BRITAIN IS FIRM; FRANCE DEFIANT

Relations Between Them Strained Almost to the Breaking Point.

FRANCE DEMANDS OUTLET ON THE NILE

Britain Will Insist on the Evacuation of Fashoda - French Papers are Incensed at the Plain Talk of Sir Michael Hicks-Beach-Cabie News.

There appears to be a strong fe eling that the relations between Great Britain and France are strained, over the Fashoda matter, to a dangerous extent. All reports go to show that the British Government has reached the limit of concession; and France, apparently believing Russia will support her, is very stubborn. The movements of Russian troops in the far east also indicate a disposition to be aggressive, and it is not improbable that, while France is giving the British lion trouble in Africa, Russia may engage the attention of the British squadron in the Pacific Ocean and the land forces of northern India. The News estimates the sources of supply as follows: United States and Canada, 25,000,000 quarters; Russia, 10,000,000; Bai-kan States, 6,500,000; North Africa, Persia, etc., 1,500,000; total from these sources, 43, 000,000 quarters; leaving 5,000,000 quarters to be provided from the future crops of Argentina, Uruguay, Chili, India and Australia. As the United States and Canada exported during 1807-98 a little over 250,000,000 bushels is much too small a quantity to allow for current crop year, when the wheat crop in both countries is so much larger than the crop of 1807.
