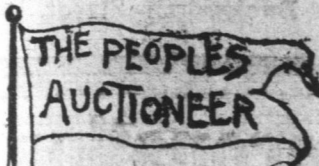

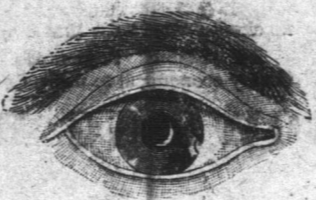

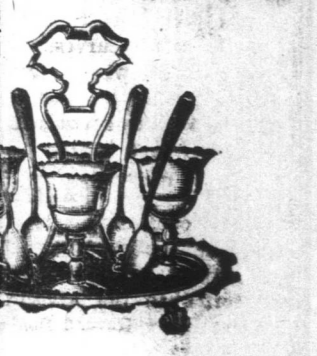

**Silence Speaks.**

Yesterday we drew attention to a remark of the Daily News in reference to a visit of Mr. Lord to Lark Harbor. Mr. Lord is one of the two contractors to whom the Government gave those valuable fishery concessions at the beginning of the year, and which a subservient party endorsed.

Yesterday the Daily News announced that Mr. Lord had with him a Mr. Olie, a fishery expert, who was the representative of a syndicate of American capitalists, and that much would depend on the impression made on this expert in the course of his visit. We asked the Daily News what his statement meant. Whether it could mean anything else than that the concessionists meant to sell out their concession, or to promote a company, whether or not the Daily News meant that these contractors meant to trade on the fishery concession they had obtained for nothing from the Government either in the way of sale or promotion. This morning the Daily News maintains silence. That silence is ominous and in a way is more convincing than language itself. The Daily News is silent and yet speaks, and the public will not be slow to give a meaning to that silence.

This is not what the public were led to expect, and here is proof of it. On February 16th, the Minister of Finance in the House of Assembly said—

"The great feature about this project is that it has been entered by practical men, and not by promoters like Wright, Doull, Sahstrom and others, who came here with such schemes in the past. Messrs. Trefethen and Lord are men, whose names are household words in the fishing business of the United States. They have been engaged in this all their lives; they are actually operating

cold storage plants in New England at the present time, and have an assured market for every dollar's worth of material they will purchase in the Colony, and ship to the United States.

"In Messrs. Trefethen and Lord we have, I think, the right people to do this. They can handle, not alone codfish, but halibut, haddock, herring, salmon, lobsters, caplin, smelts, clams and other fish."

This admission of the Daily News lets in light on what was dark. The Minister of Fisheries said in the House the contract had been drafted by the Prime Minister and the Attorney General. One of the most remarkable features of that bill was the Government Guarantee which proposed so to subsidize and back the cold storage undertaking that in spite of losses the venture would for a number of years pay 5 per cent. Such an undertaking would have been a gift of a big gold brick to Messrs. Trefethen and Lord by the Government. We immediately exposed the undertaking, and public opinion did the rest. The Government was forced to back down. With such a guarantee in their pocket, Messrs. Trefethen and Lord could have made a large sum out of the concession itself. But this feature of the guarantee was modified. The element of financial risk is not entirely eliminated from the Cold Storage undertaking. There remains, however, a subsidy and a more limited guarantee instead of an unlimited one.

At present, however, our criticism is directed towards the strange statements of the Daily News of yesterday and its direct conflict with statements given out by the Government months ago. We want to know what it all means.

Bolt, Rev. James Bell, Rev. J. Brinton, Rev. H. Hewitt, Rev. E. H. K. Cadwell, Rev. Mr. Barton. The ceremony will be a most impressive one.



He chanced to go into the stable at noon and was horrified to find Ziddel's lifeless body hanging from a beam. The man went up on the loft and after adjusting the rope about his neck threw himself through the open hatchway. His feet were up on the floor and his head hung down through the opening in the floor. His shoulder, it is said, was broken, and it is thought this was caused by its striking against the edge of the hatchway as he fell. Besides the \$90 cash in his pockets, it is reported a bank book calling for \$2,000 was also found on him. The body was removed from the morgue yesterday afternoon and sent by the express to Halifax for interment.

When the ball was re-centred the C. L. B. put much spirit into their work, got the ball west and Hunt made a good shot for goal but went wide of the mark. They now secured a couple of corners and Hayward, getting up on the right wing, had the ball right in the chance of the evening for the C.L.B. Stevenson then shot and Thistle barely saved, and later Hayward sent in a "hot one" which struck the goal post. Soon after the C. L. B. boys had two more good chances to score but failed, when Hayward ran up on the right wing, sent the leather flying across the goal mouth and Hunt headed the equalizer amidst great applause into the twines. Soon after the referee's whistle blew half time and the teams crossed, 1 goal each. On resuming the C. L. B. made a determined rush down field and came within an ace of winning, after which for a while the ball was all over the field; both sides working hard to score. Fouls were recorded against both teams, when the Guards got and had a couple of tries for goal but the shooting was too wild to be effective. The C. L. B. then went east and secured some corners, but the alert Guards blocked any attempts at scoring. The Guards now hustled the ball west and clearing all opponents dashed in No. 2 amidst great acclamation. Both sides worked harder now than ever, the Guards to increase the score and the C. L. B. to equalize, but no further scoring was done when the referee's whistle blew. Guards, 2 goals; C. L. B. 1.

### Children's Festival.

The grading will be finished by "Bulls" by the end of this week. Men are now clearing the track on the fourth mile from Cape Broyle. The Hearst's Content branch will be commenced as soon as the survey is finished, probably early in August. The three new cars being built at the R. N. Co. car shops are splendid jobs. There has been a delay in getting the fittings for them from Amherst, N.S., owing to a fire that destroyed the works there. Mr. Hector Ross, Supt. of the car shops, was sent off yesterday by the express to hurry up the work if possible.

### Bought New Vessel.

Yesterday we referred to the fact that a prominent city firm had purchased a fine new vessel. This was Jas. Baird, Ltd. They have purchased the fine auxiliary scler. ### Fire at Harbor Grace.

About 3.30 this a.m. great volumes of smoke was seen issuing from the upper part of the residence of Dr. Strapp, and it was soon found that the whole attic was a mass of flame. The clanging of the fire bells quickly brought the firemen and citizens generally to the scene, and all worked bravely in fighting the fire and endeavouring to save the property of the doctor. The fire occurred in the attic, caused, it is said, by the explosion of a lamp in an incubator. We hear that the amount necessary will be in the neighborhood of \$1,500, and we are sorry to say there was no insurance on the place or furniture. We sympathize, as do all our citizens, with Dr. Strapp in the great loss he has thus sustained. The firemen worked well, as did all our citizens. The business of the town was suspended. Among the willing helpers we noticed the judge, the editor, factory managers and employees, business men and in fact every person seemed to forget all else but a desire to save property. About two years ago Dr. Strapp met a similar loss, and even at the time of the present fire the doctor had carpenters employed on the building, which was up-to-date in every particular. 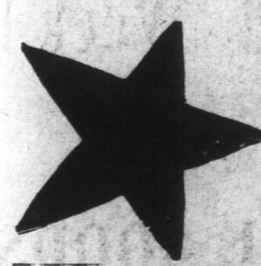


