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THE PARNELL COMMISSION. A Violent Scene in the House of Commons—Needless Delay.

London, July 18.—The scene in the House over the Parnell Commission Bill was a violent one. "Mr. Parnell" says one of his friends, "that for long years past there has been no such passion."

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THE PARNELL COMMISSION. FULL TEXT OF THE BILL FOR ITS APPOINTMENT.

Three Persons to Constitute the Court—Their Names Omitted from the Draft—To Have Certain Powers as the High Court of Justice.

London, July 18.—The following is the text of the Government Bill for the appointment of a Special Commission to inquire into the charges against Irish members of Parliament.

Whereas charges and allegations have been made against certain members of the House of Commons and others by the defendants in the action of O'Donnell, Walter and another, it is expedient that a Special Commission be appointed to inquire into the truth of the charges and allegations, and that it should have such powers as may be necessary for the effectual conducting of the inquiry.

It is therefore enacted, That—The three persons hereinafter mentioned (names not given) are hereby appointed Commissioners for the purpose of this Act.

THE MISSING CULTURE. A Chapter in the History of the Toronto Board of Works.

One of the main points made by Lawyer Fullerton in the Board of Works investigation, was the one that showed that culverts had been charged to contractors, which on examination were found to be non-existent.

At first sight it looked as if the discoverers direct evidence that a serious fraud had been perpetrated on the city, but it is a fraud it appears to have been one long known to the members of the Council. Eight years ago, according to the records of the Board of Works, a sub-committee consisting of Ald. Carlin, the discoverers, were directed to investigate the culverts to be constructed on the streets for which no sewer appropriation had been made, and which had been charged to contractors.
