
They thought she was tickling their little sister. Then she relates that she laid the baby on the bed and took hold of Stanley, the eldest of the three.

Both Are Baptists. "Mr. and Mrs. Burrell were both members of First-avenue Baptist Church, of which I am pastor. He is regular in attendance."



Of the Lord's Day Alliance day's Annual Session.

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DR. CAVEN PRESIDENT

of the Lord's Day Alliance at Yesterday's Annual Session.

Preparations for the Coming Year - A Large Number of Delegates Present - Reports of Progress Made - Officers Elected - The Alliance About \$1000 in Debt - Night Session.

The delegates to the annual Provincial Convention of the Lord's Day Alliance assembled in the Guild Hall yesterday morning and prepared for the coming year's work. Mr. J. K. Macdonald took the chair and in the course of his address regretted the lack of interest in the work manifested by the people generally. He believed, however, that the people only required to have the matter properly brought before them in order to arouse their interest. He also stated that the work was greatly hampered by lack of funds. The report of the executive was next dealt with. It gave a review of the work done by the various departments during the year. About 5000 copies of the address delivered by Rev. Principal Caven at the conference last year have been distributed. An examination committee of three, with Rev. J. G. Shearer as chairman, was recommended.

Reports Received. The work done on matters of legislation, constitutional issues, was of a satisfactory nature. Matters pertaining to Sunday work generally were reviewed and various comments made. The ten questions recently published in the World were also submitted in the report. The Sunday cars and Sunday local traffic, Ottawa car agitation, Sunday steamboats, Toronto and Montreal Railway, the canal question, Manitoba legislation, and the labor standpoint reports were in turn discussed and approved.

Consent to Change. A recommendation to amend the constitution so as to allow a delegate, unable to be present, to send a substitute, was adopted.

Delegates Present. Among the delegates present were: Messrs J. K. Macdonald, A. E. O'Meara, J. C. Copp, J. H. Macdonald, W. F. Cassidy, Thomas M. Edmondson, Rev. R. C. Tibb, A. T. Crombie, R. Little, N. W. Hoyle, R. Hall, C. W. McKinnon, and Misses E. A. Galt, W. M. Willis, of Toronto; Rev. J. G. Shearer and Messrs. T. A. Moore and A. McWilliams of Hamilton; Rev. S. Houston and Mr. J. Macgregor of Toronto; Rev. J. G. Shearer, Rev. W. Craig, Cardinal, Rev. W. Kettwell, Galt; Rev. Mc Clellan, Winnipeg.

The convention sanctioned the nominations of their committee and elected the following officers: President, Rev. J. C. Copp; Vice-President, J. K. Macdonald; Secretary, J. H. Macdonald; Treasurer, W. F. Cassidy; Executive Committee, J. K. Macdonald, J. C. Copp, J. H. Macdonald, W. F. Cassidy, Rev. J. G. Shearer, Rev. W. Craig, Cardinal, Rev. W. Kettwell, Galt; Rev. Mc Clellan, Winnipeg.

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Money is Needed. The financial situation took up the greater part of the afternoon session. Mr. J. C. Copp, who has acted as treasurer for several years, stated that in the past year the Alliance had expended \$114 and that their liabilities were \$114.75. Mr. Copp felt that the time had arrived when he could no longer carry the Alliance unless he received some pledge from the Alliance that matters would be remedied. A compromise was effected by passing a resolution to the effect that the members themselves to extend their organization and better their financial standing. Mr. Copp agreed upon these conditions to remain in office until the end of the year, when if matters were not improved, he would resign. The report of the Executive Committee was adopted as a whole and to minimize expense, and lessen the work, a resolution was passed, instructing the executive to appoint a small sub-committee to conduct the business, after which the meeting adjourned.

New President Speaks. Dr. Caven acknowledged the kindness of Mr. Macdonald's remarks, and said that his only reason for resigning the position was that he might help on the good work. He said that he was following a man who had discharged his duties in the ablest and most painstaking way. He then reminded his hearers that the work of the Alliance was not ended, and that constant vigilance was necessary for the success of their efforts. He acknowledged that the forces against them were strong, but emphasized the good work done by the Alliance. They had not started the Alliance as a theological body, but simply that those who wished to, might have the Sabbath day of complete rest. He also expressed the hope that the friends of the Alliance would not allow the cause to languish for lack of funds.

Another Resolution. The convention then passed a resolution commending the good work done by Mr. J. K. Macdonald, and regretting the circumstances which compelled his resignation from the presidency. The resolution was presented by Rev. Dr. Caven and Mr. Macdonald gratefully acknowledged the tribute thus paid to him.

Rev. Mr. McBeth of Winnipeg was introduced by Dr. Caven. After expressing his pleasure in the members of the Alliance, he spoke of the bill regarding the observance of the Lord's Day, which had been passed in Ontario last year at Manitoba. He also said

that the work was being vigorously prosecuted in that province. In introducing Mr. Wood, ex-M.L.A. of Meade, Dr. Caven referred to the friendship with which the Local Legislature had treated their movement.

Keep the Sabbath. Mr. Wood urged the keeping of the Sabbath in all its purity and entirety and the necessity of guarding against innovations likely to desecrate the day. He referred to cities in the United States which had allowed these changes to creep in as examples of the evil. He also adverted to the Sunday car question and said that if the members of the Legislature had fully realized what they were doing they would not have so readily given the citizens of Toronto the privilege of the vote.

Is It a Lost Cause? Mr. N. W. Hoyle thought that the sparrows of the audience was an evidence that many of the people were of the opinion that they were working for a lost cause. He, however, said that he did not believe it was a lost cause. He feared that very many of the reverend gentlemen were not awake and very largely blamed the pulpit for the lack of interest now manifested. He also thought that some influence was being exerted to get the Sunday law slipping away from them and unless the movement was arrested immediately it would soon be lost entirely and forever.

Mr. Benson spoke on behalf of the workmen and said that the workmen wanted the Sabbath and should refuse to work on the Sabbath.

Rev. Mr. Houston of Kingston, on behalf of the majority of clergymen, pleaded "not guilty" to the charge of being asleep. He said that he had been sick about fighting it out, although it seemed like a lost cause.

Theology and benediction ended the proceedings.

Resolved. The convention resolved that the members of the Alliance should be diligent in the observance of the Lord's Day, and should refuse to work on the Sabbath.

TWO KILLED IN ELECTRIC STORM.
Houston, Tex., Oct. 21.—The electric and wind storm which swept over the State of Texas last night was very severe in South Texas. The damage to cotton is enormous. At Deer Park, twenty miles from Houston, the residence of C. B. Adams was demolished. Adams, his wife and baby sustained minor injuries, while A. J. Cook was crushed to death.
At Pasadena, the residence of John Stout was turned over and completely wrecked. Six occupants were injured. At Missouri, a number of freight cars were blown from the siding; out on the main track. The California express, running 40 miles an hour, dashed into the engine turned over, instantly killing George Johnston of San Antonio, the engineer, and scalding the fireman and injuring the brakeman. None of the passengers was badly hurt.

An Early Snow Storm.
St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 21.—The weather conditions that prevail now break all meteorological records for this section, snow never before having fallen so early in the season, according to the weather officials. For a short time in the past 24 hours snow came down in great flakes, but melted upon reaching the ground. The earliest previous date on which snow appeared here was Nov. 25.

The collector's bill again took up half an hour's discussion, and as in his letter to the village, he anticipated Councilor Barrett, who jotted down the objectionable phrase in his pocket book, and pronounced it "impertinence." The Council were unanimous in their opinion that 20c was altogether too high an account from the man who, after Council meeting, traveled to Toronto Junction and back to serve Manager Stone with the resolution which compelled the cars to stay out of the village. He pleaded that it was late at night when he started, and that he did not get back until the last car, but even this did not soften their reproach, for in reprinting him for his extravagance they said that he should have given the letter to one of the street car conductors for him to serve on the manager, and thus have saved the village from so great an expense.
