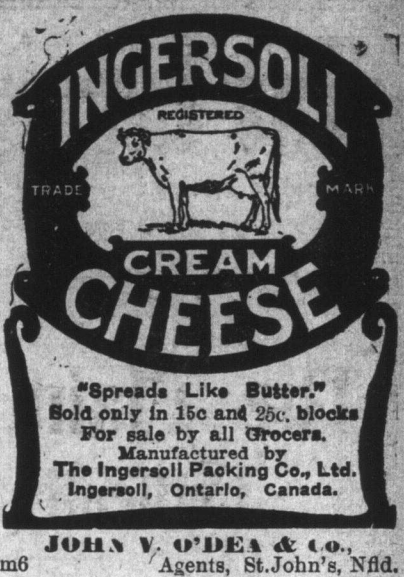

**Fourth Lenten Sermon**  
**By His Grace the Archbishop.**

At the R. C. Cathedral last night His Grace Archbishop Howley preached the fourth of his series of Lenten sermons.

Before beginning the sermon proper His Grace referred to the fact that the Presidents of the different Catholic Societies had awaited on him and arranged for a systematic process of making the church collection on Sundays. It was now to be hoped that the debt of over \$10,000 on the church would be more quickly liquidated, so that the collections and the money paid out in interest would then go to finish the interior of the Cathedral, and make the necessary repairs to St. Patrick's. It had been estimated that if every one who attends one of the Masses at the Cathedral or St. Patrick's on Sunday's would give even only one cent the collection would be \$120. At the present time it was less than \$80, and at this rate it will be a long time before the balance of the debt is cleared off. His Grace exhorted the congregation to take all these circumstances into account and make a greater effort to accomplish the liquidation of the debt.

His Grace referred to another subject which certain information received lately from abroad obliged him to warn the people about. From letters and papers received from the United States he had been made aware that young girls that had gone away from this country had become the victims of what is known as the White Slave Traffic. At the present time three young women from St. Mary's, Newfoundland, who had left their homes to go to join friends in the States a few months ago, were missing. They had completely disappeared and it was believed that they had been intercepted on the trains and steamers by fenshish agents and were now lost body and soul. In our very midst in this city of St. John's there were agents of this White Slave Traffic doing their hellish work. He had definite knowledge on this point, knew the persons and their doings. The police authorities also were now well aware of what was going on, and with the assistance of the ministers of other denominations it would be a strange thing indeed if these fiends could not be driven out of the city.

Proceeding to his sermon proper His Grace took for his text: "He that will not hear the Church let him be to thee as the Heathen and the Publican." The discourse was a beautiful and instructive one, and showed that our Divine Lord when He instituted His Church upon earth gave the first Apostles power to teach only what was truth on all doctrines. The teachings of the Church in matters of faith and dogma are not different now from what they were in the beginning. Doctrines are more amplified and developed to meet the requirements of the times as the centuries go by but the fundamental truths of religion have never been and never will be changed. The centre of authority rests in the Pope now the same as it did in the third century when the first council was convoked at Nice to pronounce upon the heresy that denied the Divinity of Christ. The power of deciding on all such questions affecting dogma known as the infallibility of the Pope is the same now as it was in the early centuries. His Grace then quoted from the celebrated letter of the late Pope Leo XIII. as to the faith that is necessary to salvation. A distinction is drawn between the Body and the Soul of the Church. Those who belong to the latter while not in visible communion with the Church will be saved. The mercy of God is great and who will seek to limit it or who will dare judge between God and the soul. Then there is the question of invincible ignorance. Who will be so presumptuous as to say that those who had good lives and do their best to find out the truth may not be within the "Soul of the Church." Those who obstinately and wilfully refused to accept the light and the truth were in the class referred to in the text above quoted. At the conclusion of the sermon, Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament was imparted.

**General Strike Threatened.**

 PHILADELPHIA, March 2. A universal strike of Union workers and their sympathizers begins at midnight, Friday, and it was proclaimed by the Central Labour Union of Philadelphia and vicinity at a meeting to-night. The strike leaders declare that one hundred thousand men will stop work at that hour, if the Rapid Transit Company shall not in the meantime have consented to arbitrate its differences with the striking car men. Assurances have been received, they say, from hundreds of unorganized wage earners who will join the movement. The meeting at which the strike order was promulgated was large and the sentiment was apparently unanimous in favour of the general strike.

**Four Thousand Are Homeless.**

 CLEVELAND, Mar. 2. At least 4,000 people are now homeless in Ohio as a result of the flood which continues to devastate the State. Numerous plants have been forced to close down and hundreds of men and women are out of work. The material damage is estimated at \$1,000,000. The Licking and Muskingum rivers have passed their record of 1898 at Sandville and are still rising. If there is no abatement of the waters before morning, it is said, the water works power plant will be forced to close, and this will mean the shutting down of all the large commercial plants in this town. Over 900 persons are now being fed by the city.

**Floods Cause Devastation.**

Special to Evening Telegram.  
 SEATTLE, March 2. Mountain floods are sweeping every river and valley in the Northwest to-night, and railroads are helpless to move traffic. Bridges are gone, trackage is washed out and defiles are filled with avalanches. Many river towns are inundated and a large number of people in various places are homeless. The super-abundance of water comes from the melting of vast quantities of snow in the Cascade Mountains by a warm sea breeze. The weather bureau here predicts that water will continue to rise to-night and to-morrow. Thus far the financial loss by the flood has been small and the discomfort of the evicted dwellers along the swollen streams is less than during former overflows.

**First Official Visit.**

 PARIS, March 2. President Fallieres, it was learned to-day, has personally called on Prince Von Radolth, the German Ambassador to France, and expressed condolence in the recent death of the Ambassador's son. As this is the first visit the President has paid to the German Embassy since the Franco-Prussian War, it has created much comment.

**Election of President of Brazil.**

 RIO JANEIRO, March 2. Incomplete returns for the elections for the Presidency, held throughout Brazil yesterday, indicate a victory for Marshal Fonseca, the former Minister of War, who was nominated by a proclamation signed by 175 Senators and Deputies. Dr. Ruybarbosa, a Senator and Ex-President of the Senate, who was nominated last August at the convention of the opposition, was the only other candidate. Returns received up to an early hour to-day give Marshal Fonseca a great majority in the capitals of ten states, which practically assures him of victory.

**The Seine in Flood Again.**

 PARIS, March 2. The continued rainfalls has caused the River Seine to rise 21 feet 5 inches to-day, almost equalling the flood maximum of 1882. The water is again pouring into the mouths of sewers. The weather, however, is gradually improving and the authorities believe the river will not rise further.

**Vessels Collide in Fog.**

 NEW YORK, March 2. In the dense fog which still enveloped New York harbor to-day an accident occurred in which at least one vessel was badly damaged. When the British steamer Sidra, a sugar carrier from Cuba for this port, was anchored in quarantine, it was seen that she had been in collision. Her bow was badly stove in, and she gave other evidence of being in a bad smash-up. The vessel with which she was in collision was the Norwegian fruit steamer Minnesota. Details of the collision have not been learned.

### Humdrum Business.

LONDON, March 1. Parliament settled down to humdrum business of providing for the country's financial necessities at a short sitting to-day. The House authorized the Government to proceed with its loans and also the suspension of the sinking fund. The Budget is held up. It is impossible to collect the necessary income to carry on the department. It is even doubtful despite the debate on the naval estimates the week after next will create great excitement. The Government will submit estimates providing for a considerable increase of the personnel of the fleet, and a gross increase in expenditure on the navy of \$25,000,000 for the year 1910 and 1911. The Conservatives in the House of Commons to-day tried to induce the Government to consent to the adoption of those portions of the rejected Budget over which there had been no contention, but Chancellor Lloyd George refused to be dictated to by the House of Lords as to what taxes should or should not be authorized. The first bye-election for the new Parliament resulted to-day in the re-election of Wm. Wedgwood Benn, for St. Georges in the East, by a slightly increased majority. Mr. Benn had to submit to a contest on being appointed to an office in the Government. John E. Redmond, leader of the Irish party, in acknowledging receipt of further funds from the United States, predicted another general election before many weeks are over. He pointed out that the Conservatives as well as the O'Brienites were preparing to contest every seat in Ireland in the hope of Bankrupting the Nationalists.

### The Philadelphia Strike

PHILADELPHIA, March 1. Determined to demonstrate its ability to operate its cars without the assistance of the striking motormen and conductors, the Phila. Rapid Transit Co. to-day again increased the number of cars in operation on its various lines. The Company declares no settlement involving a recognition of the Car-men's Union will be considered, and reiterates that arbitration is not needed to settle the strike.

### 2,000 Homeless.

CLEVELAND, March 1. Fully 2,000 persons are homeless to-night in Ohio, as a result of the flood which is still sweeping over the state. At Sandusville alone 1,000 persons are reported as having been driven from their homes. The public buildings are crowded with refugees, who are fed by the authorities.






