

A WORLD-WIDE RESPONSE.

London, Sept. (Canadian Press).-Thanks to a heavy response from all parts of the world, which resulted the time had officially elapsed, the funds for restoration of St. Paul's Cathedral has now reached the high mark of a quarter of a million ster-The Times announces: For aftermath of contributions to the Fund for the Preservation of St. Paul's has continued, and at the end of August the grand total of subscriptions received since the appeal was launched in January amounts to a quarter of a million pounds. A quarter of a million is nearly

twice as much as the Dean and Chapter found it their duty to ask for at the beginning of the year; for their Commission of experts, who had taken over three years to consider the problem, put the required amount at £120,000 of £140,000. The appeal had not been before the public longer than a fortnight when, on St. Paul's Day, the Fund handsomely exceeded the greater of these two sums. It was evident, however, that that crowning day in response to the appeal would certainly not be the last on which money would be collected, and from then until now contributions have flowed in.

"The distance from which some of the latest contributions have come are as typical as any of the far places in the Globe over which St, Paul's casts its glamour." says The limes. One cheque hails from Yukon, another from Ballarat, another from Geelong, and a fourth from the Diocese of Christchurch, New Zealand. Grilled Partridge

By AN OLD MAID.

"Partridge roasted; partridge boiled; partridge grilled"-it should be grilled, if I might have the choice, And September's other gift, mushrooms, appeals to me also. A bird that has hung as long as I dare let it, a clear, steady fire, and a gridiron heated and rubbed with suet-with these I could achieve a fair repast. With the feathers in a basket at my feet and a lighted spill of white paper in my hand, I would singe the partridge quickly; then draw out and split it lengthwise in two, and dry it inside and out as wisdom dictates. A few seconds more, and I would have the partridge seasoned with cavenne and salt.

With the bird on the gridiron I would not lift my eyes from the bars for an instant-not till twenty minutes had passed and my September lunch was done. I would rub it with butter and stand the bird in the oven while I attended to the mushrooms The oven would not be too hot and the door would be ajar.

Grilling The Mushrooms. just grown flat-headed, are always best for grilling. They would be peeled and be placed upside down on the gridiron: where I had lifted out each stalk I should press a tiny pat of but ter, and strew over it white pepper and salt. When they were coo should taste one to see they would be laid in a hot dish with more butter placed here and there.



A disaster has once again visited the South West Coast of Newfoundland and Burgeo today mourns the loss of five of its sailor citizens, claimed by the sea as its exacting and inexorable toll.



Pirates Secured 5,000 * Cases of Whiskey From Schooner

Piracy on the high seas is still a "going business" among opposing factions of the rum-running fraternity, 't was learned this morning, when the Jean Louis, of St. Pierre- Miquelon owned and registered steamer, arrived in Halifax Harbor, and her captain reported the wholesale depredation of hi-jackers, who had successfully robbed him of his entire cargo of 5,000 cases of whiskey, 150 barrels of malt, and numerous cases of both beverages.

Trouble began for the Jean Louis on September 10th, when she arrived at a position 22 miles southeast of Sankaty Head. A speed boat drew alongside and a man boarded the ship. Proper credentials were tendered, which showed the visitor to be in the "circle," and apparently proved him to be a trustworthy purchaser. He stated that he wished to obtain a quantity of liquor, and arrangements were immediately made to discharge a portion of the steamer's cargo.

To the surprise of the master and crew of the Jean Louis, six men appeared over the vessel's side, and with levelled revolvers enforced their order of "hands up." Immediately, six more men appeared from the cabin of the speed boat. Four of the raiders then instituted a search for concealed weapons, after which the members of the crew were herded into the forecastle where they were placed under the guard of two armed men

The captain was taken in charge and ordered down into his cabin. where he was called upon to produce all papers, including the ship's roll. which were immediately confiscated by the pirates. Strict orders were issued that no lights were to be shown

Another vessel came alongside and the captain of the Louis Jean was ordered, at the point of a revolver, to return to his post and have his helmsman steer a course that would keep him a short distance behind the hijackers boat. All during the night the crew were kept prisoners in their quarters continually under the surveillance of two armed men, replaced from hour to hour:

With the coming of daylight, on the morning of Sept. 11th, it was seen that the other ship was the Charmian No. 2, of New York. This ship drew alongside the Louis Jean and 100 cases of whiskey and 100 barrels of malt were taken from the St. Pierre schooner, along with a number of casks of gasoline. During the shifting of the carso the crew of the pirate's victim were forced to lend a hand, at all times being menaced by the firearms in the lands of their captors.

Following this discharging of liquors, which was all done at nighttime, the captain was ordered to return to his cabin and was forbidden to communicate with his men. Orders of a similar nature were also issued to the chief engineer.

side and all of the regular crew of the Louis Jean were ordered below decks for a period of fifteen hours. The pirates spoke with the cutter and evidently satisfied the coastguardsman that there was nothing amiss, for after a short time she sailed away.

The following day another cutter came alongside and there was a repetition of what had occurred upon the occasion of the previous day's

On Sept. 18th the pirates sailed away in their ship, after successfully taking the entire cargo of 5.000 cases of whiskey, 150 barrels of malt and additional liquor, aboard the Charmian No. 2.

Before deserting the Jean Louis the hi-jackers ransacked the schooner, taking all articles that they considered of value, including all the captain's clothing. They did not disturb the captain's private money, due to the fact that it was Canadian currency.

The Jean Louis arrived in port this morning, when her captain related the details of the unusual experience through which he and his crew had passed.—Evening Mail, Sept. 21.

Trade treaties between Canada and easy to arrange as might be supposed, explained Sir William Chandler, of Bridgetown, Barbados, at the Ritz-Carlton Hotel yesterday, for the British West Indies comprise several dif-

Sir William Chandler has been nember of the Legislative Council of Barbados since 1882 and Presidence since 1910. He retired from the judicial bench last February after forty

The situation, he pointed out, is complicated by the fact that while sugar is the chief product of certain to enroll every man in the Police parts of the Indies such as British Gulana, Barbades, and St. Kitts, it is only a subsidiary product in Jamaica, Trinidad, and St. Lucia, where cocoa and fruit are the chief products. From the other colonies no sugar is export-

Therefore if sugar is to be admitted free into Canada the sugar producing islands would have to make tariff concessions to Canada which other colonies would not be expected to make. It might be possible to order things so that the sugar producing colonies whose products came into Canada duty free granted in return special concessions to Canada, Sir William suggested.

The question might arise whether Canada as part of the British Empire had the right to make tariff arrangements with another part of the Em ire superior in value to those granted elsewhere to countries under the British flag, concluded Sir William, but as long as substantial preference is given to all parts of the Empire no harm could be done to the Empire as a whole by any special arrangements between two component parts .- Montreal Star, Sept. 19.



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

He clapped his hands, stamped his feet, and brayed "Hear, hear"-the only time his voice was heard all day-to the feeble accompaniment of three or four enthusiastic Reds, while the majority of the delegates watched the incident with intense amusement.

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
