CAN PREPARE LISTS.

Federal Government's Privilege in Manitoba Districts.

WINNIPEG, Man., May 15.—(Special.)—Despatches from Ottawa indicate the possibility of an immediate dissolution of parliament. If there should be such a dissolution, the Dominion Government, under the law as it exists, will have the right to make lists in the City of Winnipeg and City of Brandon since March 1, when the lists special made in February, 1907, lapsed for Dominion purposes.

The Dominion Franchise Act provides that in the event of the Dominion election being called, the lists available for election will be those in force "on the 60th day next preceding the day fixed for nomination of candidates for such Dominion election."

This means that should an election be called, there are in the country districts, but in Winnipeg and Brandon and in those parts of the Dominion constituency of Ontario, where the Dominion Government will have the right to ignore the coming provincial registration entirely and prepare their own lists.

CANADA CONTROLS. Export Duty on Paper Pulp Would Cause a Famine in U. S.

WASHINGTON, May 15.—The house special committee, which is conducting an investigation of the so-called paper trust sat till a late hour tonight.

The most significant development was the introduction of a telegram from the J. R. Booth Paper Co. of Ottawa, Canada, stating that the company pays some of its skilled labor higher wages than are paid in the United States.

David S. Cowles, president of the American Paper and Pulp Association, representative of the American Newspaper Publishers' Association, that an agreement existed between the Canadian manufacturers and the American manufacturers in the east providing that the Canadian manufacturers should not go into the eastern markets.

As a matter of fact, he said, last April Canadian paper had been offered to Herman Ritter, president of the first floor operation Life Building, for 100 lbs. delivered in the press room in New York.

"If the Canadian Government would levy an export duty on pulpwood and wood pulp, what would be left of the paper industry in the United States?" asked Chairman Mann.

"Little or nothing," replied the witness. I suppose it would be equally disastrous to news publishers."

ONE FREED, OTHER HELD DOCTORS BEFORE JURIES

Ashton Fletcher Not Guilty—Edgar Cook Found Guilty of "Intent to Procure."

Two cases of special interest were decided in Toronto criminal courts yesterday. They had to do with the so-called "social evil."

Dr. Edgar M. Cook was convicted in the sessions court of "intent to procure an abortion."

Dr. Ashton Fletcher was freed by a jury in the assizes of the charge of having performed an illegal operation causing death.

The jury sitting under Judge Winchester in the court of quarter sessions last night was out nearly five hours before returning a verdict of "guilty" against Dr. Edgar M. Cook, charged with performing an illegal operation upon Lilly Reid of Caledonia, Ont., with intent to procure an abortion.

The jury tried to find him guilty on the first count in the indictment, being dissatisfied with the proof of the use of an instrument.

The penalty for the crime is not affected by this finding, being life imprisonment as a maximum in either case.

The jury retired at 8.30 and at 8.30 asked Judge Winchester the following query: "Can we find guilt of intent to procure abortion?"

Judge Winchester provided them with such enlightenment and the verdict was rendered accordingly at 10 o'clock.

Bail was renewed pending argument this morning for a reserve case.

Buzza Saw Curt Methods. The evidence of Mrs. Johns, keeper of the Grange-avenue maternity home, read under protest of the defence, was bitterly attacked by E. B. Johnston, K.C., in his address to the jury, which lasted nearly two hours.

Mr. Johnston took occasion to criticize the methods of dealing with the police court. Deputy Clerk Arthur Webb was called to introduce the evidence which had been written out by him in long-hand at the police court.

Mr. Johnston in cross-examining the clerk succeeded in getting him to say that sometimes as many as 40 cases would be tried in an hour in the police court.

In his address Mr. Johnston said with regard to the reliability of the Johns' evidence: "The crown asks you to believe this evidence—evidence taken in a court which is run on the principle of a buzz-saw—the greater number of revolutions per minute the more the saw in the saw. In such a court, can the evidence be reported fully or accurately?"

He pointed out that in taking down Mrs. Johns' evidence in one place Webb had written: "I brought Dr. Cook down to perform an operation on this girl." In this extract the words "perform an operation" had been written out and the word "examine" scribbled above. This mistake, if uncorrected, would tend to convict the doctor should the jury believe it, and there could be no way of telling whether other mistakes were not allowed to pass.

Didn't Expect "Intent." Crown Attorney Drayton sprung a surprise on Mr. Johnston when he pointed out that the word "intent" was not in the indictment, but was used on her person an instrument," etc., in other words, that the indictment was founded on the evidence of the witness which makes the "intent" of such an operation, if proved, a criminal offence.

Mr. Johnston was objecting to Mr. Drayton's calling in evidence the medical testimony in the person of Dr. Arthur Jukes Johnson and Dr. Cotton, after the defence evidence was all in, and he held the advantage of the case correct the whole trial went for nothing.

For the defence Dr. W. J. Hunter and Dr. G. H. Hospital and Dr. Ferguson of the Western Hospital were examined at length. Their evidence tended to uphold the theory that the girl was never pregnant.

Dr. Fletcher Freed. At 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon Dr. Ashton Fletcher stepped out of the dock in the criminal assizes. The jury acquitted him after two hours on the charge of his having performed a criminal operation on Jessie Gould, causing her death in the Western Hospital last March.

Justice Anglin in addressing the jury said that if the charge upon which the prisoner was arraigned, a medical murder he would have had doubts as to leaving the case in their hands upon the evidence brought out.

Mrs. J. H. Hart, who in the witness box said the crown had not brought out one bit of evidence that could connect Dr. Fletcher with the use of an instrument, said she was sure that she was not a party to the crime.

Prosecutor Blackstock informed the jury that there was much room for doubt, as the evidence of guilt were not sufficiently clear.

"Dr. Fletcher is the son of one of my oldest friends, and no one outside of his immediate relatives would be more pleased at his acquittal than I would," he said, "provided, of course, that you can find that verdict in all truth and justice."

HE BRINGS THEM TO THE DESIRED HAVEN

Pastor Russell Home Again—Life's Stormy Sea and the Christian's Haven—The World's Experiences Quite Different.

NORTH PITTSBURG, Pa., May 15.—Pastor C. T. Russell was warmly welcomed by his home congregation at Allgheny Carnegie Hall on his return from a tour of the British Isles, where he addressed immense audiences in London, Liverpool, Bristol, Manchester, Leicester, Bradford, Birmingham, Luton, Belfast, Dublin, Glasgow and Edinburgh. His text, evidently associated with his home-coming, was: "So He bringeth them unto their desired haven." (Psalms cvii, 20.) He said: "I assure you all, dear friends, that while I love and fellowship all who are the Lord's in every place, my heart instinctively turns to this company of the Lord's people as being the one which I have so long been associated with in heavenly spirit interests. It is an glad to be with you again and glad to read in your faces a similar gladness and welcome on your part. Thinking of my homecoming and associating with it our heavenly home and our anticipation that before very long we shall be gathered to that shining shore. I choose my text, 'He bringeth them to the desired haven.' The context seems to describe the Church of Christ and her billowy journey from Pentecost down to the time when the last member of the church, which is the body of Christ, shall be changed in a moment, in a twinkling of an eye and when all together united with Him shall present themselves faultless before the presence of His glory with exceeding joy (John xxiv). This certainly is the desired haven of all those who were begotten of the Holy Spirit and who have been taught of God and who have learned something at least respecting the things that eye hath not seen or ear heard, neither hath it entered into the heart of man the things which God teacheth in revelation for them that love Him. (I Cor. ii, 8.)

It is of this desired haven that the prophet speaks representing Christ and the church, saying: 'I shall be married when I wake in Thy likeness.' (Psalms xvii, 15.)

We may be content in the midst of all the sufferings and trials and duties of life, but we are not satisfied. We are content because our Lord assures us that present lessons and experiences and disciplines are necessary for our fitting and preparing for the heavenly kingdom and for the future glory, but we shall be satisfied only when we have the hope of the promise of which now we have only the promise or hope. But when a hope is ours—wonder the prophet referred to it as 'the hope' and connected it with the glorious appearing of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ at His second advent. (Titus ii, 13.)

"Which Hope We Have."

I would remind you that this promise which constitutes our hope, our anchorage in Christ, and that which we can get those eternal joys which are promised to the faithful. If they are all to be blessed they are not in any hopeless position or condition. They have indeed gone into the silence of the tomb, into the silent hades, but He whose word cannot be broken and whose oath is inviolate, declares that they shall be blessed. And this we see signifies that they must all be awakened from the sleep of death. No wonder the apostle exhorts that we should sorrow not as others who have no hope, for if we believe that Jesus Christ died and rose again, let us believe that all who sleep in Jesus will God bring with Him. (I Thess. iv, 13, 14.)

SUPERINTENDENT YOUNG SHOWING GOOD RESULTS

At the Cobalt Central Mine Vein at Silver Leaf Traced One Thousand Feet.

COBALT, May 15.—(From the Man on the Spot.)—A visit to the Silver Leaf reveals the following facts and details of development and management. The big vein has been traced from the shaft on Kerr Lake to the main road or a distance of over one thousand feet southwesterly.

For practically the entire distance stringers are noticeable and the veins of silver and silver sulphide are in contact. There have been no shots put in and no native silver has been seen right on the surface.

Considerable work has been done on the Lead-Crown Reserve vein. At the 45-foot to the 125-foot level has been done to the southwest for 75 feet and drifting was started at the second or 125-foot level on this vein and on the new vein on Wednesday. At a depth of 55 feet in the shaft the values disappeared from the main vein for six feet, but the vein's width was maintained and at the bottom of this barren six feet the values came back as strong as ever, and continued the rest of the way down. Open-cut work has been done on the surface in the shaft 25 feet deep and 125 feet wide.

Earthquake Recorded.

The instruments at the Toronto Observatory recorded a moderate seismic disturbance commencing at 3.42 yesterday morning and attaining greatest intensity at 3.55, after which it gradually subsided. The greatest semi-circumference of the boom was eight millimetres. The observatory authorities cannot, of course, say where the disturbance took place, but would estimate it to be about 3000 miles away and in a westerly direction.

NEW YORK STOCK MARKET HAS SUDDEN SWINGS

Early Break is Followed by Another Rally—Toronto Stocks Have Firm Undertone.

World Office, Friday Evening, May 15. Trading was not as large at the Toronto Stock Exchange to-day as it was yesterday. In the speculative issues, such as Mexicana, in which recent advances occurred, profit-taking was attempted with the usual result. Domestic securities had the assistance of a strong Wall-street, and this gave the undertone to prices a substantial appearance. The market was not encouraged or disturbed by any special news. The only special news was the report of the coal and steel magnates' repudiation of the Mexican venture yesterday, but the syndicate was not successful in arousing any special enthusiasm. Twin City, of the older issues, was the strongest feature of the market, but the rise in this stock is being sedulously brought about, and purchases are not yet discontinued. In the investment shares firmness was exhibited by Canada Permanent and Imperial and Standard banks. Other shares of this character were dull, but offerings were light.

"LIFE" FOR GEO. SLACK SWEARS HIS INNOCENCE

Justice Anglin, Viewing Him as Incorrigible, Imposes Extreme Penalty.

Justice Anglin yesterday, in the criminal assizes, sentenced George Slack to life imprisonment. The crime for which Slack is to pay the penalty was a particularly brutal one. The victim was Mrs. Davies, a woman of advanced years, who keeps a small store at Yonge and Gloucester-streets. On March 20 last a man entered her store and brutally assaulted her, getting away with some \$20 from the till. She, together with several other witnesses, positively identified Slack, who has many past convictions. The defence was an alibi.

"I am innocent, so help me God," said Slack when asked if he had anything to say before sentence. "It is pretty hard to send an innocent man to prison. I would fall in my duty if I did not regard you as an incorrigible offender. May this sentence be a warning to others that such horrible crimes will be punished to the full extent of the law," declared the judge.

Slack had been released on parole last December after serving eight years and nine months of a 12-years' sentence for assaulting Harry Aspenden, an old man, and his wife and daughter, in their grocery at 216 Victoria-street. Slack was let off with a three-years' term. J. W. Curry, a.C., pleaded for leniency, saying the young man has kept away from liquor since he came out of prison in December last, and in spite of the jury's verdict I still think that an alibi was proven. He will endeavor to secure a new trial.

Vincenzo Milton, Italian, was sentenced to five years in the penitentiary for clashing the throat of his erstwhile sweetheart with a razor. He pleaded drunkenness and "fooling" as an excuse.
