CO-OPERATIVE BANKING

An article appeared in a recenter

ed by an exhaustive editorial upon the same subject by the New York Journal of Commerce and Daily Commercial Bulletin. The Bulletin points out that the element of co-operation exists in our own savings banks, but only in the same degree that it exists m any bank which gathers up the resources of a community and utilizes them to better advantage than the depositors could, acting individually. The savings bank works for an object quite opposite to that of the agricultaral credit associations. It is designed to serve the small investors rather than to serve small borrowers, and the security it requires, and which the laws insist that it shall require, make it useless to the class the agricultural credit associations are designed to serve. The building loan associations, which have grown rapidly in the last few years, bear some resemblance to the credit associations, but their field of operations is very limited, and they require real estate security. The credits given upon personal security with sureties by the Scotch lanks is very much the same thing as one branch, but the smaller one, of the business of the credit associations, but the Scotch system has never taken

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root here.






