NAVAL CO-OPERATION.

WASHINGTON, To-Day. Rear-Admiral Sims, President of the Naval War College at Newport, whose arrival in Britain has been announced in London in private despatches, was sent there to act as intermediary between the British Admiralty officials and the Navy Department in working out the problems involved in the participation by the American Navy in the ranks of the Entente Powers. His mission was admitted at the Navy Department to-day after the news of his safe voyage had been received. The Admiral is also charged with the duty of keeping the department fully advised as to the conduct of the war and supplying such information as the Navy needs in preparing itself for the tasks ahead. Conferences between the French, British and American naval officers now in progress here are expected to produce an early agreement for concerted action between the naval establishments.
