TWENTY-SECOND YEAR

WOMAN GAVE HER HUSBAND A CHARGE WHILE HE WAS IN THE STREET

Mrs. White of Brantford Lodged in Jail, Suspected of Administering Strychnine With Fatal Results—To Get Insurance on His Life is Said to Have Been the Motive—Dramatic Evidence Given.

Brantford, April 30.—At the hearing of the case of the death of Mrs. Josephine White, which was held at the court house here last night, Mrs. Josephine White was arrested, charged with feloniously poisoning and killing her husband, the late Charles White. The arrest was made immediately after the coroner's jury had brought in their verdict, which was "that she said Charles White came to his death from strychnine poisoning, which was administered by his wife." Mrs. White was not in the court, but while the jury was taking the evidence of the last witnesses at their adjourned session last evening she sat in the office of Governor Ritchie, downstairs.

The warrant for her arrest was read to her, and Mr. Henry explained that it would be necessary for her to remain in jail. Under the terrible strain, Mrs. White broke down completely, and pleadingly urged the constables to let her go home. She begged affecting that she might not be locked up, and said that she could get home in the morning.

"I cannot stay in the dark cell," she moaned; "please, please, do not put me there. Mr. Heyd, do not let them do it. Send for my brother; he will get me out. My God! this is terrible! Mr. Heyd, tell them that it will be all right."

Mr. Heyd essayed to calm the woman, but she continued her pleading. P. C. Chapman explained that it would be impossible for him to allow her to go home; that it was his duty to arrest her. Finally, he took her arm, and gently led her into the jail. At the door leading to the jail she hesitated, and again broke into a pleading wail of anguish. Then she entered the door, which closed behind her, and the few persons who heard the interview could hear nothing more.

Mrs. White, this morning, was not in the jail, but she came before the police magistrate, and was remanded for a week.

Cause of It All.
The late Charles White died very suddenly on Sunday, April 29, at his home, 125 Yonge street, where he was employed as a moulder in the Waterloo Works, and was left alone in the house.

MR. BLAIR IS A GOOD CUSTOMER WHEN USING THE PEOPLE'S MONEY

Bought Real Estate for the Intercolonial at St. John, Paying \$20,000 for a Lot for Engine House—Mr. Pugsley Said to Have Been Interested—Minister of Railways Has a Lot of Trouble Getting His Estimates Passed.

Ottawa, April 30.—(Special.)—In connection with the Intercolonial estimates some of Mr. Blair's high-priced bargains along the line came in for criticism.

On the item of \$20,000 for increased accommodation at St. John, it came out that \$8000 was being paid for 1000 square feet. While on the item of \$100,000 for increased accommodation, Mr. Blair explained that it was for an engine house at St. John, to cost \$80,000 and \$20,000 for the lot.
