New Lignite Process May Lower Coal Bills

Lignite is transformed into a fuel claimed to possess the heating qualities of anthracite coal by a new oven, perfected by the United States Bureau of Mines.

Lignite—primeval wood prevented from becoming coal by the excess of water in the earth surrounding it—underlies great areas of the Northwest. The Bureau estimates the cost of producing it at \$8.17 a ton.

The oven is essentially a vertical shaft with a top opening through which the raw lignite is supplied. Carbonization is effected by maintaining a combustion zone in the middle of the shaft and passing the lignite through it slowly enough to maintain a state of bare combustion.

This is accomplished by supplying air under slight pressure. Varying air pressure and the rate at which the carbonized fuel is discharged regulate the degree of carbonization.

The carbonized lignite is in the form of char, which usually must be briquetted. A ton of lignite yields 42 per cent char.

Giant Planets Now in View

(By Isobel M. Lewis, of the U.S. Naval Observatory.)

The two largest planets of the solar system, Jupiter and Saturn, are now in fine position for observation in the evening.

Saturn will be found nearly due south at 8 o'clock in the evening in the constellation of Virgo, The Maiden. It is yellowish in color and about twice as bright as the white, first magnitude star Spica, the brightest star in Virgo, lying a little to the west of it.

Jupiter is just appearing above the southeastern horizon at this time, and is by far the brightest object in view, now that Venus is drawing in toward the sun and setting earlier in the evening. On the date of its opposition with the sun, June 11, Jupiter will be on the meridian at midnight and will be visible throughout the night.

If it were possible to take the stuff of which these two huge worlds are made and fashion them into many balls the same size as the earth, 1,300 earth-globes could be made out of Jupiter and 760 out of Saturn, not counting the material that exists in Saturn's rings. This would be by no means a negligible quantity, for though the rings are mere sheets, scarcely one hundred miles in thickness, their width is enormous. The inner dusky ring is nearly eleven thousand miles wide.

Remarkable Instances of Second Sight

A little collection of instances of clairvoyance, gathered by a visitor to the Shetland Islands, was published some years ago in a Scottish newspaper.

The narrator was greatly impressed by what he heard, and inclined to attribute them to supernatural agency. They certainly suggest not only clairvoyance, but in some instances possibly spirit agency. But goes without saying that superstition and folk-lore have a considerable part in these things (says a writer in a Glasgow paper). Illusion and fancy are intermixed.

There is the story of an invalid lady who one night mysteriously disappeared. In the morning the whole parish was ransacked, the cliffs for miles round were carefully examined, a loch was dragged, all to no purpose. A night or two later a female nurse dreamed that she saw the lady's body lying in a certain part of a remote loch "that no one had thought of visiting. So certain was she and so impressed were the neighbors by her earnestness, that a party of men set out for the loch, and, sure enough, they found the lady's body as described.

An old man went to fish from a point of rock, where there was deep water, and never returned. Search for him was made, but he was not to be found. A neighbor in a dream saw his tangled body lying at the foot of a cliff which he had to pass. His cap was also seen resting on a ledge a few yards from the summit. The body was found as stated. The cap was also discovered on the ledge.

Portents of Disaster.

The following instances of portents of disaster or death are interesting:—Late one evening a man sees three dark forms wandering round a large stony from which chromate of iron is being dug. The figures are wringing their hands, and exhibiting every sign of distress. Next day there is a big rock while the quarrymen are at work, and three of their number are killed on the spot.

A fire is seen burning outside a house where a man lies ill, and ere morning comes he is dead. A corbie flies over a cottage and gives utterance to its raucous cry of "coou," and shortly afterwards a corpse is borne from that cottage to its last resting-place.

An old man goes out one moonlight night to smoke his pipe and is surprised to see a funeral company composed of the men of the neighborhood slowly passing by. The moonbeams fall on the coffin lid, and the same that appears thereon is his name. Within a week he is being carried to the grave by the very men who had passed before his vision that night.

One morning a steamer (six-cared sailing boat) is returning. All the crew, with the exception of the skipper who is steering the boat, are sleeping. Suddenly the helmsman hears the sound of music overhead. He is sad and dirge-like, and follows the boat for some little distance. No other boats are in sight; sky and sea are alike vacant. The man feels that a terrible disaster, and, sure enough a few days later a storm descends upon the herring fleet and more than a score of men perish.

A parallel case is that of a fisherman who, while in the "ebb" getting ready for bait, hears strange music coming from seaward, but is unable to locate the musician. He is impressed that it is of supernatural origin, and bodes disaster. The following day a boat founders off the coast, where the music was heard, and the crew are all drowned.

Russell Divorce Verdict is Upset by House of Lords

HON. CRISTABEL RUSSEL WINS APPEAL FOR GOOD NAME.

Title At Stake—Child's Claim To Ampthill Title And Estates Involved In Action.

LONDON—(United Press)—The House of Lords to-day sustained the appeal of the Hon. Cristabel Russell and set aside the verdict, under which her husband, the Hon. John Russell, was granted a divorce on the ground of misconduct with an unknown co-respondent.

The Hon. John Russell, the son and heir of Lord Amptthill, holder of one of the oldest peerages in England. The verdict paves the way for probable later action by the wife to establish the legitimacy of her son Geoffrey, with a view to the eventual succession by him to the Amptthill title.

Lord Birkenhead, reading the decision, declared the husband's testimony denying relations with his wife should not be admitted. When the boy Geoffrey becomes 21, therefore, and applies for entrance to the House of Lords, such evidence will not be admissible "and Geoffrey will be pronounced legitimate."

The Russell divorce case aroused unusual interest in England and the litigation has extended over a period of two years. At the first hearing the husband alleged misconduct of his wife and two named co-respondents, but was unable to prove his charges and the petition was dismissed. He later charged misconduct with a man unknown and was granted a decree of divorce, which was upheld in the Court of Appeals. The Hon. Cristabel Russell carried the case to the House of Lords, which has now set aside the verdict.

In the course of the trials, the Hon. John Russell alleged that the child Geoffrey was not his and there had been no relationship. His wife, however, declared that such relationship had taken place while her husband was asleep, and that the child was the legitimate offspring of the marriage. The case had been commonly referred to in England as "the sleep-walking son."

Use of Press as a Deterrent to Crime

London, June 9.—(By United News).—Scotland Yard's latest trick on those who believe that honesty in the boob's policy is the publication of two newspapers—one a two-edition daily and the other a semi-weekly—deterring dolags of the underworld.

The daily paper is known as the "Police Information." It is published at noon and six o'clock in the evening and distributed by motorcycle throughout the metropolitan police area. A daylight robbery is reported the same day to all parts of London, and the story about it gives every possible hint that could aid in the capture of the robbers. Pictures of men arrested over-night are published in the noon edition, and frequently lead to their identification as participants in other crimes.

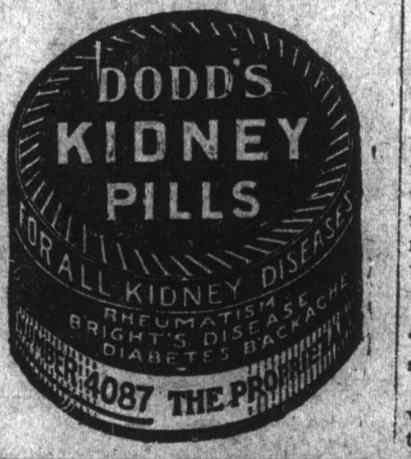

Montreal Council Condemns Steel Corporation—Also F. N. McCrae, M.P.

Montreal District Council of the Canadian Labor Party yesterday adopted a resolution protesting against the employment of Orientals on the ships of the British Empire Steel Corporation, on the ground that Chinese were employed at cheaper rates of pay, which had its reflex on conditions of Canadian workers, forcing many on the unemployed list and seriously affecting Canadian standards of living. Copies of the resolution will be forwarded to the Minister of Labor, to the Minister for Immigration and Colonization, to Labor members in the Federal Parliament, and to Labor newspapers in Great Britain.

Widows and War Pensions

That a country never gets done paying for a war is pretty well exemplified in the United States in connection with the Civil War of over a half century ago. To be exact the Civil War ended fifty-eight years ago and still millions a year are being paid out to either veterans or the widows of veterans. Of Civil War widows there are no less than 275,000 on the payroll of the United States, and of that number 488 are only 42 years of age, and about the same number

18, 49, and 52 years old. There are some 3,000 Civil War widows that are between 53 and 67 years old. In other words all those mentioned were born after the war closed and many of them a good many years after, conclusive evidence that these old soldiers were an uncanny fondness for young girls, or perhaps it was the other way around, and the girls saw a handsome living ahead of them if they could marry some old veteran with prior 1919 in the grave.

Prior to 1919 the U.S. was spending annually \$150,000,000 on these pensions, but later bills passed by Congress has added to the annual distribution of largess until the total stands at the very considerable sum of \$250,000,000 yearly, which seems quite enough for a war that is nearly sixty years old.

Belgium Emancipated

Manchester Guardian: The Dawes' Report has given a rallying point to all the moderating forces in Europe, and, so supported, Belgium is able for the first time to exert a real and independent influence on the course of events. It is possible that her statesmen may even begin to realize, if indeed some of them have not long since realized, that the whole policy of the military alliance with France is a mistake. The military alliance of a small Power with a very great one is at best a one-sided affair, involving a good deal more of dependence than of reciprocity. Its fruits in the present case have not been to the advantage of the weaker Power. If Belgium has now recovered something more than she has hitherto enjoyed of independence it may well prove a gain to both parties to the alliance. She is doing her best to-day to reconcile the policy of France with that of France's other former allies, which is also Belgium's own. She is better placed than any other Power for the task, and we must all wish her success.

French President Decides to Resign

Temporary French Ministry Meets Defeat —King George Saved From Mishap by Good Horsemanship—Italian Immigrants to Canada Turned Back.

MILLERAND REFUSES TO RESIGN.
PARIS, June 10. President Millerand in a message sent to Parliament today, refused to resign his office. The President said "narrower counsellors, in partisan interests, are trying to see that the Legislature begins with a revolutionary act by the Chamber. I will refuse to follow them. The Senate will wish to remain, as for formerly, in gravest circumstances, the defender of the constitution. I appeal confidently to the wisdom of members to their prudence, and to their love of France and to the Republic. Conscious of my duty I have assumed my responsibilities. The hour has come for Parliament to assume its own." Premier Francois Marsal's ministerial declaration, accompanying the President's message asked a clean cut vote, saying that if the message was rejected, "the chief of state will take a decision consequent upon that action."

KING'S GOOD HORSEMANSHIP AVERTS AN ACCIDENT.
ALDERSHOT, Eng., June 10. The excellent horsemanship of King George got him out of a tight place this afternoon and saved him from a possible mishap. The King was leaving the parade grounds on his charger, after reviewing the troops, and the horse became frightened at the cheering crowds. The animal bucked and nearly collided with a horse ridden by the Duke of Connaught beside the Queen's carriage. The King made a second attempt to force his horse to accompany the procession, but the animal terrified

blinded until his royal rider was forced to turn back and ride home along a quiet route.

FRENCH PRESIDENT DECIDES TO RESIGN.
PARIS, June 10. President Millerand has decided to resign, according to the semi-official Havas Agency. Millerand's resignation will be read before both houses of parliament at the beginning of their sessions at three o'clock tomorrow afternoon. His successor will be named at the joint meeting of the two houses at Versailles on Friday, in accordance with French law, which requires that a successor be named within 48 hours.

MARSAL MINISTRY DEFEATED.
PARIS, June 10. The Francois Marsal temporary Ministry was defeated in the Chamber of Deputies by a vote of 529 to 214 late today, on the adoption of a motion offered by the majority leader, Edouard Herriot, not to open a discussion with a Government not in conformity with the sentiment of the country.

A DEFEAT THAT WAS NOT A DEFEAT.
PARIS, June 10.

The Senate this afternoon voted down by 154 to 144, the demand by former Minister of Agriculture Chéron, spokesman for Premier Francois Marsal, for interpellation on the Presidential crisis. The vote was at first considered to constitute a defeat of the Ministry, but political leaders of the Chamber, after considering all the circumstances, decided later it would not be so construed.

MISSIONARY KILLED.
NEW YORK, June 10. Conditions are becoming increasingly serious in the Kwangsi Province of China, where one missionary is known to have been killed and several others are in danger, the Christian and Missionary Alliance was informed in a cablegram today from Rev. E. A. Jeffrey, Toronto Missionary, who himself was recently released by Chinese brigands. Definite confirmation of the reports that the Rev. Jos. R. Cunningham, of Selom, Va., had been killed was contained in the cablegram.

ITALIAN IMMIGRANTS TURNED BACK.
HALIFAX, June 10.

One hundred and fifty-one of the two hundred and one would-be Italian immigrants, who were not allowed to land when the Italian steamer, Dante Alighieri, arrived here from Naples a fortnight ago, and were carried to New York, were brought back again yesterday afternoon. They are now on the way back to Italy, the Dante having sailed early this morning, after an unsuccessful attempt was made to land. Fifty of the original party were admitted, twenty-nine of whom, having furnished bonds for one year, have accepted farm work in Quebec; three have been admitted conditionally, and eighteen are appealing to the Immigration Department at Ottawa.

ANOTHER ERUPTION EXPECTED.
HILO, Hawaii, June 10. Prof. T. W. Jagger, the volcanologist, who hurried back here to observe the eruption of Kilauea, is of the opinion that a big explosion of the volcano is imminent. This is based on Sunday's explosion and landslide, the first since May 30, and the fact that noises like dashing waves are arising from the pit. The cracks in the floor of the pit have widened since yesterday, and there has been numerous earthquakes.

FOREST LAND DESTROYED.
OLD FORGE, N.Y., June 10. Scores of acres of forest land in this district were swept away by fire which broke out simultaneously in several places yesterday.

Portia for Labrador Coast

The Portia has been taken off the South West Coast route for the present and will sail for the Labrador tomorrow morning instead. The ship will go as far north as Holton, and will take along fishery supplies and pick up the fishing crews while en route. The Glenice is coming direct from Marytown and will sail from here on Friday morning on the Western route. Conditions are reported very good along the Labrador coast and it is possible that the Portia will make all ports without any trouble. The Sagana sails on the same route Friday morning and will take freight and any crews left by the Portia.

Schr. Frank H. Adams, Capt. Morgan, is now ready to sail for Barbados with a cargo of codfish from the Monroe Export Co.

Schr. Queen Mae has entered at English Harbour to load codfish for Oporto from Jerry Pettit.

Singles And Doubles.
The service in a single is important, not so much as in a double. A good server will vary the direction of his service according to his opponent. It may be he is in command of a service that allows him to volley. In that case he must be particularly careful to avoid angles. The best service, when your intention is to follow the net, is down the centre line. This enables you to follow behind the ball and compels your opponent to make his own angles, which is always difficult from a fast, straight service. If, on the other hand, you make the cross court angle shot, both of which are difficult to volley. It is a very good point to remember that when taking up a volleying position to follow in behind the ball. The easiest and shortest way to do that is to make your shot straight in front of you.

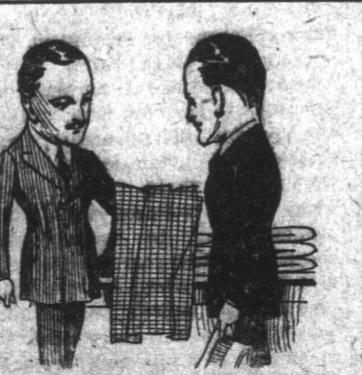

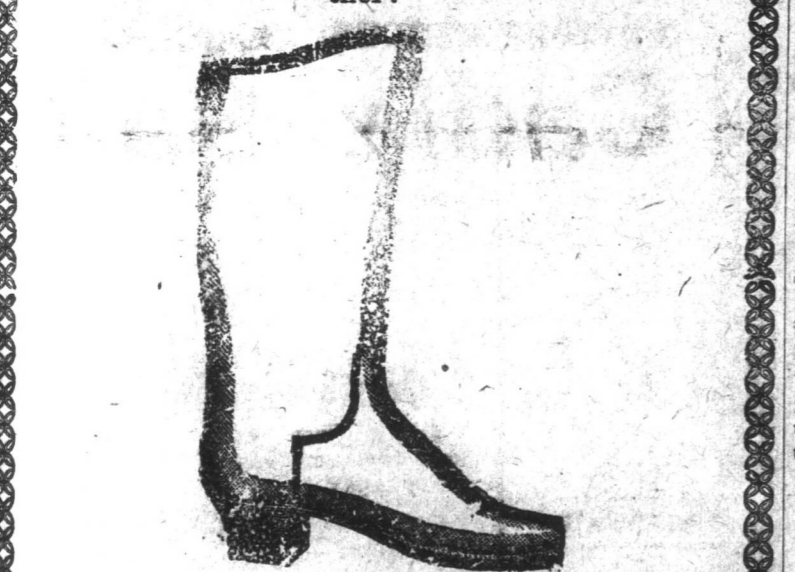

A Life Saver

One of the deadliest perils to the motorist is the poisonous carbon monoxide gas discharged from the engine exhaust—appears to have been concerned. Dr. Miller Ross Hutchison, famous inventor and former chief manager of the Edison laboratories, announced recently the discovery of a chemical compound which, when mixed in small and inexpensive quantities with commercial gasoline, not only virtually eliminates danger from this source, but prevents carbon deposits in the engine cylinders. An effective mixture, he says, is in the proportion of two or three ounces to five gallons of gasoline.

London Letter

(By PANTON HOUSE For The Canadian Press.)

LONDON, May 18.—This week the King and Queen of Romania have been spending four days at Buckingham Palace. When Royalties go visiting, much of their time is inevitably taken up by formal though magnificent functions—State banquets, balls and receptions; but one day of the four King George and Queen Mary entertained their guests exactly as the typical Mr. and Mrs. Londoner would entertain cousins from Overseas and took them to the British Empire Exhibition.

WEATHER FOR OCCASION.

It was a nearly private trip as kings and queens can ever enjoy. There were no uniforms and no State carriages; the party went about from pavilion in one of the smart little electric cars used by the world and his wife. The "gate" at Wembley was the largest since the Exhibition opened, partly because tens of thousands wanted "to see the Royalties." Overseas visitors who had hitherto seen their Wembley under grey skies were charmed by the beauty of the grounds and the white palaces in brilliant sunshine—for it cannot be denied that spring this year has been cold and late.

"NATIVE" GREETINGS.

Two picturesque incidents delighted the crowd. In the Indian pavilion Lady Dalal, wife of the High Commissioner, welcomed the kings and queens after the charming custom of her country, throwing over their shoulders garlands of many colored flowers. These the Queen continued to wear when the tour was continued to "Burma," where officials in native costumes accompanied them, bearing golden umbrellas on long scarlet poles. The sun was fierce enough to make the umbrellas very welcome.

LORD MAYOR AS HOST OF KINGS.

Visitors from Overseas had other opportunities of seeing the Roumanian King and Queen, who, on the second day of their stay, lunched with the Lord Mayor and Corporation of the City of London, driving from Buckingham Palace to the Guildhall, a distance of about two miles, through streets lined with cheering spectators. We have often mentioned in these letters the "might, majesty, dominion and power" of the Lord Mayor, among whose customary privileges is that of entertaining royal and distinguished visitors to London.

THE GREAT BALL.

When, as now, he receives a reigning Sovereign in the City, he wears, whatever his rank, the crimson robe and ermine collar of an Earl. On this occasion, the usual procedure was followed: first, the presentation of an address in a golden casket, and afterwards lunch in the Great Hall, where almost all the royalties of Europe have been feted. This fine apartment is 182ft. long by 69½ft. wide and 89ft. high. It was restored by Sir Christopher Wren after severe damage in the Great Fire, and is perhaps the only building in London containing stonework bearing actual traces of the smoke of 1666. In the Great Fire the City lost its mascots; two figures in wickerwork representing the giants Gog and Magog, which were once a feature of the Lord Mayor's Show and at all city ceremonies. The two grotesque figures, 14½ft. high, now kept in the Guildhall, were carved in 1708 to replace the originals.

ANOTHER LONDON PAGEANT.

We have given some details of the coming Pageant of Empire at Wembley, to take place during July and August. The Royal tournament at Olympia, which the King will open on May 22, offers another imperial spectacle. It is an annual event, in which the three Services—Navy, Army and Air Force—take part in the profits going to various service charities. This year, the Navy is to give its own story, interwoven with that of the Empire's growth. In the first tableau will be seen famous Naval officers of all periods, from Drake to Nelson, with their officers and men in the costumes of their day. Drake and Raleigh represent the Elizabethan age; Blake, in buff coat and cavalry boots, stands for the soldier-admirals of Cromwell; Benbow for William III. and Queen Anne. Then follow Captain Cook, the navigator and explorer, Rodney and Nelson. Each day until June 7 various competitions of skill at arms will be held, the entries coming from all parts of the Empire. Musical rides will be given by the 13-18th Hussars, musical drives by "D" Battery of the Royal Horse Artillery and a realistic attack, with anti-aircraft guns, by the Air Force. Altogether the show is one that nobody from the Dominions should miss.

SHAKESPEARE'S WILL.

Special tours of interest in London for Overseas visitors, have been arranged by the organizers of King Edward's Hospital Fund. Distinguished authorities on London's history are acting as guides, and the parties in their charge will be privileged to see many buildings and treasures which are not ordinarily open to public inspection. Several Canadians who joined one of these tours were immensely interested in the docu-

ments shown them at Somerset House, the stately 18th-century building in the Strand which shelters the Government Departments dealing with wills and certificates of birth, deaths and marriages. Shakespeare's will was displayed, three folio pages (kept in an airtight case) in which he makes his wife that celebrated legacy of "my second-best bed." Another treasure brought out was the codicil made by Lord Nelson on the eve of the Battle of Trafalgar. Written in a small notebook, not discovered until a year after his death, it leaves Emma, Lady Hamilton, "as a legacy to my King and Country," explaining how she had helped in a certain political move. The Duke of Wellington's will, disposing of \$2,500,000, mentions that he was making it "because an attempt was made last night to assassinate me," and this too was examined as were the wills of Dr. Johnson, Milton, Van Dyck, and Pitt.

Spanish Consul in Police Cells

CHARGED WITH ILLEGALLY IMPORTING FIFTY CASES OF ALCOHOL INTO MONTREAL.

Montreal, June 4.—(By Canadian Press)—Miguel Malquer, Spanish Consul in Montreal, Ramon De Torrens, a Spanish importer and Albert Vincent were charged in the Enquete Court to-day with having illegally imported fifty cases of alcohol into the Province of Quebec. The shipment consists of about 800 gallons of liquor and was brought into the country as olive oil. The arrests were made by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. Bail in the case of Vincent was set at \$1,000. Bail in the cases of the other two was fixed at \$5,000 and as it could not be furnished, they are in the police cells.

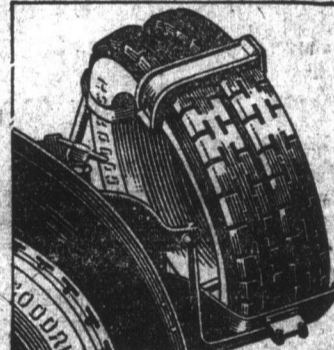

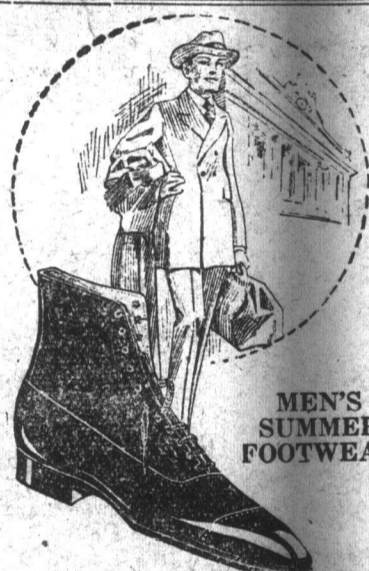

WHAT PEOPLE SAY AND WHAT THEY MEAN.

Two women whom I know realize that what people say is not half the truth about themselves, or less than half.

In the first place, very few people are perfectly honest with themselves, and if they aren't honest with themselves how can they be with other people?

And then on top of that there are the conscious changes we make, the conscious variations and shadings before we let what we think phrase itself into words.

The second woman: "Well, I don't think I am a cynic. That means that no one tells the truth. It's a nice thing to think about people. I didn't know you were such a cynic!"

What pretty cynical. That means that she is not a cynic. That means she tells the whole truth.

Well, I pride myself on being perfectly truthful," bridled the other. "I don't know about you."

What away about that time. I don't know about you."

What I should have to side with the cynic. Only I don't think she is. Or is she, I am, too.

Forest Wealth of Nfld.

PULP AND PAPER.
(The Times British Empire Section.)
Among the most interesting features of the Newfoundland Building at Wembley, which closely adjoins the British Government Pavilion, are the exhibits illustrating the forest wealth of the country and the processes in the manufacture of pulp and paper.

In this great and increasingly important industry Newfoundland has made a wonderfully rapid advance. The first pulp and paper mill was opened as recently as the year 1910; yet to-day Newfoundland is in the very forefront of the pulp and paper producing countries of the world.

This advance is due primarily to the exploitation of the immense natural advantages that the island possesses, but which have lain undeveloped for many years. To-day it is realized that an inexhaustible supply of high-class timber, enormous water power, and convenient shipping facilities make Newfoundland an ideal centre for this rapidly growing industry.

It was the Harmsworths who first made this great discovery, fraught with such immense possibilities for the future of the island.

After searching all the available territories elsewhere, and making the most exhaustive inquiries, they decided that Newfoundland offered the best facilities for their paper-making industry. Their mill at Grand Falls, the most modern and the second largest in the world, was opened by the late Lord Northcliffe in 1910. It met with instant success, and was quickly followed by the establishment of other pulp and paper making concerns in the island. There are to-day mills at Grand Falls, Bishop's Falls, and at Lomond in Bonne Bay, and the possibilities of the industry have not yet been fully explored.

The timber exhibited at Wembley includes fir, birch, and spruce. The forest resources of the country are by no means limited to timber suitable for pulp and paper making. Lumbering is also an important industry, and there is wood suitable for nearly every purpose, from the paving of cities. Nor is the supply ever likely to become exhausted. Thanks to the extremely rapid rate of reproduction in the island denuded forest areas are available for cutting again in 30 years.

Another interesting exhibit is a model of the Armstrong Whitworth plant on the west coast of the island showing how water power is created and utilized for the manufacture of pulp and paper, and for supplying electrical energy. Pulp and paper are also shown in all their different stages of manufacture.

Those members of the British public to whom the name of Newfoundland still conjures up a vision of nothing more than a distant fishing island would do well to visit this interesting Pavilion, and see what great changes the last few years have wrought in Britain's oldest Colony.

Parents.
I behold the children weeping, in their sorrow and despair, for their parents are Bo-Peeping, gallivanting everywhere. Parents once were sane and steady, everything they did was right; nowadays they're always ready for a joyride in the night; once they stayed at home perusing Bunyan's works in volumes eight; now the bright lights they are choosing, hitting up a giddy gait. Little sisters, little brothers press their faces to the pane, looking for their dads and mothers, who are neither safe nor sane. Little Jane and Little Clarence ask the peeler on his beat, "Have you seen our giddy parents, chasing up and down the street? Tell our parents we are lonely, waiting for them at the door; we'd be happy kids if only they'd stay home one night in four. Tell our parents, gentle copper, you who look so kind and mild, that we do not think it proper parents should be running wild. It is hard to raise a parent in this age of ceaseless play; fathers act as though they weren't wander from the Great White Way; mothers go to see the kiddies featured at the chicken show, and the kiddies, oh the kiddies, watch their sifting parents go: "Little children, gret's a bother," says the stately man of law, "go and gambol like your father, go and cut up like your Ma."

Confusion of Sects in India
To most people it would appear, according to a Bombay paper, very natural that the famous temple of Badi Gays, the most sacred spot in all the world to the Buddhist, should be under their control.

But it is not, and in recent years the Buddhist community has been carrying on an agitation which has for its object the persuading of the Government to give them the right to manage the temple in the interests of their faith.

Is there, in India, any temple which has associations with so many faiths as this beautiful structure in Gaya? The original building, not the present one, for this is of a comparatively modern period, was built over the place made sacred by the great Teacher-Buddha, who here received that enlightenment which was the basis of his future teaching, and today Buddhists come from all parts of the world to pay their homage at this shrine. There is something very impressive in the sight of some pious Buddhist who has made a journey of thousands of miles, along difficult roads, to rest his eyes on this sacred spot, every inch of which has been honored by the presence of the Buddha.

But what is found when one passes inside the temple of Buddha? Here is an image, but, strange to say, it bears the "trident."

Railroad Conquers High Peak in the Alps
Invalids and others who have not mountaineering legs now can ascend the Jungfrau (one of the most famed and beautiful peaks of the Swiss Alps) on a unique railroad that exemplifies remarkably the resourcefulness and ingenuity of modern engineering. The feat has taken nearly 30 years.

The road owes its existence to an ascension of the peak some years ago by a Swiss engineer, A. Guyer. So charmed was he by the "immense panorama and the great chain of mountains, that on his return to his hotel he drew up a rough plan for the project, working until after midnight.

As most of the ascent lies within the region of perpetual snow, that part of the road could not be built outside the mountain. The frequent avalanches and great depths of snow would have made it too dangerous. So the engineer arranged to bore a long spiral tunnel, keeping close to the sides affording the best views and breaking openings at intervals.

The entire length of the road is six miles, 4 1/2 of which are in the tunnel. A special spur gear track is used to insure safety, some of the grades running as high as 25 per cent. The highest station is 11,300 feet above sea-level.

The 18-ton locomotives that haul the 35-ton trains up are among the most powerful ever built. They are electric, driven by two 350-horse-power motors. Four sets of independent mechanical brakes are on each locomotive. Three are hand-operated. The fourth is automatic. On the down trip the locomotives are used to generate electric current, which is fed back to the power station.

Traffic Signal Bends Over if Struck by Auto

Mounted on a ball-and-socket joint in the pavement, an ingenious new traffic signal gives at the instant of impact, allowing the car hitting it to pass safely over. It was invented by Frank Griswold, of Minneapolis, Minn., as the result of a collision with a stationary signal one stormy night more than four years ago, in which the inventor barely escaped death.

The signal is a slender pole, five feet six inches tall, anchored in its socket by six powerful coil springs, which right it when it has been overturned. Its lights continue to operate even when the pole is knocked flat.

When the Shoe Pinches

Many people claim their corns warn them of weather change. But probably the corn merely is registering change in the shoe leather. This varies with the amount of moisture in the air. A two per cent. change from normal either way is about all the average foot can stand without discomfort, according to a recent report of J. A. Wilson to the New York section of the American Chemical Society. He cited experiments to show that the amount of pinching varies with the kind of leather used.

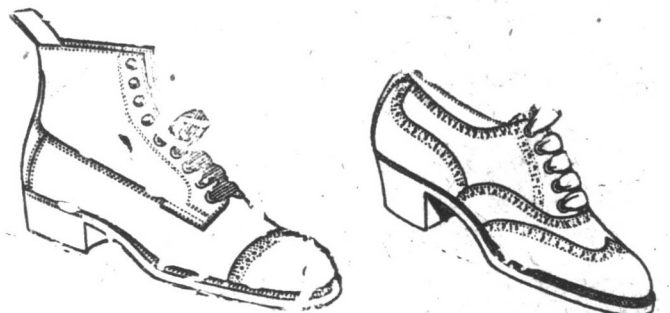

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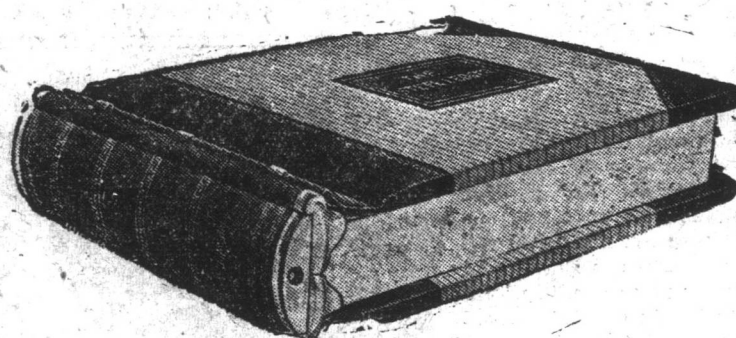
