A PESSIMIST.

There are others, however, who do not take this optimistic view, and who do not believe in this *laissez faire* policy. They predict that society will be terribly convulsed in the near future and declare that it should prepare itself for the shock.

At present nothing less than the preservation of society is at issue. Nine hundred and ninety-nine out of a thousand will not only deem this assertion extravagant, but dismiss it at once as a self-evident absurdity.

The learned Professor goes on to try to convince his readers that society is living above a volcano which may at any moment burst and do incalculable destruction. It is evident that he has lost his faith in human nature and in the common sense of mankind.

CANADIAN QUARANTINE.

The American Public Health Association held its meeting in Montreal a week or two ago. The subject of quarantine was naturally one of the topics of discussion. It seems that the United States members had doubts about the efficiency of the quarantine arrangements at Grosse Ile.

THE WANT OF TIME.

It must be evident to every man who thinks that what is greatly wanted in these days is more knowledge and a more general discipline of the reasoning powers. Political power has been extended to almost all men indiscriminately.

One meets every day men of very limited information who have a remedy out and tried for the evils which afflict societies—evils for which the best read men and the deepest thinkers cannot even suggest a remedy.

Charles Dudley Warner has evidently had a large experience of the man of the class who have tried to describe. In his latest work "Golden House," he says: "The trouble with governing and legislation now in the United States is that everybody is superficially educated and that the people are putting their superficial knowledge into laws and that we are going to have a nice time with all these wild theories and oracles on the statute book.

The question that occurs to those who deplore the state of things described by Mr. Warner is: What are you going to do about it? Ignorant and shallow men will talk and will do their best to make converts to their erroneous opinions and their quack cures for political and social evils. It is simply impossible to silence them even if it were possible to say it is not polite. Liberty of opinion and of discussion is the best check we have to bad government, and it is better that men should have the widest latitude in propagating erroneous opinions than that men who are capable of guiding the people aright should be hampered and muzzled.

"GENERAL BOOTH."

General Booth is in Canada. He proposes, we understand, to visit the Pacific Coast. This extraordinary man is one of the celebrities of the age. If he had only established and maintained that wonderful organization, the Salvation Army, he would have performed a great work for the Army from an extent so to have garrisons in almost every part of the world, and its soldiers do their work with surprising fidelity, zeal and efficiency.

General Booth is a most interesting and forceful man. He began with no advantages of birth, wealth or education as a lay preacher of a small and obscure sect of Christians. But he soon outgrew the narrow limitations of such work, though he did so as first without being conscious whether he was tending. Indeed, it was the suspicion and jealousy of the ministers under whom he worked that drove him into founding the Salvation Army almost by accident.

General Booth will not find the Salvation Army in this country the power that it has become in England. There are many reasons for this, perhaps the greatest being the fact that religious forces more or less akin to the Army are already at work here.

What the Tribune says of the United States is true of Canada. There are many men and women in the churches and out of the churches who, seeing that the Salvation Army is doing good to individuals and classes that other reforming instrumentalities did not reach, wish them well, and are ready to lend them a helping hand.

BRITISH POLITICS.

The political situation in Great Britain is not by any means interesting. Parties seem to be resting on their oars. The Government is not in a very pleasant position. Its Irish supporters are by no means satisfied. They are grumbling and threatening what they will do if the Government does not do something towards punishing the House of Lords for throwing out the Home Rule Bill and other bills that had been passed by the Lower House.

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Now, let us see whether we cannot form some idea of what this order is likely to be. You will agree with me, I am sure, that the Irish will be first. In a question of importance they leave all the world behind. (Laughter.) They will be the first to stand up and, unlike some other favorites, I have heard, they will have to fear no outsider. (Laughter and cheers.) Accordingly, I have no doubt that, as long as this Government is in existence, the next session of Parliament, and the next after that, if it continues, will be occupied principally as previous sessions have been—with Irish legislation. I think there ought to be a close time for Irish legislation, (Laughter and cheers.) I think it is time that we neglected Britishers had a chance, and I am quite sure that our grievances at the present time are more serious than those of the Irish people. Well, the next in the order of the day is the Welsh, and they owe the position which is that of a bad second entirely to the efforts of four gallant sons of Wales, who on one occasion actually heroically abstained from voting in a division which had previously assured themselves that the Government was perfectly safe and could do this display of impudence as an exceptional honor in the Gladstonian party what turned the hair white of all the leaders, and the whips rushed to Lord Rosebery, and that unfortunate man had to make another pronouncement and he had to declare that although he was in favor of established churches, he prepared to give the proposal for disestablishment of the Church in Wales an equal chance with the reform of the law laws in Ireland. Lastly, do not forget these other two—the United Kingdom Alliance—(laughter and cheers)—and the Bill for the Abolition of the League Treaty. (Laughter.) But I cannot help thinking that that horse is only in it to make the running for the others. (Laughter and cheers.) Now there is the programme of legislation. There is a sketch of the Queen's Speech, and the Government has promised—and never in the history of this country has a Government promised as this—that it will give satisfaction to all these claims; and then the Leeds Conference comes in—(laughter)—and demands that its spare moments shall be occupied in revolution in the shape of the abolition of the Second Chamber.

In his narration of the voyage, a copy of which has been sent to the provincial legislature of this city, he gives a graphic description of the harbor and of the sad disaster that occurred here on July 13, 1785, to two of his ships, which with all their occupants were overwhelmed in the dreadful wreck.

BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

Sewerage Commissioners Advocate Day Labor on Sewers and Give Their Reasons.

Results of an Analysis of the City Water—Hospital Fire Protection.

All the members of the City Council were present at the usual weekly meeting last night with the exception of Ald. Vigelta.

To His Worship the Mayor and Council.

GENTLEMEN—I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter dated 28th ult., in reference to the question of day labor on the Douglas street sewer to the grounds of the North West school and enclosing copy of resolution passed by the council in reference thereto.

That until such time as the council shall resolve that the work be performed by day labor instead of by contract, the council shall order that it be done by day labor.

The Sewerage Commissioners have deemed it their duty to consider very carefully the question of the principle involved in the above resolution, viz: that under a contract system the City Engineer, the former system has been adopted for obvious reasons in the great majority of public works in the city.
