

WESTERN CROPS BRIGHT.

C. P. R Weekly Statement Shows Conditions to Be Extremely Favorable.

Winnipeg, Man., June 22 .- The Canadian Pacific weekly crop report for the week is favorable in the extreme. From every branch of the railway encouraging reports of the magnificent growth of the crop and of the very favorable weather conditions have come in. In every case the weather is marked "favorable." The largest number of hours of rain is reported from the Napinka branch, where, at Darlingford and Filot Mound, thirty hours are given for the week. On the main line there has been plenty of rain, and the height of the grain varies from 6 to 15 inches. The height of grain at Minnedosa is reported as 15 inches, which is the highest in the report. Figures from all other points are equally satisfactory.





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
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
