Local and Other Items.

FATAL ACCIDENT. - Mr. William Beemer, carpenter and builder of Simcoe, was killed on Thursday by a load of wood upsetting upon him. Deceased was much respected by all. He leaves a wife and several children to mourn his untimely end.

PIROON MATCH. - A pigeon match came off at Stratford on Thursday between George Rensselaer, of Toronto, and Alex. McCulloch, of Stratford. Fifty birds each; \$100 a side; resulting in favor of McCulloch. Score, McCulloch 86, Rensselaer 81.

OTAWA ORGANS are throwing out "feelings" about the reconstruction of the Dominion Government and the appointment of some prominent politicians. The next month promises to give the organists plenty of "inspired" work.

ASTRA occurred at Ayrton, Grey, between 8 and 9 o'clock on Wednesday evening. Mr. Robert Smith's store caught fire in some unknown way and was together with a large part of the stock burned to ground, the stock was valued at about \$5,000 and buildings \$1,000, the stock and buildings were insured for \$2,000.

RECENT heavy and extensive storms have so swollen the rivers in northern France and in Belgium that they have inundated large tracts, with very damaging consequences. The Seine has overflowed a section of a Parisian suburb; and a portion of Ghent suffers much loss and inconvenience from a similar cause.

FATAL ACCIDENT. - A melancholy accident occurred at Goodwood on Tuesday last. Some men in the employ of Mr. Charles Gould were falling a tree, and, in doing so, dislodged a limb from an adjoining tree, which struck one of the men, named Alfred Hockley, on the head causing insensibility. He lingered until twelve o'clock on Wednesday night, when death relieved his agony. The deceased leaves a wife and a family of young children to mourn his loss.

CARLYLE'S HEALTH. - The Pall Mall Gazette says that it is able to state, on the very best authority, that there is no truth in the very alarming paragraphs which have recently appeared, concerning the state of Mr. Carlyle's health. "They are all zero," as he expresses it. Mr. Carlyle is in the full enjoyment of his usual vigor and good spirits, and takes his daily walks with surprising power of limb. A correspondent writes: "It is never pleasant for the youngest of us to be told that we are looking awfully ill, even when we are in the best of health; and although Mr. Carlyle conceals any sense of pain at these reports - if it exists at all, very heavily expressed contempt for the concoctors of such catchpenny paragraphs, which are at once cruel and false. Probably these reports originate in ignorance. There is a gentleman often seen in Chelsea, much older than Mr. Carlyle, and very infirm; whose hat and clothes are so constructed that he is often taken for the distinguished author of Sartor Resartus."

AN EXPERIENCED SHOPPER. - An old fellow who was noted through the town for his stutering as well as for his shrewdness in making a bargain, stopped at a grocery and inquired: "How m-m-many t-t-turkeys have you g-g-got?" "Eight, sir," replied the grocer. "T-t-tough or t-t-tender?" "Some are tender and some are tough," was the reply. "I k-keep b-b-b-boards," said the new customer. "P-pick out the f-four t-t-toughest t-t-turkeys if you please." The delighted grocer very willingly complied with the unusual request and said in his politest tones: "These are the tough ones, sir." Upon which the merchant coolly put his hands on the remaining four, and exclaimed: "I'll t-t-take th-th-these!"

A MARKET FOR WHEAT. - England will be in the twelve months between September, 1872, and September, 1873, one hundred million bushels of wheat from foreign fields. She is now receiving five million bushels per week, of which a considerable share is from France, where the wheat crop has been excellent. Our own broad fields will do their part towards making good the English deficiency, and with this market we can count on our wheat for the means of paying the value of much of those goods and wares which are imported from the English and industry supply us.

In the course of pulling down the old mill building in Cowgate, Edinburgh, recently, to widen the street, there was discovered in the crevice of a wall a specimen of the medal struck by Gregory XIII., to commemorate the massacre of St. Bartholomew. It is rather larger than an English half crown, and bears on the obverse side the effigy of the Pope, with the legend "Gregorius XIII., Pont. Max. An. I." (Gregory XIII., Supreme Pontiff, in the first year); and on the reverse with the legends, "Vgonotorum Strages (Slaughter of the Huguenots), 1572," a representation of the massacre, in which is seen the figure of a winged and helmeted angel, with a cross in one hand and a sword in another, engaged in the work of destruction.

The condition of George Macdonald is still critical, though not altogether alarming. He has had no fresh attack of bleeding at the lungs, but is quite weak. He is at Dover, N. J., with friends.

QUEEN VICTORIA has addressed an autograph letter to the Lord Chief Justice of England, expressive of Her Majesty's warm and cordial acknowledgment of his great services at the Tribunal of Geneva.

Wreck of the Steamer "Matchless."

All on Board Lost.

Great Freshets in France and Belgium.

Snow Storm Out West.

Arrest of a Broker.

London, Dec. 19. - The steamship Matchless, of Boston, Mass., has been wrecked off the coast of Northumberland county. All on board were lost.

Paris, Dec. 19. - The river Seine has overflowed its banks and the water is spreading on both sides. In this city the quays are flooded, the stores near them are closed, and all traffic in that quarter is carried on by boats. Beyond Berry, a suburb of Paris, on the right bank of the Seine, the houses in the vicinity of river are standing in one vast lake of water.

Brussels, Dec. 19. - Despatches from Ghent report that the streams in that section of Belgium have risen above their embankments, and the country is inundated. The city of Ghent is now flooded, and in some of the streets the water is three feet deep.

Chicago, Dec. 20. - The most violent storm of the season commenced about three o'clock yesterday afternoon; and four inches of snow has fallen and drifted greatly before a northeast gale. The railroad companies report no detention of trains up to midnight.

New York, Dec. 20. - Robert Baile, broker, No. 2 Wall street, was arrested yesterday charged with defrauding J. & J. Stuart & Co. out of \$90,000. The latter firm claims that in 1871 they loaned Baile that amount on his personal honor, which he now refuses to pay.

London, Dec. 19. - The London Times' assizes column of this morning contains six verdicts of murder with sentences of death passed upon the culprits.

Agricultural and Arts Association of Ontario.

A meeting of the Council of the above Association was held on Wednesday afternoon. Present - the President - Mr. Stephen White (in the chair); Hon. David Christie, George Graham, Dr. Buckland, Archibald Macdonald, Nathan Choate, Andrew Wilson, James Young, M. P., R. Gibbons, M. P., P., Irvine Diamond, L. L. Shipley, and George Murton.

Considerable time was spent in passing accounts and reading protests. Mr. Osler, solicitor, attended the meeting, and informed the Council that the Denison case had been carried into the office of the Master in Chancery, that an advertisement with conditions of sale had been prepared, and that the sale would take place as soon as the Court ordered it.

On motion of Dr. Buckland, the Hon. David Christie was authorized to attend the examinations of the Veterinary College as representative of the Agricultural and Arts Association.

Mr. Gibbons said that the Minister of Agriculture had promised to give the sum of \$20 as a prize to be competed for by the students in the Veterinary College. He (Mr. Gibbons) moved that the Board give a prize of \$15, and one of \$10, as second and third prizes to that of the Minister. The motion was carried.

The Secretary was authorized to correspond with manufacturers of turn-stiles in England, with the view of purchasing a number in addition to those the Board now has.

On motion of Mr. Murton, seconded by the Hon. Mr. Christie, Monday, the 22nd of September, was agreed upon as the opening day of the next exhibition. -Globe.

Elora Pork Packing Company.

It gives us great pleasure to make public any new enterprise which has for its object the advancement of the village and the interests of our agricultural friends who are in the habit of doing business with us. The Pork Packing Company, which was organized last season, and which was a good speculation to shareholders, has again been called into active operation, and Mr. Livingstone, who has been appointed buyer, is now prepared to purchase from four to ten thousand hogs, paying the highest market price therefor. Several hogs were bought yesterday at from \$4.50 to \$5 per hundred. Two thousand six hundred hogs were purchased here last year by the same company, at an average of \$5 per hundred, and the company paid out over \$27,000. When operations fairly commence one hundred hogs will be cut up every day, giving employment to ten men. We hope the enterprise will be crowned with abundant success. -News.

STANLEY'S FAILURE AS A LECTURER.

It appears that as a lecturer, Mr. Stanley has proved a decided failure, and his efforts considered in a commercial point of view, have so far failed to pay expenses. The New York Herald's report of Mr. Stanley's late lecture must have caused no little surprise to its readers. The Herald has weighed Mr. Stanley in the balance and found him wanting, and expressed its opinion in unmistakable terms. He is, says the Herald, "intolerably dull," his "elocution is bad," and his manner of treating his subject was not such as to assure a forgetfulness of his faults of oratory." Besides, he only talked of common places," "his anecdotes were spoiled in the telling," and his "voice was pitched in a sing-song and devoid of monotony." In closing the report the critic says that "Mr. Stanley has utterly mistaken the necessities of the platform," and that "it would be cruel to him not to say so." And all this from the Herald!

A New Order of Protestant Nuns. (From the New York Herald.) By the steamer Celtic of the White Star Line, there have been expected since Saturday three distinguished ladies of the Protestant Episcopal Order of the Sisters of All Saints, or, as they are sometimes called from the character of their mission and labors, "Sisters of the Poor."

Sister Helen is a daughter of the late Captain Rowden, of the Royal Navy of England, and from her first taking of the veil, in which she was the third member of the order, she has signalled her modest and unassuming self, by acts of the most wonderful nature and of the kindest womanhood.

The Queen sent to Sister Helen to thank her for what she had done at Manchester and to ask her service at the bedside of that old friend of the Royal Family, Earl Deveraux, of Knowle, who was dangerously sick.

Small-Pox Hasting in Buffalo.
 It is a fact which admits of no dispute that the small-pox is at present raging to an alarming extent in this city, the number of cases being greater now than for a long time past. The disease even seems to be spreading in Buffalo much more than it did last winter and spring, when the average number of deaths from it each month was between sixty and seventy. The disease prevails especially among the German classes in the city, who stubbornly oppose vaccination. Some decided action taken now would go far towards bringing it under control, when perhaps a month or so hence it would be impossible for the city of public commissioners are fully alive to their duty in preventing the spread of the small-pox, and yesterday passed the following resolution:—
 Resolved,—That in view of the prevalence of small-pox in the city, the several members of the police force be and they are hereby ordered to report to the surgeon of police for vaccination forthwith; and that the surgeon be and is hereby directed to report to the board the names of all members of the force who neglect or refuse to comply with this order.

The disreputable effort that has been made in some quarters, to render Mr. Greeley's defeat and death a great financial disaster to the welfare of the New York Tribune, has received a practical set-back in the offer of \$10,000 per share for that portion of the stock which has now become the property of Mr. Greeley's daughters. This is a large value as has ever before been placed upon the stock of the New York Tribune.

A recent Dominion return shows that the salaries paid eight officers in connection with the Intercolonial Railway amount to \$22,800 per annum. The highest salary is paid the chief engineer, Sandford Fleming, \$4,800 a year; the three Commissioners, Messrs. C. J. Brydges, E. B. Chandler, and A. W. McLellan, get \$8,000 each. Aquila Walsh, Chairman of the Board, gets \$4,000.
