TORONTO, GREY AND BRUCE RAILWAY.

The ratemakers of the township of Holland have ratified the by-law granting \$40,000 to the Toronto, Grey and Bruce Railway.

NEW BOOKS.—Mr. Day has lately added a large lot of new books to his previous extensive assortment. A list of them will appear in our next issue.

CRICKET.—The Galt Reformer accuses the Guelph cricketers of "shabby backing out" of the late cricket matches which were arranged to have been played between the Counties of Brant and Wentworth vs. Waterloo and Wellington.

The matches came off at Dundas on Friday and Saturday, the score being 78 for Wentworth and Brant and 58 for Waterloo—one innings being played on each side.

BASE BALL.—A return match at base ball was played on Saturday last between the Clifford and Harrison Clubs, resulting in the defeat of the former by one run.

A LESSON.—A little boy named James Fox was tried at the Police Court on Saturday afternoon, for misbehaving himself towards a girl of about fifteen years of age, and sent to goal for a month. By the expiration of that he will perhaps have "learned" better than to take such liberties in future.

HUNKIDORA BASE BALL CLUB.—The married and single men, members of the above Club, played their second match on their ground, Acton, on Saturday the 1st August, which terminated the same as the first, in favor of the single, the single scoring 34 runs to 20 for the married men. As the word satisfaction has been freely circulated by the married men, since the first match, we hope satisfaction has been extended to them in the shape of a good sound drubbing, arising from the fact that it is impossible for them to stand before the sharp fielding, rapid hitting, and skillful pitching of the boys.

TEMPERANCE MEETING AT EVERTON.—A meeting, held under the auspices of the Everton Temperance Lodge, took place at Everton on Friday evening last, when a large turn out of people were present. Spirited addresses were delivered by the Chairman, Rev. James Kilgour, and the Rev. James Howie, of Guelph. Mr. James Ferguson gave some excellent recitations. A very pleasant evening was spent by those present.

MUSKOKA DISTRICT.—We have received a little paper published in the Muskoka District, which is named the *Seller's Guide*, and which, as its name implies, is designed to be of service to those who may be seeking homes in Muskoka. From it we learn that the boundaries of the District are as follows:—1st. The River Severn may be taken as the Southern boundary. 2nd. The French River and Lake Nipissing as the Northern boundary. 3rd. The Eastern and Western boundaries are situated within and between 75° and 80° west from Greenwich. The extreme length is about ninety miles and the extreme breadth about thirty-five miles. Area in square miles about 2,800; area in acres 1,500,000.

WELLINGTON GREY AND BRUCE RAILWAY.—The "SPECTATOR" says:—At a meeting of the Directors of the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Railway Company held last night (Tuesday) it was determined to at once advertise for tenders for the first section of the road between Guelph and Fergus, the tenders to be handed in by the 10th prox. This action is taken now, so that no delay may occur in putting the road under actual contract, after the passage of the by-law. It was agreed to survey the line from Mount Pleasant, through Normanby to Walkerton, and Lake Huron. This action looks like real work on the part of the Company; and is the substantial confirmation of the hopes expressed by them when recently in Bruce that the road would be actually under construction before the winter sets in.

BASE BALL MATCH.

The long expected match between the Guelph and Woodstock Base Ball Clubs for the silver ball and the championship of Canada, took place on the Agricultural Show ground in Woodstock yesterday.

In consequence of the two Clubs having had a match about a month ago, in which Guelph was defeated by only two runs, and the celebrity of both clubs, considerable interest was centered in this match.

The Mayor of Guelph having proclaimed the day as a civic holiday, business was entirely suspended, and a great many people having accompanied the "Maple Leaf" to Woodstock, assisted to swell the number of spectators, which was very large. A temporary stand had been erected for the accommodation of onlookers.

At each end of the stand a Band was placed, the Guelph Silver Cornet band, under the leadership of Mr. Geo. Lawrence, being placed at the left and the Woodstock brass band at the right. Both bands discoursed some excellent music at intervals throughout the afternoon. The ground was in poor condition, and it is a very inferior one any way. A large hulk of a building stands within a few feet of the players, operating seriously against the playing of strangers.

At 1:30 p.m. the contest commenced, Woodstock taking the bat. Mr. William Shuttleworth, of the Maple Leaf Club, Hamilton, acted as umpire. In the first innings Woodstock scored six and Guelph two. In this innings S. Wilson broke his bat, and was "at sea" throughout the afternoon in consequence. J. McKay sent the ball through the windows of the Agricultural Hall, causing a crash of glass.

Woodstock in the second innings succeeded in scoring five—the Maple Leaf eight. The play of both clubs now began to manifest itself, it being remarked that the fielding of Guelph was superior to the Young Canadians, and the interest and excitement on both sides running high.

The third innings, however, gave the Young Canadians the score which carried them safe throughout the day, they making twelve to their opponents' two, the game standing at 23 to 12. In the fourth innings the splendid fielding of the Maple Leaf boys did capital service, and they succeeded in giving the Young Canadians a "goose egg," while they scored seven. The odds were then down to four, but the fifth innings scored six for Woodstock and only two for Guelph, leaving a majority of eight in favor of the former, which they maintained till the close of the game. In the sixth innings Woodstock scored one and Guelph two. This was one of the most exciting innings of the contest. One of the Woodstock men had been caught out on a "foul" while Goldie on the long left field caught the ball on a fly, returning it he succeeded in getting out the men making for the first and second bases, for which he was lustily cheered by all present. Woodstock in the seventh innings made four; Guelph three. By the certainty of Goldie's fielding and making excellent catching, the Young Canadians were able to score but two in the eighth innings, and their opponents one. In this innings the best play on both sides during the day was made. The ninth and last inning scored a "goose egg" for the Young Canadians and one for the Guelphites, leaving the game at 26 to 23. Stevenson of the Maple Leaf club, in the last innings made some superior catching. Standing at the first base, by a beautiful catch, he succeeded in putting out the men who were making for the first and second bases. The game was closed amidst intense excitement, the Woodstock people lustily cheering for the Young Canadians and Maple Leaf. They left the ground at 10 p.m., and the people of Guelph, giving three round applause for Woodstock and its excellent club, they being all the champions of Canada. (Old and expanded cricketers from this section, who witnessed the game, although not having a preference for it, in consequence of it being of American origin, were well pleased with it and expressed their playing in some instances as admirable. The catching of Passes, who is in his third year, the Lockyer of Canada, could not be beaten, while the fielding of Mr. Goldie was said to be unequalled. Every man did his best to secure the prized ball for his own section. The best of good feeling prevailed between the players throughout the contest. We trust an effort will be made to get the Young Canadians to come over to Guelph for a friendly game. The following is the score:

HOWDYS.—We were always aware that Woodstock, like many other places, contained a certain class (for they are limited to a family or two) whose height of ambition appears to be how base and how degraded they can possibly make themselves. They believe in the "Donnybrook fair" style of doing things, and are certainly a pest to the town in which they live. "Tread on the tail as we coast" appears to be their challenge, and any one coming within a pole's length of them is pushed about

kick at their victim. That no improvement has taken place in the class we refer to, for the last fifteen years, was manifested yesterday; and certainly if surprised the peace-loving citizens of Guelph to witness the violence and rowdiness which appeared to go unheeded yesterday; not a check having been attempted by the civic authorities. This certainly is a bad state of affairs for that beautiful and enterprising town, and the sooner steps are taken to put down such mobs by the strong arm of the law the better it will be for the town, and the somewhat unenviable notoriety for decency and order which it enjoys. We fully estimate the Young Canadian base ball club from any blame in this affair, and should they ever come to Guelph, although the town should turn out *en masse*, we promise them a different state of affairs; it will be a long time ere a club from Guelph will go to Woodstock, if a material change does not take place in the way of enforcing order. The only inference we could draw from the brutal exhibitions yesterday, was that these roughs had everything their own way in that town, and that no one dared to interfere with them in their nefarious work. We can assure our Woodstock friends that it will take many a good act on their part to efface from our memories the proceedings of yesterday.

Town Council. The Council met on Monday night. Present, the Mayor in the chair, Dr. Herod, Messrs. Hoffman, Day, Masie, Howard, Buckland, Seyers, Chadwick, Mays, Mitchell and Harvey.

The Clerk read the minutes. Accounts were presented from T. W. Cooper for \$18, two from H. Stovel for \$6.50 and \$3.50 respectively from Wm Brownston for beds, &c., for Volunteers \$12.51, extra allowance for Volunteers \$9, H. Stovel \$1.50, and J. Masie \$1.50, for having Fire Engines on several occasions \$17.—Referred to Finance Committee.

The Clerk read a memorial from Ohas. Taylor, Baker of Valparaiso, for the refunding of \$8, being the amount he had paid for the use of the Dull Shed one night on which he had not exhibited. On motion of Dr. Herod seconded by Mr. Mays the petition was granted. The Clerk read a communication from the Secretary of the Fire Company, setting forth the desire of the Chief Engineer that six more men might be appointed by the Council to assist in handling the hose reels.—Referred to Fire and Water Committee.

The Clerk read a communication from Mr. Donald Guthrie, in which he gave it as his opinion that the Rector and Churchwardens of St. George's Church had power to dispose of certain portions of the Church lot, and that on receiving the release the Town would be safe in paying the sum mentioned therein.

The Mayor read a communication from the Police Magistrate, bringing under the notice of the Council the fact that Mr. Hough, sr., had never performed his duties as Police Clerk, having left them to Geo. Hough, over whom he (the P. M.) had no authority. Since then Mr. Hough, sr., had declined acting as the Police Clerk, he requested the Council to appoint Geo. Hought to the office, otherwise he would have to prohibit him from acting.

Mr. Chadwick read a petition from Geo. Neve calling the attention of the Council to the rough state in which his property had been left after gravel had been taken from it, and requested that it might be levelled. Referred to R. and B. Committee.

Mr. Hoffman read a petition from Timothy Sheedy for remission of dog tax. Referred to Finance Committee.

Dr. Herod read the following petition from Geo. Bruce, sr.:
The undersigned, beg leave to memorialize your Honorable body, that I have just cause (as proprietor of certain property being and lying on the Edinburgh road) to represent that I am aggrieved, my property damaged unnecessarily by those employed and paid from the funds of the Corporation (by whose authority the undersigned, said lot) cutting the street immediately in front of my gate to a depth of 7 or 8 feet, reducing the width of the street one-half. I know not of any municipal law giving to any corporate body, whatsoever or whosoever, to interfere with the public or private rights guaranteed to the Queen's lieges, by interrupting and endangering the public highway, and that after being frequently remonstrated with.

Trusting the combined wisdom of so many Honorable, venerable, distinguished, intelligent, enlightened, philanthropical, generous, intellectual, economical, and highly esteemed men of mark, devoting their time, and what abilities they may fortunately or unfortunately possess; for the weal or woe of the loyal denizens of the town of Guelph, will in their wisdom condescend to take into your most dignified and favourable consideration the above memorial to prevent annoyance or disagreeable consequences.

Mr. Chadwick presented the report of the Finance Committee. They had much pleasure in presenting the map of the Town, drawn by Joseph Hobson, Esq., and recommended that the same be accepted, framed and hung up in the Committee room for reference; and that a printed copy of the same be prepared to be deposited in the Registry Office, as required by law.—Adopted.

Dr. Herod presented the report of the Board of Health, which was signed by the Mayor as Chairman. It was as follows: The Board of Health, to whom was referred the petition of John Tyson and others, beg respectfully to report, that they have carefully examined the section of the Consolidated By-laws referred to, and cannot recommend that any alteration should be made in sec. 27, as prayed for in said petition.—Adopted.

Dr. Herod moved the first and second reading of the by-law to amend the market by-law, making the fees payable in cents, instead of in pence as heretofore. The tariff is as follows, the by-law being filled up in Committee of the Whole: Double wagon or other double vehicle 1c., single do. 7c., horse or wheelbarrow 2c., basket 2c. Fair ground: Horse, mare or gelding 19c., cattle 6c., each sheep, calf or hog not in wagon 2c. Scales: Weighing draft on hay scales 12c., market scales under 100lbs. 2c., heavy draft on market scales, from 100lbs. to 300lbs. 4c., every additional 100 lbs. 1c., quarter of beef, sheep or hog 2c. Measurement for every separate pint or bushel 2c., and wood 2c. The Committee gave and reported, and the by-law was passed and numbered 175.

Dr. Herod said he had again to call attention to the tanks. At every corner of the streets he was met with a sneer from some person with regard to the failure of those that had already been put down. The Fire and Water Committees had during the whole year been remiss in the matter of reports, and he thought it was as little as they could have done at the present meeting, knowing the failure, to bring in a report and told all they knew about it, and whether there was a likelihood that the tanks would be carried out. It was not courteous either to the Council or to the Town to do otherwise when a large contract—a contract of \$1,000 had been let, and \$350 of the sum paid, while we were no better off than before.

Mr. Harvey said that it was known when the deficiency in the tank was, and it would be corrected. But as regarded a supply of water people might make their minds easy on that score, for they had got the hose so arranged that they could cover any part of the town.

Mr. Buckland said he had understood that the tanks were to be inspected before they were put down, but the first one had not been.

THE EXCURSION.

The town was very quiet on Tuesday after the bustle of getting off to the excursion train had subsided. Almost the only appearance of life afterwards was when the morning trains came in, and the people gathered to get their *Globe* or *Leader*. A number of our townfolk went down to Toronto. There was great excitement for a moment, occasioned by two ill-natured little terriers getting hold of each other and having a rough-and-tumble over the rails just as the Toronto train was coming up pretty rapidly. The wheel of the locomotive was about a foot from them when they let each other go, and bounded back on this platform. Throughout the day an occasional straggler was to be seen on the street, and as night approached the Telegraph Office became the focus of attraction to a number who had staked small piles on the Base Ball Match. Tickets were sold to 473 excursionists at the G. W. Station in Guelph, and thirteen cars started with this number of human beings, all in good spirits and bent on enjoying a gala day. There were accessions to the number at Hespler, Preston, Galt, Branchton, and other stations on the way. The train left Guelph at ten minutes past seven, and reached Woodstock about half-past ten. It was late at night before the excursionists returned, having spent a very agreeable time, and not the slightest accident having occurred to mar the pleasure of the day. Certainly they should, and we believe they do, feel grateful to Mr. Swinard for his generosity, and to Mr. Brodie, Station Master, for his intercession, by which they got a long and safe ride for the low price of one dollar; and also to the conductor, Mr. James Blount, for the courteous and gentlemanly treatment extended by him to the excursionists, he doing everything in his power to render them happy and comfortable.

Mount Forest Correspondence.

From our Correspondent.
The Railroad excitement still continues unabated. Meetings have been held in Normanby and Egremont by the Toronto directors of the Toronto, Grey and Bruce road, and at all those meetings they have been fully sustained by the ratemakers of these municipalities. Those gentlemen arduously a series of meetings through out Bentinck, Glenelg, Holland and Sullivan. All those townships are favorable to the scheme, therefore there is no doubt of the ultimate success of the narrow gauge. There was a convention of the Reeves, Deputy Reeves and Councilors of the following corporations, viz: Egremont, Normanby, Arthur and Mt. Forest, held in Mount Forest on Saturday for the purpose of coming to a mutual understanding, if possible, as to which line of Railroad we can get in this section and the line that should be supported. A vote was taken, which resulted in favor of the Toronto road by two to one. Whilst the township representatives were in session on the above subject, a strong deputation from Hamilton and Toronto arrived in town. In the evening a public meeting was held, when Adam Brown, President of the W. G. & B. R. Co., addressed the ratemakers assembled, but without effect, as the Toronto scheme carried the day.

THE GUELPH POLICE COURT.

Before Mr. W. Saunders, Esq., Police Magistrate.
WEDNESDAY, 4th.—R. Grand appeared again this morning to answer a charge of having sold liquor without license, and was fined \$20 and costs. *Nancy Dolan*, for vagrancy, was sent to goal for 21 days. The case against *Geo. O. S. Robinson*, for a breach of Lotery Act, came up again this morning, having been adjourned from Monday. There were two informations of goods having been disposed of two different parties by a mode of chance. On one he was fined \$20 and costs, and the other lies over for ten days.

An attempt was made on Friday morning last to burst open the safe of the Passenger Department, G. W. R. Galt.

100 SHEEP STRAYED.—The Galt Reformer says that Mr. James Good-fellow who lives about three miles west of Doop, has lost about 100 sheep, which strayed from his premises about three week ago.

Mays, that the written contracts for the tanks be now laid before the Council, and all communications having reference to the same.—Carried.

The contract having been produced Dr. Herod said, that before reading it he thought the Fire and Water Committees were to blame; but now he was sure of it. The contract was worth nothing; it was all one sided. Mr. Armstrong might throw up the agreement and keep what money he had got. He had before pointed out that it was on account of the loose way the contracts were let that we had not as good tanks here as in other places. How is it that we can't have tanks when they have them in Rockville and other places, and Goodenham, & Worts, or Toronto, have one that holds 22,000 gallons. The tanks should have been tested before they were put down, and if the Fire and Water Committee had been acting for themselves they would have been brought into ridicule, but he was not going to be blamed at every corner, for the whole Council were censured and not the Committee only. It was not enough that one-fourth of the money should have been kept back from the contractor until the work was completed. He should have been obliged to give security, either his own personal security, or that of two others, and for every day that the tanks were unfinished after the 1st of July he should have forfeited \$50 a day.

Mr. Harvey said he had no doubt the contract would be carried out in good faith. The contractor's reputation as a workman was at stake and it was to his interest to make the tanks efficient.

Mr. Chadwick also condemned the contract, there was nothing whatever binding in it. Mr. Armstrong should have received no money until the work was done.

Some further discussion on this point followed.

Moved by Dr. Herod, seconded by Mr. Harvey, that leave be granted to bring in a by-law, to amend the Crown Prince of the appointment and remuneration of Police Clerk. Carried.

BY TELEGRAPH

Despatches to the Evening Mercury.

London, July 4.—The wheat harvest in the British Isles is nearly over, and according to the estimates which can now be formed the yield of the crop will be at least double that of last year, and will exceed by one-third the annual average.

Bonn, Aug. 4.—The University of Bonn has conferred the degree of D.L. upon his Royal Highness the Crown Prince of Prussia, Hon. George Bancroft, the U. S. Minister, Prof. Darwin and John Stuart Mill, of England.

London, Aug. 4.—Mr. Scallor, counsel for the prisoners Warren and Costello, in a communication to the *London Times* repeats his declaration that his clients were tried and convicted on the evidence produced in the United States. The *Times*, in answer, reiterates in the most positive terms its denial of the correctness of the statement.

The royal commission on the Irish Church establishment have made their report. They recommend the abolition of all the Episcopal sees and cathedral establishments in Ireland, except 8 to be maintained on reduced incomes. They also report in favor of measures to encourage tenants under church leases to purchase property in perpetuity, and to enable land holders, by the payment of tithes and rent charges, to eventually redeem and regain possession of their lands.

American Despatches.

New York, Aug. 5.—The *Herald's* St. Thomas special says Marshal Falcon, lately President of Venezuela, has repudiated before Coro, whence he had recently departed, to make his escape to the island of Curacao. He contemplated attacking Gen. Monagas to regain the executive chair from which the latter drove him by force.

The *Times* special says a telegram from Lieut. Gov. Gleason of Florida announces that the Legislature of that State has passed an Act providing for the election of Presidential Electors by the joint ballot of the two Houses of the Legislature in joint convention. This example will doubtless be followed by other Southern States and perhaps by all of them. The health of Thad Stevens is again declining and to-night is reported in an exceedingly critical condition.

Reliable persons from New Orleans confirm statements that rebel cavalry regiments in Louisiana have been reorganized as Seymour Knights, and the infantry regiments as Blair guards.

MATTERS ABOUT CLIFFORD.—Our Clifford correspondent, writing on Monday, says: The weather is getting somewhat cooler, though rain seems to be as scarce as ever. A slight shower fell on Saturday which will have very little effect on the root crops as the season is too far advanced. The most of the fall wheat in this section is cut and safely housed. There is a large yield and the sample is good. A few loads have been brought to market which found a ready sale at \$1.20 to \$1.25. Spring wheat is generally a failure, what with the midge and a sort of blight caused by the drought, the yield will be light. Oats and peas are not good. We may expect less pork this season. Business has been poor so far; the improvement in our village this summer are considerable; the millwrights are at work on the fine steam mill built for Mr. Gray. Mr. J. Light was the contractor for the frame work. The mill altogether when completed will be first class. The Traction Engine passed through our village yesterday, its progress has been rather slow. It broke through the bridge at Harrison, and new stringers had to be put under the bridge over. Coon creek near Clifford before they could pass over it. Large crowds assembled to witness the first train going north.

EXACTLY SO.

The Advertiser managed very effectually to work itself into a towering passion on Monday night, because we had seen fit on Saturday to state as a matter of fact and as an item of intelligence, that it had renounced the no-party doctrine and was in a sort of don't-know-what-ails-me condition. Thereupon the bellows-blower, the man who manufactures the gas feels that a sudorific has been forced down his throat and sweats accordingly. He should have kept his temper; it is very ill-bred, as well as very sinful, to give way to anger, and then as to calling names it is a bad example for boys going to school, or running about the streets together. We have not much to say about the article, but as it was chiefly directed at us it is only polite that we should acknowledge the receipt of it. The argument it contains is something like the following: "We were never the advocates of no-partyism in the sense the Mercury means; we supported a certain policy which our former opponents were carrying out; we must not identify ourselves with these parties any further than is absolutely necessary for our honor and the interests of the country. We are independent, we are inconsistent; independence and inconsistency are synonymous." This is all except a fib or two not worth mentioning. He admits that all we said was correct, and he defends the position—what then was the use of getting mad at our remarks? But what double meaning has the term "No-partyism." We, like Miss Dartle, ask for information—has it though, do you really say so? *Litara scripta manet*, Mr. Advertiser, and it is still worse that it happens to be printed—so write on. If we were only poking fun at you, making a clumsy effort to be witty, why did you get so terribly in earnest about it? We part company with you now. May your sails be better filled on this tack than they were on the last. Look to your helm and see that he keeps steady, and not be chattering away in the rigging as senselessly as a baboon.

West York Nomination.

The nomination of candidates for the representation of West York in the House of Commons took place at Weston on Monday. The electors mustered strong. At one o'clock the Sheriff, who is Returning Officer, called the assemblage to order, read the proclamation and writ, and then asked for nominations. Wm. Wallace Esq., Warden of the County then nominated Mr. Amos Wright, as a fit and proper person to represent the constituency, and the nomination was seconded by Mr. P. Patterson, Reeve of Vaughan. Mr. John Bell, a lawyer of Toronto, was then proposed by Mr. Allan Gray, and seconded by Mr. Cruickshank. Speeches were then made by the candidates, and by their proposers and seconders. Dr. Parker was also present and made a very able speech. Of course there was no show of hands, but Mr. Wright's friends at the nomination are believed to have been in the proportion of two to one. Both gentlemen have gone to work very energetically.

DAMAGE TO THE CABLE.—For the second time communication by the cable of 1866 has been stopped. It is believed that the damage has been done by an iceberg, and tests show the fault to be at the Newfoundland side. The cable of 1865 which snapped in mid-ocean and was supposed to be irrecoverably lost, but fished up the next year, still continues to work without interruption. There was not a great deal of trouble in repairing the damage to the cable of 1866 the last time it ceased working, and likely the present mishap will soon be remedied.

TORONTO GENERAL HOSPITAL.—This institution was re-opened on Monday afternoon. It appears that the Trustees have now on hand only \$3,500, but they hope to be able to keep the Hospital open until the Legislature meet in the Fall. It is proposed to begin by providing beds for twenty-five patients.

THE UNFUNDED DEBT.—The finances of the Dominion are said to be in such a flourishing condition that the Government is able to pay off the whole of the unfunded debt, including the money borrowed from the Bank of Montreal.

A fatal accident occurred in Brampton on Tuesday afternoon. A gentleman from Esquimaux in company with his mother and a Miss Brown from Owen Sound, was driving along the street in that place, his horse took fright and ran away, upsetting the carriage and throwing the entire party out. Miss Kent was very severely injured, and notwithstanding the promptitude with which medical aid was secured she expired in a few minutes. The rest of the party escaped but slightly injured.

A statue of the Queen, life size, in royal robes, is to be erected shortly in the Place d'Armes, Montreal. The model has been worked by an English sculptor, and a cast in bronze will be taken from it.

The latest rumormongers is that the Hon. John Sandfield McDonald is also to enter the Ottawa Government. It may be this which has reconciled him to the elevation of Mr. Howland to the Lieutenant-Governorship of Ontario. His mission to the Maritime Provinces in company with Sir John would seem to give color to the latter part of the rumor. We know personally that during the late session of the Provincial Legislature, Sandfield was in the habit of telling his friends, publicly and privately, that "his place was not in the Local Ministry—it was not a proper field for him. He did not intend to remain longer than it was necessary to put the machinery in motion. He should then leave it to other hands." At this time all thought he had reference to the Governorship, and no doubt he had; but that being now beyond his reach, he may be willing to serve in the Ottawa Cabinet under Sir John, and thus avoid serving under the man whom he hates because he attained to that position to which he (Sandfield) had aspired with so much of ardent hope. Well, time will prove the correctness or error of all the present rumors and predictions.—*Times*.

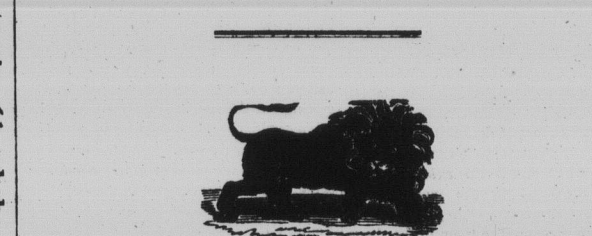

A strange scene, says the Peterborough Examiner, was enacted at Selham harbor lately. A man who had deserted his wife to elope with another woman was brought home by the police, escorted by a mob, including about 500 women, beating tin pots and yelling.

AUSTRALIA.—In 1865 the imports into the Australian colonies reached £38,000,000 and the exports £30,000,000. Within the last sixteen years New South Wales and Victoria have yielded £150,000,000 worth of gold, and New South Wales has produced 5,000,000 tons of coal. South Australia has also, within the last ten years, exported £5,000,000 worth of copper. The tonnage of vessels which arrived at Australian ports in 1865 was 3,000,000, and a similar amount of tonnage left those ports during the same period. Forty years ago the number of horses, cattle and sheep in Australia was under 400,000; the number now is nearly 35,000,000.

The melancholy death of Miss Mathieson, drowned while bathing at Caouana a short time since, has suggested the propriety and prudence of certain limits being marked out, beyond which no bather should be allowed to go, and also the advisability of both sexes bathing together as they do in Europe. The Montreal Herald says:—"With proper bathing dresses, always used on such occasions, there would be not the slightest fear of any delicacy, and should an accident occur, such as slipping into deep water, or being drawn in by the undertow of the surf or of a retreating wave, assistance would be always at hand."

A GAELIC PROFESSORSHIP IN CANADA.—Ganada has signified itself by being the first country in the world to establish a Gaelic Professorship, outdoing, in this respect, even Scotland itself, the native home of this ancient language, where, though such a measure has been long in contemplation, it has never yet been realized. Rev. John McKay, of Richmond, recently appointed to the chair of Metaphysics in St. Francis College, of that place, has also been constituted Professor of the Gaelic language and literature in the same institution. Mr. McKay is an eminent for his knowledge of this classic tongue, as for his other acquirements, and while congratulating St. Francis College on being the first to establish a Gaelic Professorship, we must also congratulate it on having secured so distinguished a scholar as Mr. McKay to fill the position.
