trouble is giving promise of further annovance to the Indian Department, and the present complexion of the difficulty is more serious than most people imruary, the chiefs of the reserve got in-formation that the lease of the islands formation that the lease of the islands in the St. Lawrence had expired in August last, and they immediately set about to get possession of the Islands. As an experiment they made a bee and moved the wigwam of one of their number, Jake Skin, to Colquhoun's Island, about two miles across the ice. When the executors of the Colquhoun estate became aware of this move they placed the matter in the hands of the law firm of Leitch, Pringle & Cameron, who communicated the facts to the Indian Department, Ottawa, and they deputed one of the officials to come to St. Regis and try and convince the coliefs that they were wrong in assuming the state of the chiefs that they were wrong in assuming that the leases had expired, and that the property had reverted to them. The official produced the leases signed by the chiefs to establish the right of the Colquhoun estate to the land, but it was of no avail and the chiefs refused to remove their man.

Skin Determined to Hold On.

Indians of Cornwall and St. Regis Reservation was held at St. Regis yesterday and they decided to fight the matter inch by finch in the courts if necessary, and, failing to establish their rights there, they will stand by Skin in retaining the island.

Will Resist Authorities.

The department was balked last year in efforts to erect a jul at St. Regis, and this has given the Indians confidence introcurage that they can resist the Government in the removal of Skin. The department is equally determined to remove Skin if he has no right there. Mr. J. A. McRae, the Inspector of Indian Reserves, came to Cornwall yesterday, and Mr. B. W. Collisson, of the law firm mamed, went down to Colquhoun's Island to serve a written state evening in the office of the above named solicitors, for the purpose of taking evidence pertaining to the matter, and examined about ten witnesses. 
