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IF CITY GIVES WESTERN CANADA MILLING CO. CONCESSIONS, ROBIN HOOD MILLS WILL ASK FOR AID ON SAME BASIS

Not at All Opposed to City Putting Advantages in the Way of a Revival Concern, but is of Opinion Same Advantages Should Go to Older Concerns.

Manager of Robin Hood Company Says His Firm is Employing 150 Men and Will Have Expended \$200,000 in the Course of a Few Months.

New Concern Wants Power at \$30, Tax Exemption for Ten Years, Taxation for Another Ten Years on an Appraisal of \$75,000.

"We expect the same concessions that the city has offered to the Western Canada Milling Company," this is the definite statement of W. L. Harvey, secretary of the Robin Hood Milling Company, who is in the city at present for a few days.

"That the city should not give this assistance to the new concern, but should give it to the old one, is a matter of opinion," says Mr. Harvey.

"The original conditions decided upon by the city council included a site and exemption from taxation for a period of ten years.

"We have received no concessions from the city," said Mr. Harvey. "Some of the gentlemen on the city council that we had some tax consideration because our property is on the C.P.R. right-of-way. This is correct. We pay taxes upon full valuation, as do any other industry in any part of the city."

They Leaped 180 Ft. TO THEIR DEATH SHOCKING SUICIDE OF YOUNG COUPLE FROM ROOF OF ANTWERP CATHEDRAL.

Antwerp, Belgium, April 26.—A youth, 18 years old, and a 19-year-old girl, are the principals in a shocking love tragedy here today. At 11 o'clock they climbed to the clock galleries in the tower of the Notre Dame cathedral, and from a height of 150 feet leaped into space, falling at the feet of jassars.

Every bone in the bodies of the boy and his companion was broken. As they hurtled through the air several men and women who witnessed the sight faltered.

According to the police, the leap from the church tower was in accordance with a promise made by the youth to the girl. The tragedy occurred at a time when the gloom market, in front of the north tower of the cathedral, was thronged with pedestrians, a large number of whom stood transfixed, helpless witnesses of every phase of the drama.

The act of the youths was premeditated as shown by the fact that they had placed five letters, one addressed to the police commissary and the others to various relations, which they could easily be seen by visitors to the tower.

The letters show that the youth was Elie Walkow and that his home was in this city. The girl has not yet been identified. The letters it is declared, stated that the young couple had been driven to their dreadful act because of a love affair.

FARGICAL FREAK OF FRENZIED FEMALES

"COURT-MARTIAL" SITS TO "TRY" ALLEGED "TRAITRESS," A SUFFRAGETTE

London, April 26.—A rift between the Women's Social and Political Union, the organization of the militant suffragettes, and its American members, was indicated today by the summoning of a "court-martial" composed of "General" Mrs. Flora Drummond, setting as judge advocate, and the cabinet of the Women's Social and Political Union, sitting as judges to try Mrs. Mary Ford of New York on a charge of alleged treason to the organization.

The military features of the court were all in quite correct form with one exception—there was no means of compelling the attendance of the accused, who failed to appear. Mrs. Mary Ford later said she knew nothing of the charge and did not expect to appear before the court.

The charges against Mrs. Ford as prepared by Mrs. "General" Drummond were: "First, failing to inform the Women's Social and Political Union as to the exact hour of the release of Miss Zella Emerson, of Jackson, Mich., which fact was within Mrs. Ford's knowledge, and being valuable to the organization, she was in duty bound to reveal it."

"Second, the allegation that Mrs. Ford had told the American press representatives in London that the Women's Social and Political Union planned the kidnapping of Miss Zella Emerson from her mother."

"Third, that Mrs. Ford had contrived a strict rule of the Women's Social and Political Union by announcing publicly that she had committed specific acts of militancy."

In court today it was explained that this rule was a very important one, and the record was pointed out showing that the only suffragettes who had been caught were captured red-handed, while the others went free. This, it was said, indicated that the perpetrators of militant acts, while glorying in their jail records, did not talk about their specific deeds.

"WALES" GOES A-COURTING

London, April 26.—Everybody was much amused at the reason given out for the visit of the Prince of Wales to Germany. He will be away, at the most, for a few weeks, and it is stated that the object of his tour is to "improve his knowledge of the German language."

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"Banish the Bar" is the Slogan of Temperance Reformers in Alberta

Memorial from Reformers Asks the Government to Take Over the Sale of Liquor—Suggests That No Drink be Sold Except in Wholesale Stores—Many Influential Signatures Appended

The nationalization of the liquor traffic is the latest proposition from a certain section of the temperance forces in Alberta, and a pamphlet has been prepared along that line, and is now being circulated in various circles among those who take an interest in the reform of the traffic, which, it is claimed, works more harm than any other. Another suggestion made in the pamphlet, and which is perhaps of more importance, is that the sale of liquor at bars should be prohibited, and only wholesale stores should be allowed. The sale being in the hands of the government, the large revenue which would accrue from that source would be devoted to the alleviation of the many ills which in the past arise from the indiscriminate sale of liquor.

The Temperance Platform. For some months a number of citizens in the city of Calgary have been busy to devise some practical way of improving the temperance situation within the province, and after much careful consideration they now submit to you the following plan for your favorable judgment and support: Our Aim. To have the sale of liquor, so far as its use for beverage purposes is permitted, so conducted and controlled that its usual attendant evils may be reduced as greatly as possible; to provide counteracting influences for the prevention of the habit of intemperance, and to furnish means for the proper care and restoration of the victims of this habit.

What We Propose To Do. We will try to induce the policy before the people of Alberta and obtain their favorable judgment. Then, by petition, we will ask the legislature to embody in its statutes which would displace the present liquor license option of the province a number of influential men who will hold in obtaining such legislation, and also in carrying the purpose of the law into actual effect. Universal Penny Postage. London, April 25.—Postmaster-General Samuel, in presenting the annual post office budget in the house of commons today, declared himself in favor of universal penny postage, which he said would cost \$500,000 yearly. He said he had made a strenuous attempt to obtain the support of the chancellor of the exchequer for a reduction in the postage rate, but nothing had been accomplished. The loss on penny postage between Great Britain and the United States in the first year, said Mr. Samuel, was \$2,120,000. It has now been reduced to \$123,000. No development was more remarkable, said Mr. Samuel, than the increase in the use of telegraph cables, since the reduction in rates, difficulty in retaining the members of his cabinet, owing to their fears that their lives are endangered. The New Mining Law, the dominant political party, is fearful that the loan may complete Yuan Shi Kai's dictatorship.

Barry and Pearce Matched. London, April 25.—Ernest Barry, of Tasmania, world's champion sniffer, and Henry Pearce, of Australia, were matched yesterday to snuff from Turvey to Mortlake July 21, for the world's champion sniffer. The last race for the world's champion sniffer was won by Pearce when he snuffed the Championship on the Fitzmaurice river, July 28, 1911, when Ernest Barry recovered his title from Ernest, Australia, and successfully defended the title against Durran, Toronto, on October 11, winning with ease on both occasions.

C. P. R. STEER FEEDING AWARDS ARE MADE KNOWN

The steer feeding competition, inaugurated by the annual husbandry branch of the department of Natural Resources of the Canadian Pacific railway for farmers' sons in the irrigation block, has now been completed. Of the 275 steers which, in lots of eight, were last fall entrusted to 24 competitors, 170 have been returned to the company and sold at the highest price obtainable on the Calgary market. The steers used in this competition were high-class three-year-old feeders, in good beef condition, off grass and in November last, cost the department \$1.2 cents per pound. Under the terms of the competition, the steers were delivered to the competitors at that figure, on the understanding that when turned in at the time of the Calgary spring show, the feeder would receive the difference between the cost as above stated and the actual market value of the animals when sold to the best possible advantage. The different results, achieved by these lots, under conditions practically identical, are somewhat remarkable. While some of the lots showed such uniform improvement that it was possible to class all the animals competing them as choice best, it was found, in many cases, necessary to grade the animals into three classes, according to quality. Where, as frequently happened, steers of different qualities were shown in the same lot, these classes were weighed separately, with the view of giving the competitor the highest price obtainable for each class. One hundred and twenty-seven steers, in all, were graded first-class, and topped the market, being sold at \$7.60 per hundred weight. In the second class, 84 brought \$7.25. The steers were weighed off cars at Calgary and delivered to the competitors, and when turned in were carefully weighed by the superintendent of the Alberta Stock yards in the presence of two witnesses. Each lot allowed 36 hours with feed and water. The department paid the freight on the cattle, both going and returning, and also supplied feed and attendance in the yards here. The first prize of \$100.00 was won by Harold C. Bellamy of Calgary, in all of whose steers graded first-class. Young Bellamy added 105 pounds to the weight of his cattle, which, with the increase in price, gave him a net return apart from the prize money, of \$182.50. The second prize of \$75.00 was won by John Cassels, of Langdon, aged 13 years, whose steers were also all in the first grade. He added 775 pounds to the weight of his steers, making a net profit, apart from the prize money of \$175.00. The third prize of \$50.00 was won by William Cassels, Jr., aged 13 years, one of whose steers dropped into the second-class the added weight of the eight animals being 885 pounds, and the net profit, apart from the prize money \$152.93. The fourth prize of \$25.00 was won by Russell Culp of Koona, aged 17. Six of his steers graded first-class and two second-class, the added weight being 550 pounds and the net profit, apart from the prize money \$159.98. In the case of the next twelve competitors, the cash returns ranged from \$148.00 to \$111.00. From among the best of the steers turned in, two lots of 15 each were carefully offered for fat stock at the Calgary spring show under the auspices of the annual husbandry branch. It being the intention to divide any prize money which might be won among the competitors in proportion to the number of steers owned by each. These steers were individually very good, but coming as they did from many different feeders, were lacking in uniformity and finish, and, while much admired, were not placed among the prize winners. The wide divergence in the results achieved by the boys is very interesting, presenting as it does a fair illustration of the great differences which exist among our incoming settlers, not only in character, but in the degree of practical knowledge which they possess. It is the intention to publish fuller details relative to the manner in which the various different lots were fed and handled, in the hope that the information thus afforded will be of real benefit to others, while realizing that coarse grains and roughage may be profitably used in the fattening of stock, are anxious to learn how these may be utilized to the best advantage. The general interest which this experiment has attracted, not only in the irrigation block, but elsewhere, affords good ground for the belief that the benefits resulting from it will more than justify the effort and expenditure which it has cost.

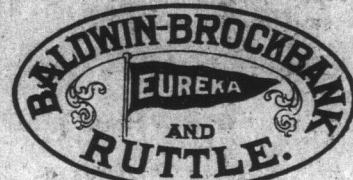

### KOVIACH IS TO HANG

Hungarian Doomed to the Gallows at Prince Albert for Murder of Charles Bruggenote.

Prince Albert, Sask., April 26.—Emeric Koviach was sentenced to death for the murder of Charles Bruggenote. After listening to the evidence for three days in what was described by the prosecuting counsel as one of the most cold-blooded and mysterious murders in the criminal annals of the northwest, the jury, at midnight last night returned a verdict of guilty of murder. Koviach, who is a Hungarian, is about 38 years of age. The motive assigned for the crime was that Koviach in his own defence told precisely the same story of the murder, except that it was Bruggenote and not himself, that had entered the man's brains and drove him in the night into the prairie. Chief Justice Haultain passed sentence of death on Koviach. He will also be indicted on the charge of taking part in the murder.

### BRYAN PLEDGED HIS SUPPORT TO U. S. AGRICULTURAL COMMISSION.

New York, April 25.—W. J. Bryan pledges the hearty support of his department to the American commission on agriculture, which starts tomorrow to investigate systems of farm credit in European countries. A message from him to the secretary of the commission, given in the commission's honor, at which Secretary Houston and Ambassador Page, the speakers included United States Senator Thomas P. Gore of Oklahoma and Duncan Fletcher of Florida, who are federal members of the commission; Walter Scott, premier of Saskatchewan, representing Canada; and John Barrett, director-general of the Pan-American union.

### Archives Enriched by Important Papers

Ottawa, April 27.—With the arrival of a further instalment, which completes the collection, the Canadian archives are now in possession of an important series of documents, viz.: the private papers of the late Joseph Howe, the Nova Scotia statesman, who played such a large part in the history of Canada at the time of confederation. The papers comprise some 40 volumes of journals, letters and editorials, and furnish a splendid outline of the political history of Nova Scotia up to the time of confederation. The entrance of the maritime province into the newly formed dominion, is generally known, was attended by difficulties which the political documents of the archives, from the family of the great statesman illuminate.

### Bethlehem Steel's Purchase Confirmed

New York, April 25.—The Bethlehem Steel Co. has purchased the Fort River Shipbuilding company of Quincy, Mass., a \$4,800,000 corporation, builders of battleships and other war craft. The purchase was confirmed today at the offices of the Bethlehem Steel Co. in New York. Officers of the Bethlehem company said they preferred that official announcement to the one made in the details came from the Fort River company.

### Prayers Offered for New Chinese Republic

Calgary Churches Join With Whole World in Welcoming the New Republic in China and to Express the Hope that Enlightenment in Mongolian Empire and Pray for Its Success.

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Calgary churches yesterday joined with Christian churches the world over in prayers specially prepared for the occasion for the youthful republic which has been established in China. Many preachers also took occasion to refer to the missionary work which had been done by Christian churches in China and to express the hope that the enlightenment which would be brought into the country under such a progressive government as had at last been established there after long years of misery and darkness would be the means of civilizing and Christianizing the people far more rapidly than ever had been dreamt of by the fideist missionaries.
