It is reported in a Paris paper that 30 per cent of the British losses in the present war are caused by taking a bath and shaving in the morning. Even when the enemy opens fire they finish their toilet before returning it. Such calmness and attention to early habits must win in the end.

The Canadian Government has passed an order-in-council which will have a far-reaching effect on imported labor. Immigration officers have been instructed to refuse admittance, including settlers, coming from the United States, who have not been American citizens for ten years.

What have we to gain if we win? That we have nothing material to gain, no colonies which we covet, no possessions of any sort that we desire, is the final proof that the war has not been provoked by us. No nation would deliberately go out of its way to wage so hazardous and costly a struggle when there is no prize for victory. But one enormous indirect benefit we will gain if we can make Germany a peaceful and harmless state.

The Providence (Rhode Island) Journal says:—William of Germany and his people have an account to square with God that no sophistry can wipe out. For they have willfully, and in their mad passion for conquest, turned a fair land into a shambles, taken a peaceable little nation by the throat, torn it into bleeding fragments and crushed its little heart beneath their iron tread.

There are six vacancies in the Senate to be filled. Five of these are in Ontario, the deaths having occurred during the past year of Senators Sir Geo. Ross, Cox, Coffey, Wm. Gibson and McMillan, and the sixth is in British Columbia, owing to the retirement of Senator McDonald. Another important vacancy to be filled is that created on the Railway Commission by the retirement of Dr. Mills, on the expiry of his term of office.

The federal department of labor has established a children's bureau to teach parents how to care for children and has just issued a booklet on "Parental Culture," which is for free distribution. For some time Canada has been paying considerable attention to the improvement of hogs, chickens, and live stock, as well as teaching us how to raise pumpkins and potatoes, and it is encouraging to find attention now being turned toward improving the human race.

As Germany and France have been the chief source of supply for seeds of roots and garden crops, and as war operations will cut off this supply the Canadian Government has adopted a policy of paying cash subsidies for seeds produced in the Dominion. For the seed of mangel or sugar beets the subsidy will be 3c a pound; turnip seeds, 4c; carrots, 7c; garden beets, 10c; parsnips, 7c; radish, 9c; cabbage, 25c; tomatoes, 50c; onions, 25c; celery, 40c; lettuce 25c; cucumbers 20c; muskmelon, 20c.

WOMEN AND GOLF

Valuable Hints For Those Learning to Play the Game.

MASTERY OF RULES NEEDED.

Grounding in the Elements an Important Point For the Beginner—To Become Expert One Must Combine Theory With Technical Skill.

Women players of golf, especially beginners, are inclined to swing the club so far around that they are thrown off their balance and the club swings the woman instead of the woman the club, says a writer in the Outlook. This fault can be corrected by keeping a tight grip on the club at all times during the swing, as it is the loosened hold that allows the head of the club to drop too near the ground. In the drive, which requires the fullest swing of any of the strokes except perhaps the brassie shot, the shaft of the club at the top of the swing should not go beyond the horizontal.

There is another point that women players, even experienced ones, are apt to neglect, and that is the rules of the game. There have been many matches in which players have been disqualified through the unconscious disregard or breaking of some rule. A book of general rules can be purchased at any place where golf clubs are sold, and the local or ground rules of each club are printed on the score cards of that club, so there is no excuse for any one being in a state of ignorance.

If there is any short cut to learning golf it is through careful study of the reasons for everything. Once the principles of the strokes are mastered a few months of regular and intelligent practice will make any able-bodied woman a fair player, but years of practice without scientific knowledge of the game will bring very uncertain results.

A woman who seriously desires to become a really good player must curb her desire to go out and whack the ball along. Before she ever makes a complete round of the links she should study the peculiarities of each club, how to stand when using it, how to address the ball with it, how to swing it and what to expect of the ball once the stroke is made. After she has mastered these essentials and practiced with each club separately at suitable locations on the links she may piece together all she has learned and play a whole game, but not before.

It is possible and perfectly permissible to wriggle the feet from side to side until they are comfortably and firmly settled. This may seem rather an unimportant suggestion, but it is next to impossible to keep the body from swaying either sideways or forward unless a firm base is established, and if the body sways the accuracy of the stroke is gone.

Women are rather inclined to walk up to the ball and hit it without taking the time to arrange themselves properly. After all, only a fraction of a minute is required to find the best possible position, and the habit once acquired becomes practically automatic.

PREPARING RAW SILK.

The Washing Process Is an Important and Delicate Operation.

Raw silk is of three kinds, known to the trade as organzine, tram and souple. The organzine is used for the warp or woven materials, and the tram for the weft. Before these are dyed and prepared for weaving, the silkworm gum must be washed out by a process called "stripping." The souple silk is used for the manufacturing of the soft fabrics, such as messaline, chiffon, etc., and in order that these materials may retain their softness and pliability and admit of being crushed in the hand without showing any signs of creasing the souple silk must first undergo a process known as softening.

This process is a very delicate operation, and the quality of the silk depends very much upon the care with which the softening is done. In this case the silk is not stripped off the silkworm gum, but is immediately placed in a bath of pure olive oil soap. This bath is made up of about fifty parts of pure water to one of strong liquid soap. The silk is suspended in this bath on wooden rods and is moved back and forth by two operatives, who frequently turn it and keep it in constant motion. The bath is heated to 30 degrees R., and owing to the continuous agitation of the silk in the bath the silkworm gum, while not washed out, is made to permeate uniformly through the silk.

After being treated in this manner for about an hour the silk is removed and placed in another bath of lukewarm water, where it is again treated in the same way. This process continues for about fifteen minutes and is intended only to cleanse the silk. The skeins are then removed from the bath and placed in another consisting of about sixty parts of pure water to one of concentrated sulphuric acid heated to 60 degrees R. Here it is worked back and forth and frequently turned very slowly for about two hours or until it yields very readily to a pressure of the finger. It is then removed and given two thorough washings in cold water. It is then ready for the dyeing.

Elephant Dentistry.

It is not easy to tell when an elephant has got the toothache, but it is best to keep out of his way when you do know it. A London surgeon, who had been for many years in India, says he would sooner risk a railway accident than meet an elephant with toothache.

It appears that toothache affects an elephant in a more severe manner than it does any other animal. Elephants have very sensitive nerves, and a touch of toothache often brings on madness.

Providing you are able to chain down an elephant and draw out the offending tooth, the brute is certain to be affectionate to you afterwards. Here is an instance.

An elephant in Bengal, India, became affected with toothache, but the keepers managed to secure it while a dentist drew a decayed tooth—the cause of the trouble. After a time the elephant seemed to understand that the dentist was trying to do something for his pain, and he gave every evidence of appreciating the attention. When the operation was over he frisked round the dentist like a young lamb.

Golden Horseshoes.

Roman writers inform us that Commodus caused the hoofs of his horse to be gilded. Nero when he undertook short journeys was always drawn by mules that had silver shoes, and those of his wife, Poppaea, had shoes of gold. From a passage in "Dio Cassius" there is reason to think that the upper part only was formed of those noble metals or that they were perhaps plated out of thin slips. When Boniface, Marquis of Tuscany, one of the richest princes of his time, went to Beatrix, about the year 1038, his whole train was so magnificently decorated that his horses were shod with silver. The nails were even of the same metal.

The Truly Reticent Woman.

Commissioner's Report

The report of the Dairy and Cold Storage Commission for the fiscal year ending March 31st, 1914, has just been issued.

The report deals with the progress of dairying, the expanding home market, the export trade, the importation of New Zealand butter and the work of the Finch and Brome dairy station of the Extension and Markets Division of the Fruit Division and of the Division of Cold Storage.

In the appendices, of which there are eight, the reports of the chiefs of the various divisions are given. These include many details illustrative not only of their work but of the progress being made in dairying, marketing, storing and shipping of fruit.

This report, which is issued as Sessional Paper No. 15a, is a volume of 112 pages. Copies are available upon application to the Publications Branch, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

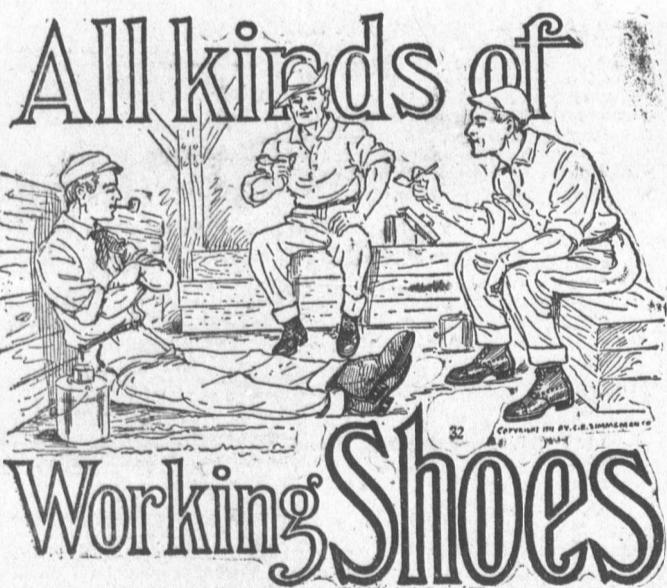

War Summary

Tokio, Nov. 7.—It is officially announced that the German fortress of Tsing Tau has surrendered to the Japanese and British forces.

Paris, Nov. 7.—The following official communication was issued by the French war office to-night: "To the north the fighting continues to be severe. According to the latest reports our offensive was proceeding in the region to the south and east of Ypres. In the region of Arras man attacks have been repulsed. In the region of the Aisne we have retaken to the east of Vaillly, the village of Soupir, which was lost the other day. In the Argonne, the enemy keeps attacking violently, but without result. On the heights of the Meuse and to the east of Verdun we have captured some trenches."

Nor. 9.—Beyond the fact that the allied French, British and Belgian forces are taking the offensive, little has been made public regarding the operations in Belgium and Northern France. The French official communication says that the Germans are particularly active in the region of Ypres, but that they have achieved nothing, and that everywhere else on the line they had not previously been able to gain a foothold. In the eastern field of the war the Russians have made decided progress against the Germans and Austrians, and Russian cavalry have penetrated German territory. Likewise the Russians have succeeded in driving back the rear guards of the Austrian

forces along the Nida River in Poland, and in Galicia are carrying out a strong offensive movement, which is indicated by the official report that they have succeeded in capturing more than 10,000 soldiers, which is indicated by the official report that they have succeeded in capturing more than 12,000 soldiers, including 125 officers in recent engagements on the San River. German reports received at Rome say that Emperor William and his generals at an army council have discussed a new plan of campaign. The situation in Warsaw says that twenty-one persons have been killed there in the last few days by bombs dropped from German aeroplanes.

London, Nov. 10.—12.51 p.m.—It was officially announced in London to-day that the German cruiser Emden has been driven ashore and burned.

The losses among the officers and crew of the Emden are reported to have been very heavy.

The Emden was destroyed in the bay of Bengal by the Australian cruiser Sydney. She was driven ashore on an island of the Coco Group.

The situation in Flanders to-day shows relatively little change, with slight improvements in favor of the Allies, according to the Belgian official communication made public in Havre to-day. A stringent application of the censorship forbids the transmission of the Belgian official statements in detail. The foregoing is the announcement given out to-day.

Berlin, Germany Nov. 10.—An official communication issued to-day by the German army headquarters says: "Our attacks near Ypres (Belgium) yesterday, the strong counter-attacks of the British forces having been repulsed. In the Argonne the fighting is progressing favorably, hostile attacks being

easily repulsed. "In Russian Poland, near Konin (33 miles northeast of Kailles), our cavalry dispersed a Russian battalion taking about 500 prisoners and eight machine guns."

Fowler vs. Corp. of Watford

This case, which has been occupying the minds of many of the ratepayers of Watford for some time, came up for hearing at the Assizes, Sarnia, on Thursday and was concluded Friday at 3.30 p.m. The matter has been in dispute for a year or more but as no agreement was arrived at Mr. Fowler served a writ on the Corporation on July 13th. The writ stated that "The plaintiff's claim is for damages by reason of the bringing down by the defendants in their drains or sewers of sewage and other noxious and offensive matter and the deposit of the same on the plaintiff's lands and premises in the vicinity of his dwelling house, and for an injunction to restrain the acts complained of, and for a mandamus to compel the defendants to remove the sewage and other noxious and offensive matters complained of."

Chancellor Boyd presided at the hearing and gave judgment as follows:—"Stands for 7 months in order that steps may be taken in order to abate the nuisance complained of under the direction and to the satisfaction of the District Officer of the Board of Health, and failing him, other competent officer to be appointed by the Provincial Board of Health. Failing within such time to provide for such abatement the plaintiff is to receive such damages in respect of the matters complained as may be fixed by the Master at Sarnia. Costs of Reference reserved. Costs up to hearing to be paid by defendant to plaintiff."
