CAUSE OF ELSIN'S DEATH

Continued From Page 1.

Elsin not to injure in the Ontario Mutual.

In the evening medical testimony was given by Dr. Sangster giving an account of the condition of Elsin before death and said the experts to whom respiration were perfectly proper.

The stomach was examined, and it was found that the interior was not examined, it being sealed to be sent to Toronto.

Witnesses were not certain as to the cause of Elsin's death. The symptoms he had might have been produced by opium or alcohol. A juror believed that the combination of whisky and laudanum would produce the symptoms.

Treatment Was Proper.

Dr. R. E. Darling of Goodwood said the treatment given deceased was quite proper. The congestion of the brain had been due to alcohol combined with the chill. His opinion was that death was due to the congestion of the brain aggravated by the condition of the kidneys. He saw no evidence of poisoning.

This was all the evidence Col. Farewell had to offer. He said that there were some medical gentlemen present at the post-mortem on behalf of the insurance company and these would be given an opportunity to testify.

Dr. Fred of Stouffville was of the opinion that the cause of death was not shown by the autopsy. He believed an analysis of the contents of the stomach would help the jury to a conclusion. In his opinion the respiration, which had been given by one of the doctors at 12 o'clock, would seem to indicate the presence of an overdose of morphine.

Dr. G. M. Fish of Brougham could not tell the cause of death. All the organs except one kidney were normal. The brain was normal except for a little streak of softened blood, which might have been caused after death.

The condition of the kidney would indicate that the patient was acute. He believed it would be of use to send the stomach for analysis. The only objection to this was that the stomach was the excess of stimulation.

He thought the stupor was due to congestion of the brain.

This concluded the testimony. Just at this moment Dr. Eastwood pushed his way to the front and asked the jury: "Is it a fact that you sent the stomach to the Glen Major Fishing Club to have the stomach probed on their preserves?" Dr. Fish said it was not.

The jury will await an analysis of the stomach before coming to a decision as to the cause of death. The inquest was adjourned for three weeks.

Salvation Army Likely to Appeal This Judge's Decision.



The local patriotic societies are planning to make the centenary of the death of Lord Nelson an event to be remembered. The Daughters of the Empire, the Navy League, the British Empire League, and the ladies' branch of the Navy League, on the suggestion of the latter organization, had contemplated giving a united concert in Massey Hall, but experienced some difficulty in finding some one to take charge of the arrangements. In the meantime the S.O.E. engaged the hall.

However, the Daughters of the Empire are still working on an entertainment of some kind, probably in the form of a banquet. This society has done a great deal toward making this anniversary day memorable. Early in the year it offered prizes for the best essay on "Trafalgar Day" to be handed out before Oct. 21, and is presenting the battleship Dominion with an immense flag. Princess Louise is being asked to act as donor. The ceremonies will be in Portsmouth Harbour.

All the churches throughout the Dominion have been invited with an outline of service and asked to observe Sunday, Oct. 22, as the memorial day. The English and Scotch Societies will have a concert in Massey Hall, Oct. 21, under the patronage of Earl Grey. Hon. Mortimer Clark, Hon. J. P. W. Macdonald, Mayor Urquhart and the supreme officers.

The schools will observe the day with special exercises.

ONE HEAD BETTER THAN THREE.

Work for University Commission—Cheque for Expenses.

The government yesterday forwarded to A. H. W. Colquhoun, secretary of the university commission, a cheque for \$1000 for expenses of the university enquiry.

It is understood the principal duty of the commission is to centralize authority in the university. Just now there are three heads with equal authority, namely the principals of University College, Medicine and Practical Science. When the commission's work is done there will be only one head.

New Ontario Progress. The development of New Ontario's mining resources has overshadowed the agricultural advantages. It will be a reminder to note that a farmers' institute is being formed at New Lisford on Oct. 24. Hon. Messrs. Monteth, Cochrane and Reaume have promised to be present and address the meeting.

Call of the West Deprives Province of Missionary Workers.

The men residing in the northern part of Ontario are practically without religious instruction. Until six weeks ago Rev. E. D. MacLaren, secretary of the Presbyterian Home Missions, thought it was going to be against a very serious problem. Since that time, however, a number of men have volunteered for the service.

"I think we may come out all right now," said Dr. MacLaren yesterday, "but I am inclined to believe that the west is receiving so much attention that the needs of New Ontario are being overlooked. The semi-annual meeting of the home mission board will be held to-day in the secretary's office, when reports showing the progress of the church work in Canada will be discussed."

84 FURTHER INDICTMENTS. Grand Jury's Work in Dougherty Case—45 for Forgery.

Peterborough, Oct. 9.—The grand jury this afternoon reported eight-four indictments against Newton C. Dougherty, in addition to those already found. Forty-five of these are for forgery, each containing eight counts. Thirty-nine are for embezzlement, each containing six counts.

The amounts involved range from \$14.40 to \$1000. Bonds were fixed in the sum of \$1000 on each indictment for forgery, and for \$500 on each indictment for embezzlement, making a total of \$64,500.

Joseph Well, Dougherty's attorney, announced that Dougherty would appear in court of his own accord.

Peterborough's Population. Returns for the year were this morning returned to the city clerk, and show that the assessment of the city has increased \$1,456,614, largely as a result of the new assessment act. The figures for 1905 were \$7,541,353, and for 1904 \$6,084,739. The population this year is 14,391, which shows an increase of 216 over that of 1905. The business assessment is \$652,572.

Burned Steamer Sold. Kingston, Oct. 9.—The burned steamer Melbourne, lying at Trenton, has been sold to E. W. Folger, this day, by underwriters for \$100. The Donnelly Wrecking Company will raise the hull and save the machinery.

Canada Sends Second Protest to Australia. Ottawa, Oct. 9.—The Canadian authorities have served a second protest upon the Australian Commonwealth relating to the latter's customs order which amounts to a discrimination against the direct steamship service between the two countries by way of the Pacific.
