Municipalizing Chicago Street Railway

The City of Chicago has not attained as yet to municipal ownership and operation of street railways, but she has a contract with her street railway companies which, by comparison with present conditions in Toronto, is ideal. Here are some outstanding features of the situation in Chicago :

1. The city may at any time, upon six months' notice, take over the railways or require them to be transferred to a trustee company for the fixed sum of \$50,000,000, plus whatever money is meanwhile invested in new lines by order of the city.

2. The company's financial affairs are conducted under the supervision of the city and sinking funds are established for repairs, depreciation and losses.

3. All improvements, repairs and extensions are subject to the control of a board of supervising engineers appointed by the city. 4. All details as to service, cars, routing, stops, etc., are

under the control of the city. 5. The money must be furnished by the company for all extensions, including subways, as the city may direct.

6. The net profits of each year are divided as follows: 55 per cent. to the city; 45 per cent, to the company.

Yet, a few years ago, the City of Chicago was apparently helpless under the most grinding and unconscionable street railway monopoly in the world. It represented a capitalization (including bond issues) of \$123,000,000. It had a colorable claim to a ninety-nine-year franchise, for which it had paid, and for which it proposed to pay, nothing. It enjoyed the advantage of hired men holding seats in a city council, notoriously incompetent and corrupt, and had powerful influences at its command in the state legislature.

By what miracle did Chicago escape from her predicament?

There was no miracle, except such as may be wrought by public service. The big men of Chicago-lawyers of national reputation, engineers of world-wide celebrity, men with millions from the board of trade, financial experts from banks, trust companies and great universities, men of ability from the ranks of organized labor, teachers from the public schools—the brains, push and wealth of Chicago—came together to perform a public duty. They laid aside all preconceived notions and prejudices. They studied the traction situation. They mastered the physical and financial questions involved in it. They verified their conclusions beyond answer or argument. They put these conclusions in short, plain sentences, which were read and understood by every voter in Chicago. They created a public opinion which reorganized the city council, causing men to be elected of recognized standing, integrity and ability, and compelling them to accept the trust of the people. Before long the transportation committee of the city council was a body well able to cope with the management of the street railway company, while in legal counsel and in engineering ability, the services at the disposal of the city surpassed the talent in similar lines which could be secured by the street railway.

When the final struggle came, the traction companies found that, altho the city might not be able to buy them out, the citizens of Chicago had formed a corporation which could and would buy them out and hold the property as a trustee, managing it as the city directed, giving to the city a fair share of the profits, and prepared to turn over its system to the city any time upon getting back the money actually invested. Then the "coon came down," and Chicago ruled the street railways instead of the street railways ruling Chicago.

How much civic patriotism of that kind have we in Toronto? An underpaid and overworked law department, amid hundreds of other problems, is left to deal, as best it can, with the street railway company. The same is true of the city engineering department. What efficient aid and direction is the city council qualified to give them? What help do they get from the eminent lawyers, from the able bankers, from the college professors, from the capitalists of Toronto? What information, worth printing, is circulated among the ratepayers? The ordinary citizen of Toronto can only say, like the poor man in "Hard Times": "It's a' a muddle-a weary muddle."

How many men of standing and success in Toronto are willing to perform the public service required? Who are they? Will they agree to master our traction problem and to make the citizens of Toronto familiar with it? Will they give their time and money to bring this about? Could a corporation be formed in Toronto which would take over a service, like the street railway, not for exploitation but as a trustee for the city, prepared, at any time, to surrender it to the city upon being repaid its investment?

Public service-personal sacrifice for the public good-is an ideal that should rapidly take some effective, practical shape among our leading citizens, if Toronto is to keep pace with the progressive spirit of the west-


