





Assembly's Tribute to Hon. J. B. Avre.

Before the close of the House of Assembly last night Sir Edward Morris, said:

was a member of this Chamber from 1894 to 1897, has passed away. I refer to the late Hon. John B. Ayre. Those of us who had the privilege of knowing him intimately knew what an ideal type of citizen he was. His example and his life in the community were in themselves assets to the city. were in themselves assets to the city and the country in which he lived. With ample means at all times at his disposal, he was still frugal and con-servative and simple in all his tastes and mode of living, yet liberal to all deserving cases. A devoted and sin-cere member of his own church, in which he was a pillar of strength in all its undertakings, his christianity was still broad enough to succour and assist all creeds and all classes. He was a model type of the Good Samari-tan. He never passed by on the other

side. From early manhood to middle side. From early manhood to middle age he was his father's right hand man, his alter ego, and in those days his untiring industry, unceasing energy in the building up of the immense business of which for a quarter of a century he has been the head, largely aided in breaking down the constitution never robust but which would aided in breaking down the constitu-tion never robust, but which would have sustained him to old age had he not attempted to do more than his share. In public life he was quiet and reserved, but when great principles were at stake he never failed to strongly assert his views, and his sympathy and co-operation were re-garded by all political parties as of no mean strength. IMPORTANT STATEMENT.

LONDON, April 21. Speaking in the Commons this afernoon of the manner in which the Government was dealing with the question of war equipment, Chancellor Lloyd George announced that while Britain had started the war with the assumption that the expeditionary force would consist of six divisions, the country now had more than six times that number of me. in France. These, divisions (about 750,000 men) were adequately supplied; every man who had dropped had been replaced. It was one of the most magnificent pieces of organization ever performed. Nothing like it, he said, had ever been done any country. Stating that as much any country bad been expended in the battle of Neuve Chapelle as during the whole Boer War, Mr. Lloya George said that the character of amnunition had to be changed in the middle of the war, and to secure supplies, sub-contracts were given to beplies, sub-contracts were given to be-tween 2,500 and 3,000 firms. When it was found that they could not keep up the supplies, the Government took steps to take over all works suitable for the manufacture of munitions. As a result there had been a great increase in the output. If they took the figure 20 as the amount of artillery and ammunition manufacture-i in September, in October it was 90; in November, 90; in December, 156; in January, 186; in February, 256; and in March, 388. Britain was also supplying her Allies with munitions, yet in spite of this there was a large reserve. The Chancellor adhered to his statement that a small minority of workmen could, through drink, throw the whole work out of gear. He promised that when the Government measures were introduced, dealing with this matter, it would be found it had not been approached from the point of view of persons who wanted to advance any particular idea or notion, but from the point of view of persons who had one object in mind, the increase in munitions. It was no use saying there was more drinking than normally. ·These were abnormal times and they had to take abnormal measures with an evil which had become abnormal.



Poetry was a serious business in Dante's day and required as much information as a college curriculum 100 cantos and 768 sleeps, not because of its music and inspiration, but because it presents a pretty nearly complete compendium of the knowledge existing in Italy at the

time. Dante put it all in. When Dante was a young man he went into politics and got mixed up with the Guelphs and Ghibellines who fought each other for 100 years with everything from strychnine to chimney pots. He sat in the city council and afterwards became prior, who was a sort of exaggerated police magistrate. Dante had a stormy term and shortly afterwards the opposition got a new supply of powder and was elected by an immense mortality.

At this time Dante retired from Florence. He loved his native city but it was not considered tasteful for a defeated politician to remain at home. So promptly and cheerfully did he retire that by the time the council had sentenced him to be burned alive he was 100 miles away and still going strong.

Dante never returned to Florence because of his aversion to a warm city in Italy, writing poetry and composing his masterpiece. great book he visits Hell, Purgatory and Heaven, guided by Virgil, and into Hell he put all his political opponents, devising an ingenious and special punishment for each. Dante's revenge is not over 600 years old and is still effective.

Dante died in 1321. He was a lean, dark visaged man with a sharp, sad countenance, and a permanent case of homesickness. His sentence of death was reversed in Florence in 1495, but this was 174 years too late to interest him.

KITCHENER NO TERROR TO VON HINDENBURG.
